Study Groups Plan Review

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Some 400 neighborhood "study groups" throughout Oregon are slated to review state history and future goals in coming weeks in preparation for the Oregon Centennial.

Starting January 25, Oregon's 1959 Great Decisions discussion groups—open to the public—will begin a 10-week public affairs series with the first two weeks devoted to Oregon history and potential growth for the future.

Ways to boost Oregon's per capita income, now less than the national average, prospects for new industries, and community problems of industrial expansion, taxes, and education needs are among issues up for discussion.

Informal discussion groups will be armed with brief, information-packed "fact sheets" on Oregon resources and current problems. Forestry, agriculture, and Oregon's 400 million dollar annual export-import trade are among topics reviewed with an eye to the future. The illustrated fact sheets are "1959-1959... Building Today's Oregon," the introductory program featuring Oregon history; and "What Frontiers in Oregon's Future?" for the second week's discussion.

Information on how to organize neighborhood discussion groups and obtain study materials are available from county "Great Decisions" councils, reports state chairman Mrs. Mabel Mack, Oregon State College extension service. Details may also be obtained from local county extension agents.

The Oregon Centennial, coupled with requests last year from Oregon Great Decisions groups for "some Oregon issues," prompted the Oregon flavor in this year's public affairs discussion series, Mrs. Mack stated. Following discussion of Oregon issues, groups will continue an eight-week study of foreign policy issues with fact sheets prepared by the Foreign Policy Association, a nonprofit,

nonpartisan, educational agency. Oregon fact sheets were prepared by Oregon State College staff members in cooperation with state organizations and agencies and the FPA. Newspapers, television, and radio stations will also review the Oregon and foreign policy issues and the program is scheduled for many high school social studies classes.

Great Decisions is carried statewide through the OSC extension service in cooperation with the FPA, the general extension division of the state system of higher education, the state department of education, state library, and some 25 state organizations.
