### AF Sergeant Retires At Kingsley

S. Sgt. Joseph B. McKenzie was presented with a certificate of retirement last Wednesday morning in a brief semi-formal ceremony in the office of Col. Jack W. Williams, commander, Kingsley Field. Sgt. McKenzie's retirement, the first at Kingsley Field, climaxed more than 29 years active military service in both the United States Army and Air Force. A native of Silver Creek, Pennsylvania, Sgt. McKenzie began his military career at Fort Niagara, New York, on June 23, 1926. He has served in Hawaii, Panama Canal Zone, Philippine Islands, and Korea and has been with the 408th Installation Engineers Section since his arrival here in April 1957. The order announcing his retirement cites Sgt. McKenzie for distinguishing himself through more than 29 years of military service to his country. "He has demonstrated distinctive loyalty, willingness to serve, and cooperative attitude throughout his entire service. His exemplary standard of personal conduct will long be remembered by those associated with him." Sgt. McKenzie and his wife Isabel plan to live in Tucson, Arizona.

### American Senator Reports Reds Wary Of China Plan

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev in his recent Moscow talk with Sen. Hubert Humphrey (D-Minn.) rejected the communists' system recently instituted in Communist China. Humphrey, writing in the Jan. 12 issue of Life magazine about his eight-hour talk with the Soviet boss, said Khrushchev called the system "old-fashioned and reactionary... not nearly so good as the state farm and collective farms" in Russia. Humphrey also said Khrushchev noted that communes were based on the principle, "from each according to his abilities, to each according to his needs." Khrushchev said, "You know that won't work (because) you can't get production without incentive."

So he said he wrote Eisenhower a personal letter requesting the credits and was "delighted" when the President rejected the request. "You helped me," Khrushchev told Humphrey, "you showed my people that you did not really care about them. You walked right into it. You were stupid, you were fools."

Khrushchev likes President Eisenhower, Humphrey said, doesn't care for former President Truman and "is openly disdainful of Secretary of State John Foster Dulles." Khrushchev also said that recent accounts by Adlai Stevenson and columnist Walter Lippman of their visits to Russia were "the best of the worst."

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### Labor Chief Views 1959

Indications are that 1959 will maintain the economic gains made steadily by Klamath County during 1958, Guy Barker, manager of the local office of the state employment service, said in the first issue of his monthly labor market bulletin for the new year. In explanation of this prediction, Barker made the following statements: New construction has been a large factor in the increased payrolls during the past three years, but is not expected to be as heavy during the present year. Operation of the new softboard plant and additions to Air Force personnel will provide payrolls to compensate for any reduction in construction. Logging and lumbering operations have maintained high employment since early spring and continue at a higher rate than is normally found at this season. Most of the operations which are down at the present time plan an early resumption of work. Total unemployment at the end of December was 30 per cent lower than it had been a year earlier, with 14 per cent less workers claiming unemployment benefits during December, 1958, than claimed them during December, 1957. The continual flow of new people moving into this area contributes to the number of unemployed, since there is often a lag of several weeks from the time these newcomers arrive until they find a job. An indication of this fact is that during December 189 individuals filed for unemployment benefits based on earnings in other states. California led in the number of interstate claims with Washington second. Twenty-two different states and Canada were represented by the claimants. Of those registered for work at the local office, 25 per cent do not have unemployment benefits. A large percentage of registered workers expect to return to their regular employers within a short time. During the last six months of 1958, 1,862 individuals were placed on non-agricultural jobs by the office. This was a 22 per cent increase over the number placed during the last six months of 1957.

### Here Are Several Hints On Your 1958 Tax Return

This is the first of 12 articles bringing you the latest tips and helpful hints on problems you are likely to encounter as you fill out your 1958 federal tax return. Although you have until April 15 to file a return, it is always advisable to fill out the return well before the deadline. Then if you have a refund coming, you can file early and stand a better chance of getting your money back quickly. Or, if it turns out that you owe more tax, you have time to arrange for payment before the deadline of April 15. The tax forms for 1958 look much like the forms for prior years. There is, however, one very important change involving those who are entitled to use the card Form 1040A. In years past, Form 1040A could not be used by any taxpayer whose income exceeded \$5,000. For 1958, the card form may be used by any individual with total income of less than \$10,000, consisting of wages reported on Form W-2 and not more than \$200 in dividends, interest, and wages not subject to withholding. Husband and wife also may file a joint return on Form 1040A if their combined income does not exceed these limits. This change means that many more taxpayers than before will be eligible to use Form 1040A. One of the later Primer articles will help you decide which form to use when you fill out your tax return. Other articles will cover points which bother most taxpayers — concentrating on items that are likely to save you money. Watch for them as they appear in this newspaper. One of the difficulties with our tax laws today is that even the simplest rules have exceptions and complications which tend to confuse the average person. For example, take the rule about who must file a tax return.

The general rule is that everyone, regardless of age or citizenship, residing in the United States who had gross income in 1958 of \$600 or more must file a tax return. But this rule has two exceptions: first, if you were 65 or older on Dec. 31, 1958, then you do not have to file unless your gross income was \$1200 or more; and, second, despite what is said above about \$600 and \$1200 tests, if you were a self-employed person subject to social security tax in 1958, you must file if you had net earnings from self-employment of \$400 or more. In determining what your gross income is, you cannot first subtract nonbusiness deductions such as charitable contributions and taxes or interest on your home. For example, a student who earned \$650 would have to file a return even though he contributed \$60 of this amount to some charity. Many students and others who work part time during the year do not earn enough to require filing a return. If such persons had any income tax withheld from their salary, they should file a return even though they are not required to do so. Such persons owe no tax and are entitled to a refund of any that was withheld, but it will not be repaid unless a return is filed.

#### ON THE SPOT

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz. (AP) — Second Lt. Thomas Stewart made an emergency landing at Flagstaff Airport. His jet knocked down five landing lights, ran off the runway, crashed through a fence and smashed into a row of trees. But Stewart walked away unscathed. An Air Force investigation team flew to the airport to determine the cause of the crash. After investigation, the five team members and Stewart were heading home when their light plane suddenly veered off the runway, spun around and stopped in soft dirt. None was injured.
