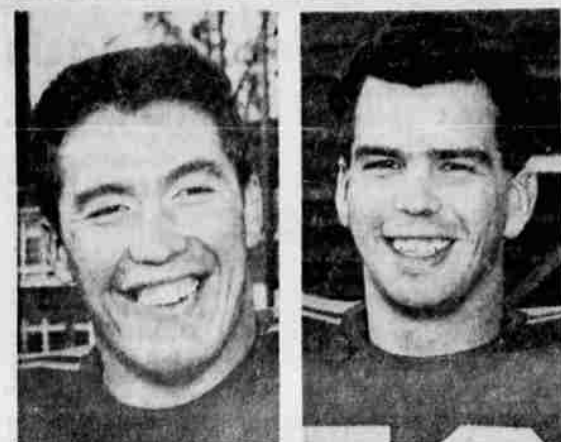

Auburn Cagers Roll Up 21 Straight Wins

Except for the NCAA, no one is stopping Auburn these days as its football and basketball teams continue rolling up concurrent streaks unmatched in collegiate history.
Plenty of football teams have had longer unbeaten streaks than Auburn's 24. A bundle of basketballers have won more than 21 in a row, the current status of Auburn's winning streak.
But no one has ever dominated both major sports at the same time the way the Tigers are now.
The basketball Tigers, who bagged their 10th straight of the season 63-54 over Florida Saturday night, and St. Bonaventure (8-0) of N.Y., are the only major unbeaten in college basketball today. The Tigers haven't lost since Alabama tripped them 83-65 about a year ago.
The football Tigers had a tie with Georgia Tech last fall but have whipped all 23 others they've met since losing to Florida in their sixth game of the 1956 season.
Both, however, have been shooting only for poll and conference recognition because the NCAA has tagged Auburn with probation through 1961 for football recruiting irregularities.
Swinging into another week of conference activity, here's the way the major races look:
SEC — Auburn (3-0) on top, with surprising Georgia (3-1) second after an 80-79 upset of Alabama last Saturday. Kentucky, top-ranked nationally, is 2-1 with Mississippi State.
Southwest — Texas Christian (3-0) the leader, with Arkansas and tied at 2-1. The five others, including the tournament champion Texas A&M, are 1-2.
Atlantic Coast — National powerhouse North Carolina State (5-0) and North Carolina (4-0) running one, Maryland trails at 4-2.
Missouri Valley — Cincinnati (3-0) leads second-place Bradley (2-1). Big Ten — Minnesota leading at 1-0 with five others, including Michigan State, tied at 1-0.
Southern — West Virginia (5-0) threatened by Virginia Tech (3-0).

Bob Cousy of the Boston Celtics is a tough man to stop — even when he's playing more than 3,000 miles from home.
The former Holy Cross College "magician" put on another of his patented clutch performances Sunday night in leading the Celtics to a 109-106 overtime victory over the Minneapolis Lakers here, 13,652 fans at San Francisco. It was the first National Basketball Association game played on the West Coast.
Cousy calmly dropped in two free throws in the final minute of regulation time to tie the score at 99-99. The Lakers grabbed the lead three times in the extra session before Frank Ramsey and Lou Tsioropoulos each connected on lay-ups to carry the Celtics to their 15th straight victory over Minneapolis.
Zill Russell of the Celtics, who was an All-American at the University of San Francisco, thrilled the home folks with a 4-point barrage during the first half but then cooled off and wound up with 17. Tom Heinsohn and Bill Sharmon each scored 26 for Boston.
In Sunday's other games, Bob Pettit set an NBA record for the season by scoring 50 points and leading St. Louis to a 111-100 victory over Detroit, the New York Knickerbockers beat the Philadelphia Warriors, 111-105, and Syracuse walloped Cincinnati 127-110.
Pettit scored 35 points in the second half, breaking his old Klamath Auditorium record of 29 set last year, and his game total of 50 points surpassed the previous high of 45 points in a single game this season set by Jack Wymann of Cincinnati and Gene Shue of Detroit.

Bob Cousy Leads Celts Over Lakers

Len Matthews, 20-year-old undefeated Philadelphia lightweight, meets Paulie Armistead, 21, a Los Angeles "comer," in a Friday fight at the Hollywood (Calif.) Legion Stadium.
Matthews has a 14-0-1 record. He stopped Ray Lancaster in Philadelphia, Dec. 22 in his last start. Armistead (23-4-1) was unbeaten in 11 fights until he dropped a decision to Johnny Gonsalves, Dec. 16.
The 10-round match will be carried on network radio and television any event, the bout packs more than usual interest in the United States.
Roque Maravilla, a young light heavyweight from Boise, Idaho, whose name has been making the rounds in recent months, gets a television shot on the Wednesday series against Sonny Ray of Chicago at the Chicago Stadium.

Bob Shaw and Henry Herrera each scored six to pace the KU freshmen win. The Klamath cagers failed to score a point in the third quarter, but held Ashland to three after leading at half-time 15-11.

PERTH, Australia (UPI)—Australian tennis observers were agreed today that when young Earl Buchholz of St. Louis learns to control his temper he may become one of the world's top amateurs.
The 18-year-old crewcut, who impressed Australian fans with his play here before the Davis Cup challenge round, had a chance for a sweep of the men's titles in the West Australian championships Sunday, but he let his temper get the best of him.
After winning the junior title on Saturday by beating Luis Arilla of Spain, Buchholz attempted to win the senior title in a match with another Spaniard—21-year-old Andres Gimeno. However, a combination of poor play, gusty winds and a flareup over debatable linecalls proved his undoing, 6-1, 6-4, 6-3.
