

Pro Bowl To Match Top Gridders Of NFL

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Irresistible force meets irresistible foe Sunday when the best of the National Football League's doughty professionals clash in the ninth annual Pro Bowl.

Upward of 60,000 fans are expected for the nationally televised football classic at Memorial Coliseum. Kickoff is at 1:30 p.m. (PST).

The underdog Eastern corps, spearheaded by quarterback Norm Van Brocklin of the Philadelphia Eagles, will be

shooting for its first victory since a 31-30 triumph three years ago. The West has won five of the eight battles, including the last two.

Quarterback Johnny Unitas of the world champion Baltimore Colts is helmsman for the West. He's backed up by Billy Wade of the Los Angeles Rams.

The West has two backfield units that Coach Weeb Ewbank says any coach in the NFL would give his upper plate for.

Running with Unitas are teammates Lenny Moore and Alan Ameche and Jon Arnett of the Los Angeles Rams.

Wade's unit is rounded out with Willie Galimore and Rick Casares of the Chicago Bears and Hugh McElhenny of the San Francisco 49ers.

The East, too, is loaded with backfield talent.

Along with the long-passing Van Brocklin, Coach Jim Lee Howell plans to open with Frank Gifford and Alex Webster of the New York Giants and Jim Brown, Cleveland Browns smashing fullback.

In reserve, Howell has Eddie LeBaron, the Washington Redskins sleight-of-hand quarterback, Tom Tracy of the Pittsburgh Steelers and Philadelphia's Tommy McDonald, a swift, pass-catching fullback.

"The toughest job I have is deciding who'll start," said Howell, coach of the Eastern champion New York Giants.

Ewbank, of the world champion Colts, said he ignored the problem by telling his squad:

"The first 11 who get dressed Sunday will start."

Madras Tumbles Lakeview

MADRAS—The Lakeview Honkers dropped their second conference start in as many nights as they bowed to the Madras White Buffaloes, 44-26, here Saturday night. Friday night the Honkers were tripped by almost the same score by the Buggs, 45-28.

Coach Howard Hopper's Honker squad made a game of it for the first half of the Saturday test but a complete lack of aim from the floor in the second half put them on ice.

The first period ended 17-12 for Madras and the intermission count read 27-18. By the end of the third stanza the Buffs were out front 40-20.

Joe Piedmont and Dick Willens were the high-pointers with 10 each. Jerry Parkinson topped the Honkers with seven points. Lakeview hit only eight of 67 tries from the field.

Friday night the Honkers fell before the onslaughts of the Buffaloes, 45-28, to start off their conference season with a black mark. A rough, low-scoring match, the game saw Madras pull slowly out to a first quarter lead then maintain the pace to end the half on the tail end of a 20-11 count.

In the third stanza the Honkers got moving and pulled to within four points of Madras, 30-26, but then the bottom fell out again as the Buffaloes scored the next bucket and the frame ended 32-26.

The Lakeview quint notched only two points in the last quarter while the Madras five picked up 13. High scorer for the game was Madras center Joe Piedmont who collected 15. Honker highpointer was center Len Hale with 7.

In the JV match the Honkers pulled out a squeaker; 37-35 in the second overtime. Saturday night the Lakeview B's won 34-27.

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Vossler, Bolt Top Rich Open

TIJUANA, Mexico (AP)—Tommy Bolt shot his second straight 67 and Texas' Ernie Vossler equaled a course record with 65 Saturday to share the lead at 134 at the midway mark of the \$20,000 Tijuana Open Golf Tournament.

The 39-year-old Bolt played a near-flawless round with a 34-33 for the par 36-72 Tijuana Country Club, while Vossler, 30, from Midland, Tex., made it in 33-32.

In second place going into the third round Sunday was John McMullin of Alameda, Calif., who was tied for the first-round lead with Jerry Barber of Los Angeles. Each had 66s Friday. McMullin added a 69 for 135 Saturday.

Tied at 136 were Mike Fitchick with a 66, and Jay Hebert and former national Open champion Jack Fleck, each with 67s.

Three strokes off the pace were Barber, with a 71 for 137, Bob Duden of Oswego, Ore., 67, and George Bayer of Lemont, Ill., 71. Masters champion Arnold Palmer, was tied at 138 with Ralph Blomquist of Glendale, Calif.

Delegates to the 53rd annual NCAA convention Friday approved an amendment to the by-laws which gave the Council the right to grant exceptions to the service academies in the matter of providing advance tutoring.

The Council acted Saturday in closing sessions of the convention. Under the West Point program, prospective cadets may be given six weeks of tutoring at Bradens' School at Cornell-on-Hudson, N.Y.

The instruction would come during May and June prior to the June entrance examinations for the academy.

Cost of the tutoring will be paid by the Delafield Foundation, a group of former West Point staff members.

The U.S. Naval Academy indicated it would not seek an exception in order to be allowed to provide advance tutoring. Navy has had a year-long pre-school preparatory program which is not allowed under regulations of the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference.

There was no word as to whether the new Air Force Academy would seek an exception. It now has no pre-school prep program.

The Council also received a telegram from the University of Southern California asking for a reconsideration of the two-year probation slapped on USC earlier in the week for violations of the NCAA code in recruiting athletes. No action was taken on it.

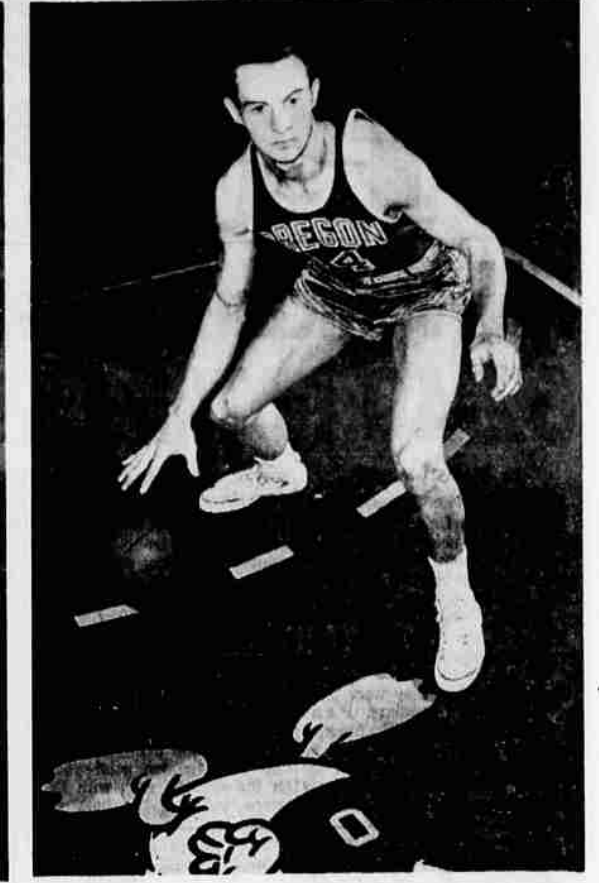

Yreka Miners Blast Loggers

The McCloud Loggers took the long trip to Yreka Friday night and were dealt a 72-44 trouncing for their troubles, by the fast moving Yreka Miners.

The Miners, who hold a win over the Grants Pass Cavemen, took advantage of superior height and bounded away to 26-8 first quarter lead and then never looked back.

Miner Allan Eddy, a 6-5 junior, drilled the twine to the tune of 22 tallies to lead all the scoring of the night. Teammate Glen Wilson, 6-7, collected 17 to place second while Mel Bonneville did his best for the Loggers with 16.

The halftime count was 44-24 for the Miners and they moved out to a 57-34 bulge at the end of the third.

The McCloud quint outshot the Miners only at the foul line, hitting a torrid 80 per cent of their shots against 500 for Yreka.

Playing in the first of three tilts without an Australian in the entire list, the 18-year-old son of a St. Louis professional easily trounced Louis Arrila of Spain in the junior final 6-4, 6-2.

Sunday he faces another Spaniard and a tougher one, Andres Gimeno, for the men's championship. Based on his slashing play against Arrila and Gimeno's lackluster performance in the doubles, Buchholz was conceded a good chance to take the first Australian state title an American has won in years.

In the doubles the Swedish pair of Ulf Schmidt and Jun Erik Lundquist played powerful attacking tennis to crush Gimeno and Arrila 6-3, 6-4, 6-4.

Buchholz previously had won the Wimbledon, French and U.S. junior titles and hopes to add the Australian one when the Aussie nationals open at Adelaide next Thursday.
