SH Academy Slates Drive For Addition

The building of the proposed new addition to Sacred Heart Academy will be given impetus with the inauguration of a fund raising campaign to start the last week in January among members and residents of Sacred Heart Parish. Target date for completion of the drive for the \$210,000 addition has been set for early February.

Campaign chairmen, meeting this week, outlined plans to use an approximate 125 workers under captains to reach the goal as rapidly as possible.

The total money will build a 500-seat dual-purpose auditorium and visual education room with adequate stage, three additional high school classrooms, plus a fully equipped science room.

The addition of brick construction to blend with the present school structure will be erected on the corner of Washington and North Eighth streets to the rear of the present school.

Preliminary plans were drawn by the staff of Howard Perrin, Klamath Falls architect, and construction depends on the success of the drive according to those who spearhead it. It is hoped that the building can be completed and be ready for occupancy this year.

Triple Slayer Escapes Prison

BALTIMORE (AP) — William Boyd Gilliam, 45, who had served nearly 17 years for a triple killing and would have been eligible for parole next fall, walked away from a work detail just outside the penitentiary Wednesday.

Gilliam was sentenced to 38 years for the gun and knife slayings of two women and a man in Baltimore County in January, 1942. He contended the slayings occurred when the three tried to rob him.

Warden Vernon L. Peppersack said Gilliam, a trusty since May, 1956, would have been up for parole in October.

Sun Like Teenager Has Face Spots

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — The sun has the worst rash of black spots on its face since 1951.

Mt. Wilson Observatory has photographed the spots—huge magnetic storms on the sun's surface. These storms emit radiation which often upsets radio and telephone communications on earth.

The spots photographed last Friday extended 100,000 miles across the sun's face. In 1951 a 125,000-mile cluster was observed. The largest on record, extending 152,000 miles, was observed in 1947.

Snows Halt Road Work

FORT KLAMATH — In late December of 1958, snow and mud conditions forced postponement of a road building contract which had been underway since mid-November nine miles west of Fort Klamath. With only one mile of surfacing needed to finish the job of building and surfacing a four and one half mile main access road, Carl Fisher and Clyde Maupin, his foreman, were forced to wait until favorable conditions in the spring to complete the work.

The road has been built to a tract of timber in the Three Mile Creek area west of Fort Klamath, purchased last year by the Ellingson Lumber Company of Klamath Falls from the U.S. Forest Service. J. W. Fisher, logging contractor of Klamath Falls and Northern California, held the contract. Affiliated with Fisher in his logging operations and road building projects are his brothers Carl and Thomas and a cousin, Clyde Maupin. Thomas Fisher was here helping with the work during the latter part of December, having completed a logging contract which he superintended in Northern California near Redding. A seven man crew was also engaged in the local project.

Until bad weather set in after an unusually mild early winter, William Raymond, logging contractor of Klamath Falls, was engaged with his crew in cutting and hauling part of the eight million feet of pine and fir timber which comprise the Ellingson tract to the mill in Klamath Falls. William Wampler, Chilcoquin logging contractor, with his employees was engaged to haul logs cut along the right of way to the Ellingson mill, and had completed the work before bad road conditions forced a halt to the entire operation.

Heavy road building equipment had been brought up from Woodleaf, California, for the job and has been moved to Fort Klamath for storage until spring, when the remaining mile of the road will be surfaced and the contract finished.

LEGISLATIVE AUDITOR BILL

SALEM (AP) — Sen. Ben Misa (D-The Dalles) sponsored a bill today to create the position of legislative auditor.

He said the auditor would advise the Legislature on financial matters, showing where state expenses could be cut.

A similar bill by Musa failed to get out of the Ways and Means Committee last session.

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
