U.S. Tells Breakthrough In Space, Missile Program

WASHINGTON (AP) — Government scientists have produced the first casting of molybdenum, a metallic element which has excellent strength at high temperatures.

The Interior Department described this as a major metallurgical breakthrough of importance to space and missile programs.

Marling J. Ankeny, director of the Bureau of Mines, said scientists at the agency's Albany, Ore., laboratory had produced a simple cylindrical molybdenum casting. He said the metallurgists now are trying to improve techniques so

intricate shapes can be created by the process.

He said such intricate items would advance the development of missiles, rockets and satellites, giving the missile engineer greater flexibility of design and a cheaper way to construct vital components.

The strength which molybdenum has at high temperatures is needed for certain applications in missile parts. The metal increases the hardness and strength of steel. But its high melting point — 4,748 degrees Fahrenheit — destroyed the crucibles used in earlier attempts to cast it. By comparison, pure iron melts at 2,795 degrees.

Here is how the casting was made:

Under remote-control conditions, a high-density electric arc was used to melt a 30-pound charge of molybdenum in a water-cooled, copper-lined melting pot.

The intensely hot material was poured through a series of troughs into a rotating graphite cylinder that forced the metal to the walls of the rotating mold. There the metal consolidated, froze and produced a hollow molybdenum cylinder 4½ inches wide and 8 inches long.

The United States has about 90 per cent of the world's known molybdenum reserves, most of it in Colorado, Utah, Arizona, California, New Mexico and Nevada.

DISPUTE LOOMS

SALEM (AP) — A dispute over closure of a state tuberculosis hospital loomed today with sponsorship of a bill by Rep. Katherine Musa (D-The Dalles) to close the tuberculosis hospital in Salem. She would retain the institution at The Dalles for tuberculosis treatment.

The Board of Control has recommended that the hospital at The Dalles be converted into a school for retarded children.

BOOST MEAT SUPPLY

LONDON (UPI) — Livestock expert Dr. John Hammond says Britain may be able to beef up its meat supply by producing more twin calves. Hammond has asked the Agriculture Ministry for a research grant to expand his experiments aimed at producing twins from cows by hormone injections.

Evangelist To Take Rest

ROCHESTER, Minn. (AP)—An eye ailment will force Billy Graham to take a month's rest and then curtail his future activities, says the evangelist's personal physician, Dr. Kenneth Gieser of Chicago.

Dr. Gieser said Wednesday night he and Mayo Clinic specialists had confirmed that Graham was suffering from a spastic swelling of blood vessels back of the retina of the left eye, cutting sight of that eye by about 50 per cent.

Grady Wilson, a Graham associate, said the minister would take the rest ordered by the doctors after remaining here the rest of this week for further examination and treatment.

Wilson said the evangelist was still planning on the Australian revival crusade, with its start set back to Feb. 15. Where Graham would spend the month's rest has not been decided.

Wilson said the Australian program probably would be shortened somewhat. He added that a complete report on Graham's physical condition was not expected until later this week.

McCarthy Estate Set At \$114,000

MADISON, Wis. (AP)—An estate of about \$114,000 was left by the late Sen. Joseph McCarthy (R-Wis.), who died May 2, 1957.

The value of the estate was figured by Richard Williams, head of the State Inheritance Tax Division, who based the figure on inheritance tax receipts filed by the senator's widow.

The senator's widow, Mrs. Jean Kerr McCarthy, was named McCarthy's sole beneficiary and executrix.

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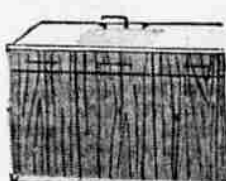
