# Johns-Manville Becomes Top Competitor In Glass Industry With Acquisition Of Libbey-Owens-Ford Fibers Company

NEW YORK (Special) — Johns-Manville became a major competitor in the expanding, nationwide fiber glass industry today, as details of its acquisition of L.O.F. Glass Fibers Company were completed, and immediately began studying needs for an expansion program.

Transfer of all assets and the going business of the Toledo, Ohio, firm, second largest in the fiber glass industry in point of annual sales, to newly-organized Johns-Manville Fiber Glass Inc., a wholly-owned subsidiary of Johns-Manville Corporation, has been accomplished, it was announced at the close of business today by A. R. Fisher, chairman and chief executive officer.

Johns-Manville Fiber Glass Inc., has taken over management of seven fiber glass plants and a Fiber Glass Research and Technical Center at Waterville, Ohio, formerly operated by L.O.F. Glass Fibers Company. Individual plants are located at Parkersburg, West Virginia; Houston, Texas; Corona, California; and at Waterville, Ohio, near the Research and Technical Center. Three plants are at Defiance, Ohio.

R. H. Barnard has been elected president of Johns-Manville Fiber Glass Inc., the same post he held with L.O.F. Glass Fibers Company. Francis H. May has been elected vice president and general manager. The new J-M fiber glass organization begins 1959 business as the tenth operating division of Johns-Manville. Division general offices are located at Toledo.

The new J-M Fiber Glass Division is continuing the manufacture of fiber glass products previously marketed by L.O.F. Glass Fibers Company. In general these include yarns, bonded mat, insulations, translucent plastic panels reinforced with fiber glass and combinations of these with other products and materials. Current J-M fiber glass sales are at the rate of 26 million dollars a year, in addition to normal Johns-Manville sales of more than 300 million dollars annually.
