MT. LAKE GARDEN CLUB

Twenty-two members answered the roll call and a guest, Mrs. Charles Johnson, was welcomed as a new member of the club. Mrs. Oscar Rylander reported that many Mt. Lake Garden Club members participated in the Christmas workshop held by the garden clubs in District 12 at which Christmas decorations were made and donated to the Moose Lodge to be sold for the benefit of the 1958 Operation Santa Claus. The lodge has successfully conducted this project during the past several years for the benefit of underprivileged children. Club members took part in this meeting in place of holding a regular club meeting for November. Crystal Cheyne reported that many club members took an active part in learning the art of making candles, candle holders and heirloom wreaths in a meeting held at the home of Mrs. C. H. Kelly. During the meeting at the Campbell home, Crystal Cheyne demonstrated how beautiful heirloom wreaths could be made from conifer cones, nuts and a great variety of dried material, permanently fastened with linoleum paste on a circular piece of linoleum or plywood, making a wreath which can be used for several Christmas seasons. Ruby White, flower show chairman, suggested that much planning can be done for the spring flower show before the spring season. Mrs. Dick Henzel read an interesting article on the care of iris and tulips for better blooms and the use of Bordeaux mixtures as dormant sprays in controlling fungicides damaging plant life. The Christmas program in the latter part of the afternoon was conducted by program chairman, Mrs. William Cunningham. Mrs. Cunningham played the accordion in accompaniment of group singing of yuletide songs. The poem, "Leisure," was read by Mrs. Ruby White and a gift exchange was held. The Campbell home was attractively decorated in the holiday theme. The dining table arrangement was made by Alice Nyhart using greenery, red carnations, white candles and snowballs of styrofoam and completed with an overall spray of snow. At the close of the meeting refreshments were served by the hostesses. The next regular meeting will be held at the home of Mrs. Enoch Johnson, near the Merrill - Lakeview junction, on January 19. The program will include a talk on dormant sprays and insecticides and colored picture slides of members' gardens.
