

'Keep Pace' Principles Emphasized

Principles of the "Keep Pace With Tomorrow" program, a program announced by the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce and now well underway, were revealed today.

The program, generally, is to prepare for the business, industrial and civic future of the Klamath Basin by planning now to meet inevitable needs.

These are the major principles established by the chamber's board of directors:

1. Strengthen and expand the scope of the chamber to promote business, agricultural, industrial and civic interests.
2. Foster a more vigorous spirit of cooperation between Klamath Falls and the growing Klamath Basin it serves.
3. Learn, and incorporate into the program, future needs of retail and wholesale trade, agriculture, present and anticipated industries, transportation facilities, professional opportunities, education and cultural advantages, and civic betterment.
4. Make a chamber more fully adequate for leadership and enterprise.
5. More clearly establish the chamber of commerce as a clearing house for constructive thought and action.
6. Develop additional representative community leadership and strengthen chamber membership and finances.
7. Strengthen the chamber's committee system, and continue to keep members well informed about chamber activities.
8. Emphasize that investment in the chamber is profitable, not a gift or donation.
9. Encourage business, professional and other community leaders their responsibilities toward maximum leadership through the chamber of commerce.

Three new instructors are announced on the Oregon Technical Institute staff by W. D. Purvine, OTI director.

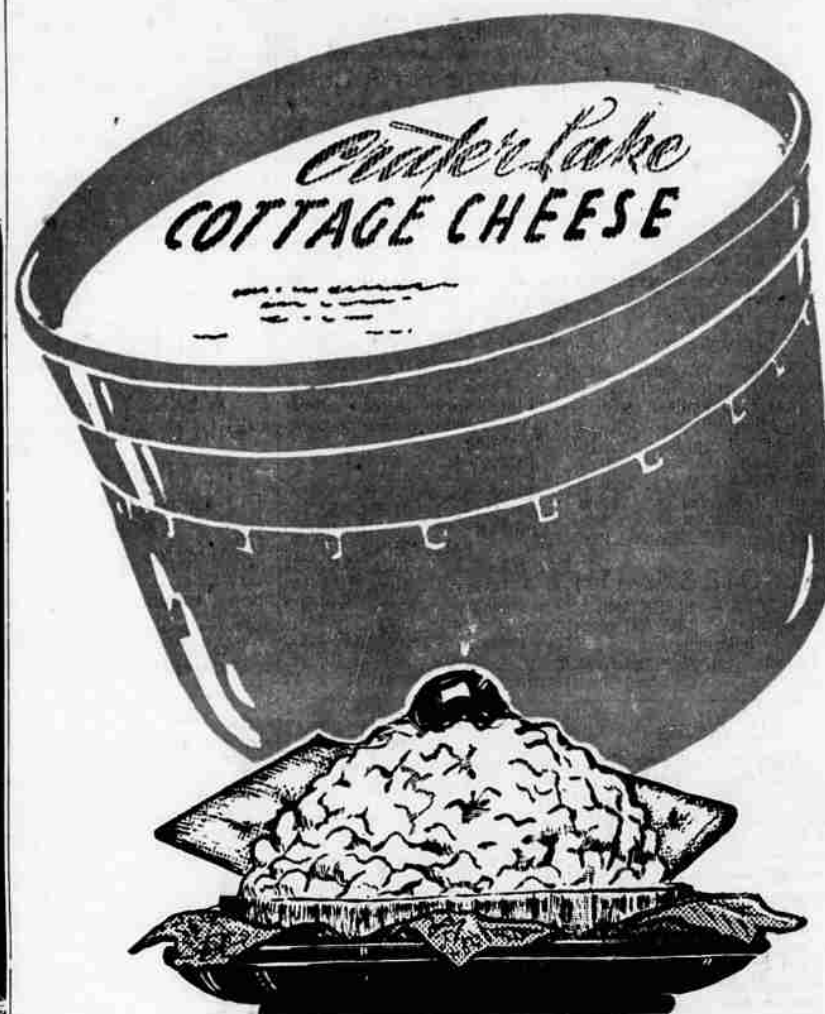
