## Unbeaten Villanova Wildcats Notch Eighth Straight Win

BY THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Villanova's Wildcats, scraping away with blunted claws the last couple of basketball seasons, seem to have honed up a dandy this time around with a coach's dream parlay of height and speed. The Wildcats, one of four unbeaten left in the nation's major school ranks after Wednesday night's 99-85 whipping of Muhlenberg, have rolled over eight straight opponents with a versatile starting lineup that scales down by stages from 6-8 to 5-9. The schedule hasn't been overpowering although Villanova's victims include the likes of Penn, Duke, Temple and Siena. It's more the ease with which they've whipped through it, averaging a 21-point winning margin. Only Auburn, 9-0 and 20-0 over a two-year span, and St. Bonaventure and Boston University, both 6-0, have managed to match Villanova in getting this far without a defeat. Three sophomores, 6-8 Jack Driscoll, 5-11 Jim Kenny, and 5-9 Jimmy Huggard, junior George Raveling 6-6, and senior Joe Ryan 6-2 make up the Wildcat starters. Boston U. downed Springfield, 80-55, but St. Francis (Pa.) was toppled from the unbeaten after bagging seven straight, 87-78 by Youngstown. In other action Maryland clamped down Duke in an Atlantic Coast Conference test, 64-33. Kent State wrapped up Toledo 58-29 in

a Mid-American Conference game, and Oglethorpe dropped a 75-15 blanket on West Georgia. Texas Christian took over the Southwest Conference leadership with a 2-0 record with a 52-45 victory over Arkansas, and burlly Utah, a bunch of 200-pounders

## 'T' State Maintains Poll Lead

NEW YORK (UPI) — The Tennessee State Tigers, who swept their first 12 games, topped United Press International's small college basketball ratings today for the second straight week. Evansville (Ind.), third last week, replaced Wheaton (Ill.) in second place. Steubenville (Ohio) advanced from fourth to third while Wheaton slipped to fourth. Southwest Missouri State was fifth. Louisiana Tech advanced from eighth to sixth after whipping two major college opponents in tournament play. Western Illinois, Texas Southern, South Dakota and Akron (Ohio) rounded out the first 10 in that order. Akron was the only newcomer in the select group. South Dakota State, which won five games after losing its first two starts to Iowa State and St. Louis of the major college ranks, headed the second 10 group. Fresno (Calif.) State, McNeese (La.), St. Michael's (Vt.), Regis (Colo.), Grambling (La.), Kentucky Wesleyan, Creighton (Neb.), Knox (Ill.) and Georgetown (Ky.) followed South Dakota State in that order.

Spring Hill, 80-73 over Murray (Ky.), and Centenary, a 87-64 upset winner over favored Tennessee Tech, reached the final of the senior Bowl tournament at Mobile and play for the title tonight. Oklahoma City, 13th ranked in the weekly AP poll, boosted its record to 9-1 by hitting half its shots in a 90-63 thumping of West Texas State, and injured Terry Bockhorn came off the bench to trigger sputtering Dayton to a 57-47 decision over Duquesne, scoring four points when the Dukes threatened.

Holy Cross walloped Rhode Island 102-62 and Fordham outclassed Long Island U. 86-52. Other Eastern matches saw Chuck Darby's 23 points lead Army over Colgate, 80-61, and fast-breaking Navy beat Gettysburg, 59-42.

The Medford match begins at 2:30 p.m. while the Crater contest Saturday gets underway at 4 p.m. Admission price for the KU-Medford bout is 75 cents for adults and 50 cents for students. Coach DeLance Duncan's Pel muscibenders are fresh from a 21-19 decision over the Redmond Panthers last Saturday and a 45-10 clobbering they handed the Bend Lava Bears on Friday. The Redmond squad, rated one of the best in the state, gave the KU team the toughest battle they have had to date, the contest not being decided until the last bout of the afternoon when heavyweight John Hancock drew with his Redmond counterpart, thus giving the Pels the necessary two points. Bill Morgan and his Butte Valley Bulldogs trek to Happy Camp for an encounter on Friday then rest until the following weekend. The Tulake Honkers, under the guidance of coach Duane Payne, meet the Fort Jones quintet in a league hassle at Fort Jones Friday then return home to host the Malin Mustangs on Saturday night. The Modoc Union Braves will meet Big Valley at Alturas Friday then host Fall River Saturday night. The McCloud Loggers journey to Yreka for a match with the Miners on Friday night then tangle with Fall River at MacArthur on Saturday. The Dunsuir Tigers and the Weed Cougars mix at Weed Friday and on Saturday night the Tigers host Enterprise. ## NCAA Deals USC 2 Year Probation

CINCINNATI (AP)—The University of Southern California, which last year scored the first team triple in NCAA championship history, today was left with crack baseball, tennis and track squads that cannot defend their titles. And the USC swimming team, boasting Australian stars Murray Rose and Jon Henricks, is not eligible to challenge Michigan for the NCAA swimming championship because the NCAA Executive Council Wednesday night placed Southern Cal on two years' probation for violation of the NCAA athletic code. But in an earlier action on the first day of the 53rd annual convention, the NCAA gave new athletic life to football player Don Fuell, key figure in the Auburn recruiting scandal which culminated in NCAA probation for Auburn and Southern Conference disciplinary action which barred Fuell, an end, from participation in SEC athletics. In a ruling requested by Mississippi Southern College, the council said that Fuell would be eligible to compete in athletics at the Hattiesburg, Miss., school if he transferred from Auburn where he is now a third-semester student. This, in effect, gave Fuell a clean bill of health at any NCAA member school except those in the Southeastern Conference. Within a few hours after the ruling, it was announced at Hattiesburg that Fuell had entered Mississippi Southern. He already had been accepted for the winter term which began Tuesday. The Southern California action crept up on the 2,200 delegates like a Trojan horse. It had been expected that Southern Cal, already serving a two-year probation, would be restored to good graces. The previous two-year probation had been due to expire Nov. 13, 1958, and the official announcement that it had done so was expected by the NCAA. But the probationary period was quietly extended while the committee on infractions continued an investigation into "improper inducements" offered to prospective student-athletes. The names of the athletes, both currently members of the USC football team, were not disclosed because, as the council pointed out in the Fuell ruling, it is interested in penalizing institutions, not individuals. Over all, the university is barred from participating in 15 NCAA championship events and 28 cooperating events for the period of one year; from participation in any NCAA-controlled sports television appearances for two years, and it was stipulated additionally that any violation of NCAA requirements during the two-year period may be considered as cause for expulsion from the NCAA.

## Trojan Anguish Echoing

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Cries of anguish echoed today at the University of Southern California, soundly spanked by the NCAA for offering improper inducements to a pair of athletes. The two-year probationary period slapped on the university Wednesday bans the Trojans from the Rose Bowl next New Year's Day and prevents them from defending NCAA titles in track, tennis and baseball. The university declined to identify the two athletes who caused the penalty. However, a Trojan source admitted one was Ben Charles, a football quarterback from Lancaster, Pa., who will be a sophomore next season. Consensus of official reaction: Why didn't the NCAA tell us about the infractions so we could have taken action? "I'm astonished that the NCAA reached its conclusion without previously presenting the university with a complete copy of all evidence and without interviewing supposed offenders," said University President Dr. Norman Topping. Athletic Director Jess Hill commented in Cincinnati: "I am deeply disappointed in that certain new information and evidence came to the attention of USC just (Tuesday) morning. He did not have an opportunity to investigate this information." However, Hill said neither he nor the university denies the accusations.

## SF Giant Stock Pays Dividend

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The San Francisco Giants paid a \$20 dividend on each unit share of stock following its first season here. Club treasurer Edgar P. Feeley of New York said Wednesday the dividend was declared Nov. 26 by directors of the National Exposition Co., the corporate owner of the club, and was made payable last Monday. The dividend included \$2 on preferred stock and \$18 on common stock.

# Pelicans Wrap-up Drills Ready For Comet Invasion

Four days of grinding practices with special emphasis placed on the details of man to man defense came to a halt on Pelican Court this afternoon as coach Dear White ran his squad through a final wind sprint session in preparation for their Saturday match with the Crater Comets; the third Southern Oregon Conference start for the Klamath Union Pelicans cagers. "Both our defense and offense seem to be 'gelling' since the Medford game," observed White, while his club steamed into the showers. "The kids really started to look good on defense in the Medford game—sure we had some lapses—but from the over-all game standpoint they made some really good defensive moves," he continued. White's original plan to use the same starting five as in the Medford game; Bob Peterson, Bob Lewis, Jim Hall, Dean Dunsen and Don DeLap, with Bob Drape and Dave DeLap slated for heavy duty in support of the first five, may face revision before game time. Don DeLap, although he has been on the court each afternoon in a sweat suit, has been held out of scrimmages or running per doctor's orders pending the termination of a bad cough, thus making him a very doubtful quantity for Saturday action. Another worry plaguing White is the condition of one of the state's top rebounders, Peterson. The 6-4 backboard man missed the Wednesday afternoon session because of a bad sore throat although he returned to school today. He, like Dave DeLap, who is injured a hand Wednesday, may be forced to see limited work in the Saturday fray. The balance of the squad has sped through heavy scrimmages each day this week with extra rebounding and freethrow shooting drills thrown in. "Perhaps a day of rest on Friday will give our missing 'horses' a chance to recuperate—we may need them," commented White. He added, "The units that work together the best, in games, that is, are becoming more definite—so when anyone is missing we feel it."

The probable Comet starting lineup will be chosen from 6-4 center, Bill White, forwards Chuck Turner, 6-0, and John Burns, 6-1, and guards Loyal Higinbotham, 5-9 and Dennis Platt, 5-10. Another, Jim Eldred, 5-10, who recently moved up from the Comet JV squad and got off to a good start, is capable of moving into either an open guard or forward slot.
