

# Irish Policy Switch Omits Brennan Type

NEW YORK (NEA) — Criticize the University of Notre Dame? You might as well knock orphanages, a steady job, the Red Cross, motherhood, the public library, the cop at the school crossing and soup kitchens for the destitute.

But each fall, Notre Dame walks into the arena of public opinion with publicity men, business managers and fund raisers preceding 40 or so jerseyed kids who play football before 585,000 people on 19 Saturday afternoons.

They are acclaimed by sportsmen who read sports papers and issues never been within 1,000 miles of the South Bend campus.

This time around, the people running the school's athletic program would prefer that a decision to fire Terry Brennan as head coach and replace him with Joe Kuharich be in the nature of a private situation.

But it does not work out that way. For when you examine the situation, strip away the platitudes and the lore, you find Notre Dame wants to win football games the same as Michigan State or Tennessee or Auburn, any place else where the sport is a high-pressure business.

Five years ago, the win-it-all ways of Frank Leahy became too hot for the people in South Bend and young Brennan was brought in. He was the kind of coach who fitted in perfectly at a Notre Dame which was interested in keeping football where it belongs.

Quiet, and with a lawyer's ability to speak the language, Terry's main interest was in the boys under him. A third-stringer wouldn't be putting out on the practice field, so Terry would drop him from the traveling squad for the next trip. It was the right thing to do, but the coach would be walking around afraid he had just hurt a boy. At the first opportunity, he'd put the lad back on the squad.

"Things like that were on his mind," a Notre Dame man tells you. "They were more important to him than any all-winning record or what have you. In the end, that was his trouble."

"He was dead honest. He told the school he couldn't win with the schedule they gave him as long as he stayed close to the rules and didn't have extra practice sessions and secret tryouts of prospects like most other big-time coaches."

"He flatly refused to resign. At the end of November he made it clear they would have to fire him. He thought he was doing exactly what had been asked of him. They wanted football on a proper level. That's what he gave them."

So Brennan wound up sitting in his living room, with a Christmas tree in one corner, four kids spread around the rest of the place — and the telephone ringing and people asking him why he was fired.

There was no outside influence. Brennan was fired directly by the three priests and two lay members of the athletic board.

Kuharich, who came out of a South Bend high school to be a tough-nosed guard for Notre Dame in 1935-37, is used to the professionals. As the Washington Redskins' coach, he never worried about dropping a guy from the squad.

This is no rap at Joe Kuharich. His job depended on keeping the right players and winning.

Every indication is that his Notre Dame position is on the same plane. The Irish just want to win and to do it they have to change policy.

Terry Brennan, who did what was wanted and was fired during Christmas week, found this out.

LOS ANGELES — California's Denny Fitzpatrick holds the scoring lead, while Rafer Johnson of UCLA is the top marksman after one weekend of Pacific Coast Conference basketball play, according to statistics released today.

The figures distributed by the office of the PCC acting commissioner, Bernie Hammerbeck, included games through Saturday, January 3, and showed Fitzpatrick with 14 field goals and 10 free throws for 33 points and an average of 19 per game. Stu Roberts, Oregon, has averaged 16, followed by Paul Neumann, Stanford, 14.5; Jim White, Southern California, 14, and Lee Harman, Oregon State, also 14.

Johnson, who was able to participate in only one game, scored on all six of his field goal tries for a perfect 100 per cent. Duane Ranniger, Washington State, was second, 55.6 per cent, followed by Fitzpatrick, 54 per cent and Dick Haza, Stanford, 51.1 per cent. For UCLA, it was Jim Hama, Southern Cal, all 50 per cent.

Two men have perfect marks from the free throw line, both having hit four for four. They are Steve Kemp, Southern California, and Butch Kimpston, Oregon. Ranniger is next with 11 out of 12 for 91.8 per cent, followed by Neumann, 87.5 per cent, Robertson, 85.8 per cent, and Fitzpatrick, 83.3 per cent.

Robertson is the No. 1 rebounder, having snared 14.7 per cent of all rebounds in his games (26 recoveries in 177 total opportunities). Darrell Imhoff, California, is rebounding 13.1 per cent, followed by Hama, 12.2 per cent, Karl Anderson, OSC, also 12.2 per cent, Walt Torrence, UCLA, 11.8 per cent and Doug Smart, Washington, 11.5 per cent.

Rounding out the top 10 in scoring are Torrence, Bill Bloom, Southern Cal, and Frank Reed, WSC, all with 13.5 point game averages; Hanna 12.5, and Chuck Rask, Oregon, and Dick Hank, Stanford, both 12.

# Marchetti Leads AP Voting For NFL All-Pro Footballers

Gino Marchetti, Baltimore's defensive end, led the voting for The Associated Press' 1958 National Football League's all-pro team, dominated by the champion Colts and the New York Giants.

Marchetti, an eight-year veteran from the University of San Francisco, was the only unanimous choice among the 41 writers who covered the NFL campaign this season. The 6-4, 240-pounder was one of six Colts named to the two units, one more than the Giants.

Johnny Unitas, the great quarterback; offensive end Ray Berry; offensive tackle Jim Parker; defensive tackle Gene Lipscomb and fleet halfback Lenny Moore were the other Colts named.

Linebacker Sam Huff led the five Giants named to the all-pro squad. The others were offensive tackle Rosey Brown, center Ray White, defensive end Andy Robustelli and safetyman Jimmy Patton.

Los Angeles placed three men on offense, guard Duane Putnam, end Del Shofner and halfback Jon Arnett.

Pittsburgh placed two, defensive tackle Ernie Stautner and defensive halfback Jack Butler.

Detroit's Lions also won two places on the all-star squad — line-backer Joe Schmidt and defensive halfback Dale Gribble. Cleveland's sole representative was Jimmy Brown, who received all but two of the votes for fullback. Green Bay's honored player was safety Bobby Dillon while middle guard Bill George was the Chicago Bears' man. Offensive guard Dick Stanfel made it for Washington.

Philadelphia, San Francisco and the Chicago Cardinals were not represented.

Unitas, who received all but one of the 41 votes, made the team for the first time. In the championship game with the Giants, he completed 26 of 40 passes for 349 yards, an NFL playoff record. The Louisville alumnus established a record by tossing a touchdown in 23 consecutive league games. He added another TD in the playoff contest.

Moore, recipient of many of Unitas' passes, was also one of the top ground gainers in the league. His tremendous speed and deceptive power made him a perfect target for the great Baltimore passer.

Arnett, the great broken field runner from USC, and Brown, who wiped out Steve Van Buren's season ground gaining record with 1,327 rushing yards, completed the offensive backfield.

Brown, Putnam and Stanfel, all veterans, are repeaters from last year's team.

Schmidt and George, a pair of veteran line backer-uppers, were members of last year's team, too. In the defensive backfield, Dillon, Lary and Butler made the team for the third straight year.

# Jim Brown Collects UPI Title

NEW YORK (UPI)—Jim Brown of the Cleveland Browns, possibly the most powerful runner in National Football League history, today was named the professional circuit's "Player of the Year" for 1958 in the annual United Press international poll.

Brown, a 230-pounder who runs through the line with a fullback's power and in the open with a NFL rushing record of 1,327 yards in 1958. He led the league in scoring with 108 points. His 18 touchdowns included scoring runs of 65, 60, 59, 58, 52, 41 and 39 yards.

This performance against football's smartest and toughest defenses earned him 21 of the 29 votes cast by sports writers who covered the campaign in the 11 league cities.

John Unitas, quarterback for the champion Baltimore Colts, was second in the voting with five votes. Bobby Layne, Pittsburgh Steeler quarterback, was third with two. The other vote went to Del Shofner, speedy offensive end for the Los Angeles Rams.

Brown won the NFL rushing crown with 942 yards during his first professional campaign in 1957 and won "Rookie of the Year" honors by a landslide vote for that performance.

In 1958, the former Syracuse All-American showed that his brilliant 1957 showing was merely a warmup. During the past season he shattered the old NFL rushing mark of 1,146 yards set by Steve Van Buren of the Philadelphia Eagles in 1949 by 381 yards.

Brown carried the ball 257 times in 1958, averaging 127 yards per game and 5.9 per carry. His 16 touchdowns tied the season record set by Van Buren in 1945.

Jim set an all-time rushing mark although the New York Giants and other clubs discovered midway in the 1958 campaign that they could concentrate on stopping him because Cleveland's passing attack was not top-notch by professional standards.

Under the five-point system, Judge Harold Marovitz favored Mims 47-48, Judge Jim McManus and Referee Joey White each had Brown on top 47-44. The Associated Press gave it to Boyd 47-46.

Boyd had a weight pull of 160 1/2 pounds to 155 1/2. The victory left him with a 52-10-3 record. Mims is 45-17-8.

The turnout of 1,519 fans contributed a net gate of \$1,646.

This Baylor is Elgin Baylor, the sensational "freshman" with the pro Minneapolis Lakers of the National Basketball Assn.

Big Elg, an All America player last year with Seattle University, will be performing for the biggest crowd ever to watch him in Seattle. The game is booked for the University of Washington pavilion and it was a sellout the first week tickets were offered.

The sponsoring Greater Seattle, Inc., says there actually are a few seats left. Behind spots. The game will be televised (KING-TV).

Baylor seldom was seen by more than 6,000 people in his Seattle performances. S.U. plays its home games in the Civic Auditorium, which limited the crowds. Nearly 12,000 can be squeezed into the University of Washington pavilion.

The Celtics and Lakers will tangle Sunday in San Francisco and then hop to Seattle for the Monday game. Both are regular league tussles.

The Celts, who have Bob Cousy and Bill Russell among their collection of stars, whipped the Lakers in Boston Monday night 118-106 in spite of 30 points collected by Baylor.

Los Angeles newspapers are burned up because Rafer Johnson, the world decathlon champion, failed to get the nod over Glenn Davis, the 400-meter man, for the Sullivan award.

HILLSDALE DISPLACES Hillsdale, after winning two stakes events including one over Round Table at Santa Anita, has displaced Silky Sullivan as second choice in the odds from Caliente in the wagering for the Santa Anita Handicap future book.

Round Table, of course, is first at 7-5. Hillsdale is 6-1 and Silky has gone up to 9-1.

# Today's Sport Parade Home Court Theory Qualified By Coach

NEW YORK (UPI)—It is a generally accepted theory in college basketball that playing on its own court is worth 10 points to the home team.

Why? Publicly the coaches will tell you that this is due to strange playing conditions.

Privately they blame it on "home officials" and the "disturbing manner in which visiting teams are treated."

Ken Norton of Manhattan made a strange analysis of a game his team played at Philadelphia against LaSalle.

"We scored 28 field goals to their 23. We obtained 49 rebounds to their 45," he explained in summing up what should be the two deciding factors in the game.

"But," he added with a bitter smile, "49 fouls were called against us and only 27 against them."

Norton's teams, he admits, haven't won a game in Philadelphia since 1951 and it may be labeled an acknowledged fact that in that period he has had some (ine, ably coached teams. But he hurries into the usual platitudes by observing:

"Of course the backboards and the rims rebound differently on a strange court," Norton placates, "and then you also have the factor of different lighting."

"But Don Kennedy of St. Peter's takes no such pious view.

"Let's face it," he says abruptly. "When you go onto a strange court you have to consider the officials. The odds are that those officials are going to work five or six games for the home coach during the season. He'll only see you 'once. Well, he has to please the home coaches or he doesn't work. It's that simple."

That's as close as any of them will come to an out and out statement that there are too many "homers" among the officials who go out to work a game with the private intention of giving the home team the edge on critical calls.

"And," says one coach who represents the visiting team, "the home coach will be on the court with the referees. I think that the officials on the whole are honest and trying to do a job but those screams drive them into mistakes of judgment."

Which produces the theory that playing at home is worth 10 points to the host team. And small wonder why.
