Guard Members Leave For Duty

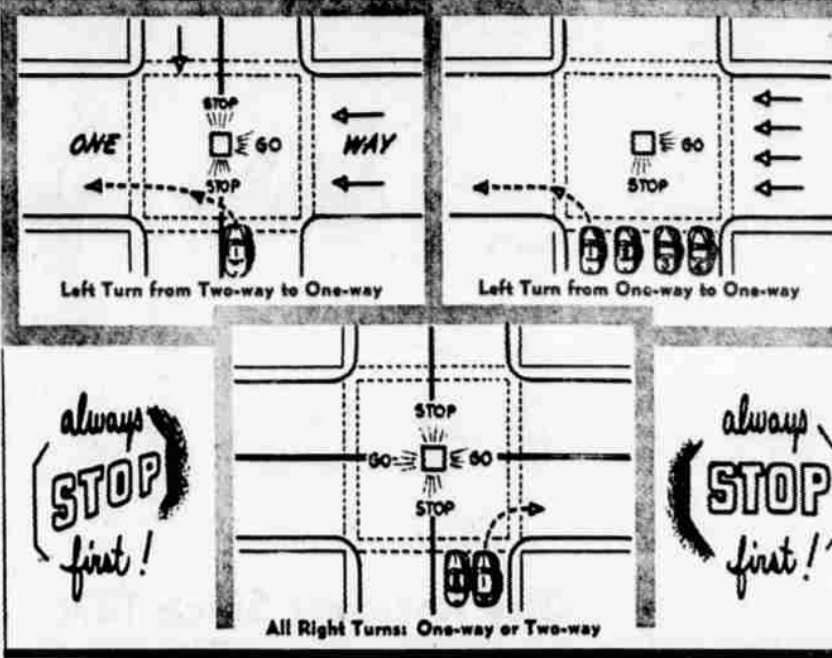
Two members of the Oregon National Guard left Saturday for Ft. Ord, California, where they will take six months of active duty training under the Armed Forces Reserve Act of 1955.

Car Windows Should Stay Open A Bit

Oregon drivers should remember to keep cars well ventilated, even in cold weather, the Department of Motor Vehicles said today. Failure to do so can result in carbon monoxide poisoning, which, in itself, can prove fatal and may be indirectly responsible for a number of traffic accidents each year for which no apparent reason can be found, other than driver inattention or "asleep at the wheel."

Department officials said one window should always be left slightly open when driving and, in heavy traffic, it's wise to turn off the air-intake blower whenever stopping directly behind another vehicle to prevent its exhaust fumes from being drawn into your car. Drivers also were reminded to open garage doors before starting cars. To "warm up" the engine in a closed garage is inviting an accumulation of the dangerous gas. Finally, car owners are reminded that the best way to prevent carbon monoxide from entering the car in excessive amounts is to make sure the exhaust system works properly.

Two Entries Reported By City Police

City police reported two cases of breaking and entering either Friday evening or early Saturday morning.

Kern called city police after 7 p.m. Friday to report that someone had broken in the back door of his home between 5:30 and 6:30 p.m. and taken the following items: some whiskey, a 12 gauge Stevens pump shotgun, a revolver, a radio, binoculars, flashlight, pen and pencil set, a socket wrench set, alarm clock, suitcase, bamboo fly rod and a sea rod, fly reel and a box of assorted men's jewelry. Investigation was continuing.

Tunnel Traps Three Workers

PORTLAND (AP)—Three workmen were trapped when a section of a tunnel at the Bull Run Dam caved in, but none of the three was critically injured.

The men were hit by rocks and debris when a 20-foot section of a new diversion tunnel under construction at the dam gave way about 400 feet from the mouth of the tunnel Saturday.

Most seriously injured was Milo Griffin, who had a leg fracture. Also injured were Gene Matt and Leo Heib. All three men are from Sandy.

PUC Delays Rate Boost

SALEM, Ore. (AP)—A big rate increase announced by Pacific Power and Light Co. has been suspended by Oregon Public Utilities Commissioner Howard Morgan.

Morgan said the firm wanted to boost rates greatly in monopoly areas to subsidize low rates in regions where it competes with public power agencies.

The six-month suspension was announced Saturday. Morgan said it will give time for a full investigation of the company.

Morgan bows out of office today, but Saturday he said he may order a similar suspension on similar rate increases announced by Portland General Electric Co.

PGE earlier had said it planned to raise Oregon rates an average 33.4 per cent.

Pacific Power and Light Co. had planned to boost its Oregon rates an average of 14.5 per cent Jan. 26. That would bring in more than three million dollars more a year.

In his order against PP&L, Morgan said: "In non-competitive areas, the company has proposed increases varying in percentages up to a maximum in excess of 33 per cent."
