Bureau Of Reclamation Plans To Spend \$522,000 On Tule Laterals, Drains

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower's budget, sent to Congress Monday, contained sharply increased spending proposals for the Pacific Northwest—largely in dam construction by Army Engineers.

Specifically earmarked for spending in the year beginning July 1 in Oregon, Washington and Idaho were requests totaling \$153,203,856.

The amount, including \$2,319,618 for Idaho programs, compares with \$121,340,169 requested last

year for Oregon and Washington alone.

Despite the increase, the President's proposals were almost certain to run into opposition from Northwest legislators because of the lack of provisions for any new starts or reclamation and dam projects.

More than half the over-all total—\$92,494,000—was wrapped up in Army Engineers' construction programs for rivers and harbors. Much of the increase in this figure, up from \$64,331,000 asked last year, was represented by a boost from \$20,000,000 to \$32,000,000 in the request for Ice Harbor Dam largest individual item in the Northwest program.

Of the over-all Northwest request, \$36,897,188 was earmarked specifically for Oregon programs, \$74,035,200 for work in Washington and an added \$39,960,850 for various region-wide programs such as Bonneville Power Administration.

Bonneville, a federal power marketing agency, would receive \$25,000,000 for construction and \$10,250,000 for operation and maintenance both up from last year.

The President proposed spending \$15,964,106 in the three states for construction by the Bureau of Reclamation, including \$8,000,000 to bring water to 29,000 additional acres on the Columbia Basin Project. An additional \$7,106,900 was asked for operation and maintenance of existing projects.

One possible source of congressional controversy was a renewed

request, rejected last year for \$200,000 to finance a one-year study of a high Pleasant Valley Dam on the middle Snake River. The Reclamation Bureau said nearly half its eight million dollar program for the Columbia Basin would be located in the Potlatch irrigation area with the bulk of the remainder in the west canal section.

With \$2,747,788 asked for the Talent Division of Oregon's Rogue River Project, it plans to complete reservoirs and collection and delivery canal facilities in the project's east section while continuing work on Emigrant Dam on the west. The 16,000 kilowatt Green Springs power plant would be completed and the first supplemental irrigation water delivery would be made.

Approximately three-fourths of the \$2,333,000 asked for Oregon's Crooked River Project, the bureau said, would be spent on Prineville dam and reservoir, bringing the dam to virtual completion. The bureau proposes to spend \$222,000 for continued construction of laterals and drains in the Tule Lake division of the Klamath

Project in Oregon and California; and \$39,700 to complete Wasco Dam and related facilities on the Juniper division of Oregon's Wapinitia Project.

Bureau programs in Idaho contemplate spending more than half the \$350,000 asked for the north side pumping division of the Minidoka project to drill four new wells and further develop four existing wells; completing the Little Wood River Project with a request of \$571,618, and spending \$400,000 to complete field design

data and start construction of a five-mile access road to the Burns Creek Dam. The latter request is contingent upon congressional authorization of the project.

In addition to continuing studies under way, the bureau proposes to start the following studies: Idaho — Main Weiser Project, Snake Plains Recharge Project, Teton Basin Project and Pend Oreille Basin.

Washington — Lower Horse Haven Project, Eureka Flats Project, Chehalis River Basin and Pend Oreille River Basin.

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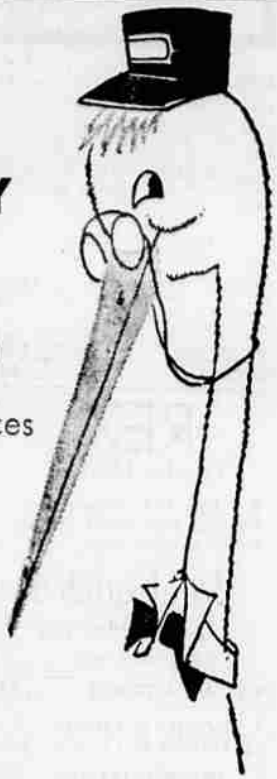
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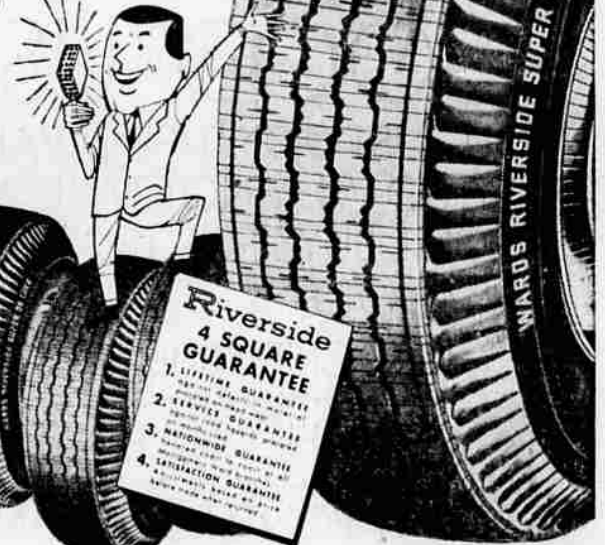
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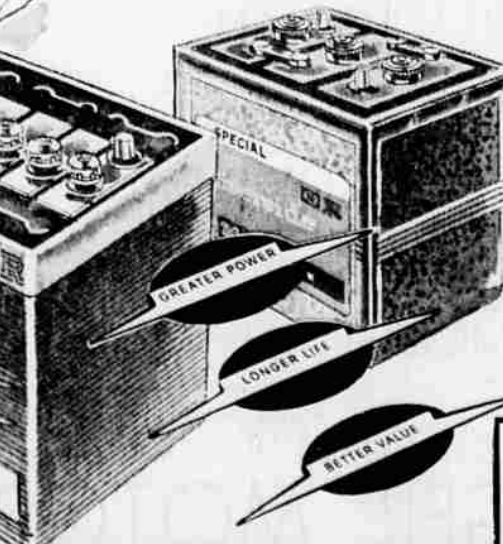


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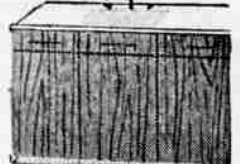
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
