

Villanova, Boston U. Suffer First Defeats

This has been a tough basketball season, indeed, for the big-wigs of college basketball and Saturday there were just two major unbeaten teams in the country—Auburn and St. Bonaventure.

Friday night Villanova and Boston University met their masters for the first time.

Villanova, which had run up eight victories without a loss, fell before its city rival St. Joseph's, 82-70, in Philadelphia, and Boston U., which showed a 6-0 mark was ambushed by George Washington, 78-69.

So now it's Auburn (9-0) and St. Bonaventure (6-0) holding down the fort in the exclusive undefeated club. Both figure to extend their streaks tonight when St. Bonaventure meets St. Vincent of Pennsylvania, and Auburn goes against Florida in a Southeastern Conference game.

Minnow Use Turned Down At Meeting

PORTLAND (AP) — The only major change in tentative 1959 fishing regulations approved Saturday by the Oregon Game Commission will extend the winter steelhead season in five coastal streams to March 31.

The final rules will be adopted following a second public hearing here Jan. 23.

Fishing would be allowed through March 31 in Coquille, Nehalem, Salmon and Sixes rivers and Ten Mile Creek, in addition to the Wilson and Alsea rivers, where the late closing date has prevailed for the past two years. The proposal was submitted by the Bandon Fish and Game Club.

The commission turned down proposals for the use of live bait. Anthony Deedler of Klamath Falls presented a petition signed by 400 persons at the commission's hearing here Friday, asking that live minnows be legalized as bait in several southern Oregon streams.

The Dalles Rod and Gun Club asked that live bait be legalized for fishing in the Columbia River and its sloughs. Both requests were denied.

Tentative trout season dates approved by the commission: April 25 to Oct. 31—General, except for zones 1, 2 and 4.

May 30 to Oct. 1—Streams in zone 1, along the coast.

May 30 to Oct. 18—Reservoirs and tributaries in the national forests in the Cascades.

May 30 to Oct. 3—East and Paulina Lakes near Bend.

May 30 to Oct. 4—Rogue River.

May 30 to Oct. 31—Umpqua River.

When Tommy heard the request, he rolled in the aisle with laughter. If the PGA refused to rescind the rules, the General offered to do Tommy's club-throwing and swearing. However, the two men never got together.

PROS TURN COMMUTER Many of the touring golf professionals are staying on the U.S. side of the border during this tournament and commuting. They are slightly apprehensive after riots here 10 days ago in which thousands participated.

Trojans Beaten; Cal Wins

Southern California's Trojans fell from the undefeated ranks in the Pacific Coast Conference basketball race Friday night.

Oregon State, which bowed to the Trojans in Corvallis, turned on them in Los Angeles and gained a 61-53 victory.

In other games UCLA beat Washington State in Los Angeles, 68-41. California defeated Washington, 55-44, at Berkeley, and Stanford socked Idaho at Stanford, 50-36.

Saturday night's action shaped up this way: Washington State vs. Southern California at Los Angeles; Oregon State vs. UCLA at Los Angeles; California vs. Idaho at Berkeley; Washington vs. Stanford at Stanford.

Southern California had won its first two games and was favored to beat the Beavers Friday night, but coach Slats Gil started a soph forward, Jim Woodland of San Francisco, and he came through brilliantly with 19 points.

The Trojans shot in to a 39-28 halftime lead and the Trojans never could catch up. It was Gil's 500th basketball victory in his 31-year coaching career.

California, defending conference champion, clamped a tight defense on Washington's tall Bruno Boin and Doug Smart. Boin was held to eight points and Smart got to eight points and Smart got to eight points.

The Huskies were the pre-season favorite for the PCC title, but California has now beaten them twice.
