Russ Rocket May Return

MOSCOW (UPI) —The Soviet cosmic rocket theoretically should return to the earth in 154 years, but influences on its orbit around the sun probably will prevent this happening, a Soviet scientist said today.

The Tass News Agency quoted scientist A. Sternfeld, an astronautics expert, in an interview published in today's Soviet newspapers.

"The first artificial planet should theoretically return to its starting place and meet the earth after 125 revolutions around the sun," Sternfeld said. "This should

occur early in 2112 but changes of the orbit of the space rocket under the influence of the moon and the planets preclude the possibility of a collision between the tenth planet and the earth."

Sternfeld has carried out calculations based on the 450 earth days it will take the rocket to orbit around the sun, Tass said. "Both cosmic bodies will pass within a certain minimum distance from each other," Tass said. "In the next few decades the new planet will be closest to the earth early in 1975. But even then it will be 15 million kilometers (9.3 million miles) away from the earth."

Tass said that although the rocket will return to its own starting point at the end of its first 450 days in orbit the earth will have moved elsewhere in its own orbit by then. It said the rocket then will be further from the earth than the earth is from the sun.

"It will return every time to the area of its start and sooner or later may meet the earth at this point," it said.

Strike Still Idles Mills

ROSEBURG (AP) — A strike which has idled two southern Oregon mills in a dispute over how many employees should wear safety glasses is entering its second week.

Thursday, federal conciliator Roy Smith met with Martin Bros. Container and Timber Product Corp. representatives and Lumber and Sawmill Workers Local 2814 officials. There was no immediate indication of progress.

The conflict stems from the firm's requirement that all employees wear safety glasses. The union says that only those in dangerous jobs should be required to wear them.

Earlier Thursday, the union filed a charge with the National Labor Relations Board saying the firm had refused to bargain collectively.

Ray Martin, the company manager, said the union workers were striking illegally, and that the picketing—24 hours a day—was in violation of the union's contract with the firm.

The union said 580 workers at the firm's Sutherlin and Oakland plants have been idled.

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP) — A lady pharmacist with a strong throwing arm routed two gunmen Thursday night with a barrage of bottles.

Mrs. Marian Buckmaster ducked behind a counter when the bandits tried to hold up cashier Marlene Hair, 21, on the other side of the drug store.

She opened her attack with a pint of iodine. The bottle hit one man on the side of the head and broke. The gun in his hand discharged, sending a bullet into Miss Hair's toe.

Mrs. Buckmaster executed a flanking maneuver behind the cover of her counter, popped up and hurled a quart bottle of cough syrup. It smashed on the counter next to the gunmen, drenching them.

Bowling Alley Request Made

LAKEVIEW — Application for a permit to build a 12-lane bowling alley in Lakeview was made by Louis C. Ackerman and Willard Livermore of Crescent City at the first meeting of the Lakeview Town Council on Tuesday evening, January 6.

The building, to be constructed by the Lakeview Building Material Company, will be located on Fourth Street, North, west of the Bureau of Land Management Building. Ground has already been broken in anticipation of a 74 by 140 foot pumice block construction, at an approximate cost of \$70,000. Ackerman and Livermore will also operate the anticipated 12 modern lanes which will have subway ball returns. There will also be a snack bar, nursery and locker rooms.

The entire outlay may approximate \$150,000 and plans are to have it completed and in operation by July 1.

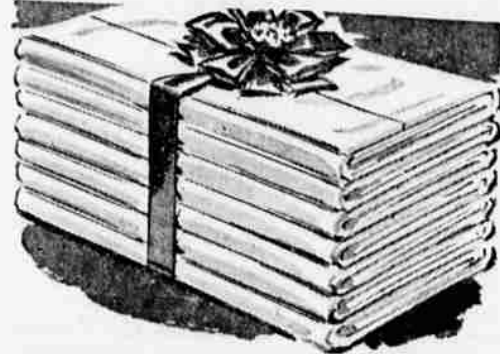

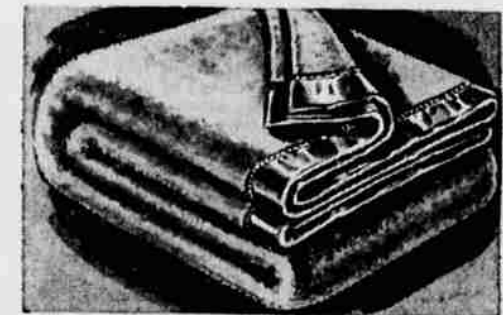
