

# NFL Schedules Draft Wednesday

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — The National Football League will complete its annual draft Wednesday and then buckle down to pleasing the players it already has under contract plus its growing host of fans.

The 12 NFL teams, representing the nation's fastest growing professional sport, recorded a record paid attendance of 3,006,124 for 72 regular season games in 1958.

The Baltimore Colts and New York Giants gave the 1959 turnstiles a big advance spin when they thrilled the nation's sports fans by playing the league's first

"sudden death" overtime in the Dec. 28 title game. This week the club owners will consider a proposal to add zip to their regular season contests—already thrilling enough to draw record crowds the past seven years.

Under this proposal, if a team scores and is more than seven points behind, it could choose to receive the next kickoff. The score — on team now has the choice of which team will kick or receive and practically always chooses to receive.

The owners probably won't adopt this drastic change. But if

they do, the trailing team would immediately go on the attack after a touchdown, producing even closer games and more fun for the fans.

NFL clubs completed the first four rounds of their annual draft of college stars early in December. They will run off the last Wednesday. The teams will pick in the order in which they finished the 1958 season with the poorest-record clubs leading off each round and the champion Colts selecting last each time.

Professional talent scouts don't expect to find much material for their demanding game after the season.

first six or seven rounds but sometimes they discover some pleasant surprises. John Unitas, Baltimore's crack quarterback, was picked ninth by the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1955, was released and playing semi-pro football when the Colts signed him. Rosey Brown, New York's All-League lineman, was selected 27th by the Giants in 1953 after they saw his name on an all-Negro all-America team.

Business sessions, involving player relations, rule changes and other matters, may take three days after Wednesday's draft session.

## Wall Takes Crosby Golf Tourney Win

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP)—Despite a \$5,000-victory in the Bing Crosby golf tournament, Art Wall Jr., may look up his pro golfing buddies for a little help.

The lean Pennsylvanian credits three colleagues for making him the year's leading money winner, but he didn't look that way Sunday on the final nine of the 72-hole extravaganza played over three courses.

Wall carded a final nine of 41 while Gene Littler was closing last. Only a shot hooked into the Pacific on the 18th removed the San Diego battler from contention.

He was nine down and in third place when the pair started the final eight holes. By the 18th he was only one down.

Littler came to the par five 540-yard hole with Wall anything but sharp. He had three-putted both the 16th and 17th.

But with a national television audience looking on Littler hooked his second shot into the ocean. He said he was not pressing, that he was trying for position for a good approach.

The TV program time ran out before the golfers patted but viewers must have known who would win.

Wall took a six and won with a 279 after shooting 34-41-75 for the day. Littler and Jimmy Demaret, who started the day in second place, tied for second with 281 and 27,150 apiece.

Wall won \$4,000 for the individual pro and \$2,000 for low pro-amateur score — 252 — with National Amateur champ Charles Coe. Littler added \$1,200 to his haul as he and Art Anderson of Hollywood finished third in the pro-am with 259.

The big haul gave Wall \$9,970 for three tournaments this year.

He said, however, he was worried about his recent bad finishes. He finished second at Los Angeles and tied for 12th at Tijuana.

He follows a pattern devised after work with fellow pros Don Ford, a \$1,250 money winner in the Crosby; Jay Hebert, who won \$712 and Mike Fetchick, who finished out of the money.

After that final 41 Sunday, he indicated he might seek more advice before the Palm Springs Thursday.

Finishing behind Littler and Demaret were Californians Bob Mullin of Palo Alto and John McMullin from Alameda with 283 good for \$1,500 each, Don January, Eastland, Tex., and Ford, from Crystal River, Fla., 285 for \$1,250 and Billy Maxwell, Odessa, Tex., and Lloyd Mangrum, Apple Valley, Calif., 286 for \$1,025.

Ford picked up an additional \$1,500 for finishing second in the pro-amateur with Art Anderson, Hollywood, Calif., in 257.

## Exams To Slow Down Week's Cage Play

A week of classroom exams for most of college basketball's mightiest could turn into a week of opportunity on the hardwood for a handful of others.

Half of the Associated Press' top 10, including the big four of North Carolina State, Kentucky, North Carolina and Kansas State, are idle at least until Jan. 26. While their backs are turned, opportunity beckons for the likes of Auburn, Cincinnati, Michigan State, St. John's (NH) and West Virginia and a trailer group that includes Mississippi State, St. Bonaventure, St. Louis, Oklahoma City, Seattle, Utah and Villanova, to name a few.

Despite the nation's longest major winning streak, now 22 games, Auburn still has been more or less overlooked in the national rankings. Fifth-ranked at present, the Tigers have games with Georgia Tech Wednesday and Georgia Saturday in which to try to catch the eye of the experts.

Cincinnati, St. John's, West Virginia, St. Louis, Seattle, Marquette and Oklahoma City — teams beaten early in the season but streaking now — have at least one game during the lull.

The same holds true for St. Bonaventure, the only other major unbeaten, once-beaten Mississippi State and Villanova, and rugged big conference clubs like Michigan State and Utah.

Michigan State bids to take over the Big Ten lead in games with Ohio State tonight and Minnesota Saturday. Villanova (11-1) also has a couple, with Drexel Wednesday and Providence Saturday.

On Friday, West Virginia, highly regarded despite three losses, goes against mighty Kentucky at Louisville, Utah's Skyline leaders, on a six-game streak in the last three weeks, face Brigham Young, and Seattle (12-2) plays Montana State.

The others have Saturday dates when full scale play begins to return: Cincinnati (10-2) against Xavier of Ohio in the national TV game, St. John's (11-1) and eight in a row against St. Francis (NY), Mississippi State (43-1) against Murray, Ky. St. Bonaventure (9-0) against St. Francis, Pa., St. Louis (10-2) against Drake, Oklahoma City (10-2) against Texas Christian, and Marquette (3-1) and 11 straight against Bowling Green.

Everyone of the powers and hopefuls had a happy weekend.

Top-ranked North Carolina State, idle now until Jan. 30, closed out with a come-from-behind 64-59 victory over Wake Forest, Kentucky, No. 2, whipped Tennessee 79-58 in the national TV game, and Kansas State, rated fourth, crushed Missouri 75-60.

Auburn nipped Alabama 57-55, sixth-ranked Cincinnati routed Drake 97-60. The only other top tener in action, ninth-ranked St. John's whipped St. Joseph's (Pa.) 97-72.

## Celtics Blast Hawks, Nats Beaten By NY

Keeping the leaders in the National Basketball Assn. can be an overwhelming job when you try to gather all the figures together.

Boston's Celtics, on the debit side in five consecutive games with St. Louis, thrashed the Hawks 139-117 Sunday.

New York, runner-up to the first-place Celts in the Eastern Division, extended its victory string over three-place Syracuse to six with a 120-118 triumph.

Minneapolis snapped a five-game losing streak by outdistancing Philadelphia 119-96, and Cincinnati handed Detroit its third straight setback, 107-89, in other games.

Sharpshooters Bill Sharman and Bob Cousy ignited the Celtics in the third quarter and Boston outscored the Hawks 41-19 in that stanza. Sharman was high scorer with 26 points. Cousy added 25 while Cliff Hagan led the Hawks with 28.

The Knicks remained 6½ games behind Boston and moved four in front of Syracuse with their win. Getting strong performances from Mike Farmer (20 points) and Richie Guerin (23 points) the New Yorkers' 66 first-half points set a Syracuse court mark. Johnny Kerr (28 points), and Dolph Schayes, (24) led the losers.

Rookie Elgin Baylor scored 22 of his 30 points as the Lakers broke it open in the second half. Tom Gola with 22 and Paul Arizin with 20 topped the Warriors.

Cincinnati's Archie Dees paced the Royals scoring with 18 points against the Pistons.

Detroit's Walt Dukes was high for the game with 26 as the Pistons fell 11½ games behind St. Louis in the Western Division.

In Saturday action, New York beat Cincinnati 117-105 and Philadelphia edged Detroit 106-104.

## Baylor In Uniform After Laker Promise

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—The Minneapolis Laker management promised Negro ace Elgin Baylor today, there would be no repetition of a racial incident in Charleston, W. Va., as long as the Lakers have any voice in the matter.

Baylor got back into uniform Sunday and gave fresh evidence of his value to an otherwise puny basketball club. The big rookie hit 30 points in the Lakers' 119-96 conquest of Philadelphia.

In a now-celebrated "sidowin" in Charleston Baylor declined to play in protest against being refused lodging in a hotel.

"We've told him we would see to it this never happens again," said Laker President Bob Short. "His refusal to play was a matter of principle with him, and I'm certainly not going to fault him for that, even though it cost us the ball game."

Short centered his displeasure on President Tom Grace of the Cincinnati Royals, the team Minneapolis played at Charleston. He said the Royals gave him their assurance there would be no problem over segregation in Charleston.

Because there was, Short wants the National Basketball Assn. to declare the game "no contest." Cincinnati says it doesn't follow Short's reasoning and doesn't see any reason why the game shouldn't count.

Baylor said Saturday he would do it again if the same situation came up in the future, and that he wouldn't have played at Charleston "if it cost my entire salary." He thanked Short for backing him up.

In Charleston, Mayor John T. Copenhaver said of the incident: "Gain has come to no one, perhaps, because of the open controversy. Charleston, as a municipality, has nothing for which to apologize. It was something over which our city held no control. I regret the occurrence."

Promoters of the game in Charleston contend the Lakers knew full well in advance that segregation in hotels is enforced there.

Baylor and two other Negroes on the Lakers were told they would not be accepted when the team checked in at the Charleston hotel where the Lakers had reservations.

The other two Negroes, Bob Ellis and Ed Fleming, played in Friday night's game.

The Lakers have only two more games scheduled in the South, both at Houston, Tex. In an earlier game there all Laker players, white and Negro, stayed in a Negro motel.

## Young Boxer Dies After Glove Action

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — "He promised me that if he lost this fight he would quit and take care of me and the baby," said the young widow, who is an expectant mother.

Pretty Mrs. Nan Davis, 20, cheered for husband Lynn, 21, as he climbed into the ring to face Billy Strother in the welterweight finals of the Houston Golden Gloves Tournament Saturday night.

Strother had four years of amateur boxing experience to Lynn's two. After the first round, the edge was evident.

Davis took several good blows from his short, stocky opponent and appeared unable to defend himself. Referee Ernie Taylor stopped it.

"When he came off the ring he was smiling," Mrs. Davis said. "Then after he sat down, he leaned back and suddenly turned white as a sheet."

Doctors at nearby Jefferson Davis Hospital pronounced him dead a few minutes later.

"Lynn promised he would quit fighting," she said, "but neither of us really believed he would."

"He said, 'why quit while we're winning? We just kind of laughed about it. If Lynn had won, the same thing might have happened to him. I just don't know.'"

Dr. Joseph Jachimczyk, the county pathologist, said he found evidence of "acute heart failure" but the cause of death would not be established for about a week.

The pathologist said Davis did not appear badly beaten although he suffered a black eye and brain swelling.

Mrs. Davis expects her first child in three months. The couple had been married a little more than a year. Davis worked as a teacher at a supermarket and taught a Church of Christ Sunday School class.

A teammate broke the news of Davis' death to Strother, 22. He appeared stunned.

"This is something I'll have to live with the rest of my life," he said. "I'll probably never fight again."

## High Jumper Sets Indoor World Record

BOSTON (AP) — Shy John Thomas has increased his high jumping level 6½ inches over the last 300 days to reach the indoor world record. And he's just a growing boy of 17.

"How high can he go?"

"He'll do 7 feet, 2 inches someday and that's good enough for me," says Boston University Field Coach Ed Flanagan.

Some feel he'll top that figure.

The Boston University freshman cleared 6 feet, 11½ inches Saturday night at the Knights of Columbus track meet here. A week earlier he hit 6-11 in a dual meet.

Ken Weisner set the recognized indoor mark of 6-10½ in 1953.

What makes Thomas' performances more remarkable is the speed of his advancement. Last March Thomas, at Cambridge's Ringe Technical High School, won the Massachusetts state schoolboy meet in 6-5½. Ten months later he had jumped 6½ inches higher.

Thomas' winning leap actually measured 6-11½ Saturday night but AAU rules specify such efforts must be cut to the nearest quarter inch.

The world outdoor mark is 7-1.

## Perkins Vies With Godih In TV Clash

NEW YORK (UPI) — Lightweight Eddie Perkins is favored at 2-1 to beat Lahouari Godih in the week's only TV fight at Washington, D.C., Wednesday night.

Godih is substituting for veteran Cisco Andrade of Compton, Calif., who withdrew last Friday because of a severe cold.

The 10-rounder that brings together young Perkins of Chicago and Godih of Oran, Algeria, at the New Capitol Arena will be televised nationally by ABC.

Neither is rated among the top 10 contenders, but speedy Perkins is climbing rapidly through the rankings. In two previous TV bouts, Eddie outpointed Frankie Ryzf and stopped Baby Vasquez.

Godih lost split decisions in his first two thrillers with Kenny Lane, high lightweight contender, and Don Jordan, who later became welterweight champion.

After a month's lapse, boxing resumes Monday night at St. Nicholas Arena, New York, with television. Middleweights Victor Zalazar of Argentina and Beny Paret of Cuba will meet in a return 10-rounder. Paret dealt Zalazar his first defeat on Dec. 15 at St. Nick's. It broke Zalazar's victory string at 15 bouts.

Welterweight champion Jordan engages Alvaro Gutierrez of Mexico in a non-tv 10-rounder at the Los Angeles Olympic Arena, Thursday night.

Friday night's usual fight time at 10 p.m. (est) will be used by NBC for the National Basketball Association's annual East-West all-star game at Detroit. NBC has the privilege of pre-empting two fight-dates a year for other attractions.

## Wings Drop 9th Straight

DETROIT (AP) — The Detroit Red Wings, champions of the National Hockey League eight times in the last 10 seasons, are battling the worst slump in the club's long and storied history.

"It's so bad," said Coach Sid Abel, "that we can't even blame our trouble on bad luck. We're just lousy — that's how simple it is."

The Red Wings bowed to the New York Rangers 4-2 Sunday night. That makes it nine straight games without a victory for the once-mighty Detroiters, who have only one triumph in their last 15 games.

League-leading Montreal also felt a bit frustrated today after settling for two ties in its weekend action. The Canadiens played a 3-3 standoff with Boston Saturday and then a 1-1 deadlock with the Chicago Black Hawks Sunday night.

Chicago beat the Rangers 7-1 Saturday afternoon in a nationally televised game, while the Red Wings were losing to Toronto 2-1. Boston edged Toronto 4-3 in Sunday night's other game.

Chicago and Montreal each scored once in the third period Sunday night after Montreal led Maurice Richard in the first stanza with an ankle injury. Tod Sloan put the Hawks in front before Dickie Moore produced the equalizer for the Canadiens.

Boston took a 2-0 lead in the first period on goals by Vic Stasiuk, each with defenseman Tim Horton in the penalty box. Toronto collected a goal in the first period, but the Bruins tallied twice more for a 4-1 lead. The Leafs closed the deficit on third-period goals by Horton and Ron Stewart.

ADELAIDE (AP) — U.S. Davis Cup ace Alex Olmedo and Barry MacKay survived the sweltering heat and a five-set struggle today and gained the men's doubles semifinals in the Australian National Tennis Championships with a trio of teams from the host country.

Playing spottily but strong under pressure in the 118-degree heat, the American combination defeated Australians Bob Hewitt and Martin Mulligan, 6-1, 5-7, 6-4, 3-6, 6-0.

The men's singles are on tap Tuesday when Olmedo, MacKay and Chris Crawford of Piedmont, Calif., compete in the list which also includes two Swedes, one Spaniard and 10 Australians.

The next doubles foe for Olmedo, a Peruvian who attends Southern California, and MacKay, of Dayton, Ohio, is the crack Australian team of Rod Laver and Bob Mark, bidding for Davis Cup recognition. They beat the Swedish team of Ulf Schmidt and Jan Erik Lundquist, 7-5, 4-6, 6-3, 6-1.

Top-seeded Neale Fraser and Roy Emerson beat John Pearce and John O'Brien, two Aussie giant killers, 6-4, 6-4, 7-5.

The other doubles spot was won by veteran Bob Howe and Don Warren Woodcock and Neil Gibson, 2-6, 3-6, 6-2, 6-1, 6-2.

Earl Buchholz of St. Louis was hard-pressed to defeat Paul Graham Jones of Tasmania, 5-6, 6-1, 6-4, and gain the quarterfinal round in the junior division. Buchholz had been off form in losing in the first round of the men's singles recently.
