

# Check Cash Problem Told

GLENDALE, Calif. (AP)—Actor Chester Morris may find it more trouble than it's worth to cash a 28-year-old paycheck for \$660 that turned up in a Glendale house.

The new owner of the house found the check Tuesday in a desk. It was made out by Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer studio in 1930 and had not been endorsed.

Morris, who is acting in San Francisco, said he intended to try to cash it.

"I don't remember," he said, "but I might have worked awfully hard for that money."

He said he never saw his pay checks, which went to his business manager. He had never heard of the previous owner of the house, Mrs. Hollie C. Smith.

The bank on which the check is drawn said it doesn't cash checks more than six months old and the only way Morris could collect on it was to get MGM to write a new one.

MGM cashier James Heagy said it would take a lot of research to determine whether the studio owes Morris anything. He said it was possible a duplicate check was issued.

Glendale police said they would give the check to Morris if he wants it.

# Producer Cites Industry Lag

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP)—Movie producer Samuel Goldwyn says the motion picture industry is at a record low because of the high prices paid stars.

"How long do you think this will continue — when actors demand and get up to a million dollars a picture, and a huge share of the gross or the profits in addition?" he asked Tuesday night at a Screen Producers' Guild Banquet, where he received the Guild's Milestone award.

"There are some people in Hollywood who can write, direct and produce, but there are very few of them," he said.

# Governor Answers Ruling With Pledge

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—Gov. Lindsay Almond Jr. has responded to court rulings knocking out Virginia's chief anti-integration laws with a pledge of unyielding resistance to integration in the public schools.

If there was doubt that the administration would pursue massive resistance along some other line, Almond scotched it Tuesday night in a radio-television address.

The people of Virginia "have repeatedly made it crystal clear that they cannot and will not support a system of public education on a racially integrated basis," he said. "I make it equally clear that I cannot and that I will not break faith with them."

Almond's 15-minute speech, his first real comment after Monday's court rulings, was significant also for what was left unsaid. He gave no new details of what course the state will pursue, hinting only that the key to the plan of battle would have something to do with state tax revenues. His closest approach to a specific recommendation was an "urgent request" that private school classes for children from nine closed schools in Norfolk, Charlottesville and Warren County continue without interruption.

Almond seemed to reject any local option plan that would allow

school integration. He spoke scornfully of "false prophets of a little or token integration." He said it is "imperative" for Virginia to have one "statewide basis" for fighting school integration.

Monday's court rulings wiped away the state's school closing law. Almond has no statutory power to keep the nine schools closed. There are no state laws to prevent local officials from reopening the schools, shut in September to prevent race mixing.

Still, there is no indication of a move to reopen schools in any of the three localities.

GRANT RESEARCH FUNDS NEW YORK (UPI)—The tobacco industry research committee Monday announced a new appropriation of \$500,000 for scientific research.

At the end of Bailey's presentation, Groshong reiterated the committee's contention that its primary objective has been to present Klamath Falls with a salary schedule allowing it to compete with other districts in Oregon.

"This schedule would allow us to expect more people with two years or less experience," he said. "This is economical for the district, which otherwise brings in too many people close to the top."

Groshong presented a letter to J. C. Rennie, chairman of the joint committees, asking for a later, closed meeting of the teachers' spokesmen with budget committee members. Rennie told them the date of this meeting might be set next week.

Howard Bailey, instructor at KU, presented the concrete salary proposals of the teachers' committee. In summary, these called for:

Increases in base pay by training rank: three year, raised to \$4,100 from \$3,900; Bachelors, \$4,500 from \$4,200; five-year, \$4,700 from \$4,470; Masters, \$4,800 from \$4,600.

Increasing the annual increment for persons with one, two or three years of experience from \$100 to \$200.

As a consequence of the combination of these two recommendations, persons with three years of experience would receive the following salaries by training rank (with the salaries they would receive under the present scale indicated in parentheses): three-year, \$4,700 (\$4,100); Bachelors, \$5,100 (\$4,500); five-year, \$5,300 (\$4,770); and Masters, \$5,400 (\$4,900).

After the three-year experience level, salaries would rise each year at the same rate as at present, that is, \$200 per year for persons with four and five years of experience, and \$100 for each year of experience thereafter.

Every teacher in the system would receive the benefits of these modifications; the only ones with over three years' experience who would not receive the entire \$500 to \$600 increase which teachers at that level would receive would be the senior teachers. This is explained by the fact that the cut-off points on salary increases for "years of experience" would be set lower.

Only eight, rather than 10, years of experience would be credited in the three-year training rank column, in which the maximum would pass from \$5,000 after 10 years to \$5,400 after eight. Maximums in the other training ranks would be: Bachelors, \$6,000 after 10 years rather than \$5,700 after 13; five-year, \$6,400 after 12 years rather than \$6,070 after 13; and Masters, \$6,700 after 14 years rather than \$6,300 after 15.

According to Bailey, the suggested salary scale would cost the elementary school district \$792,992, an increase of \$58,750 over the present schedule, and the high school district, \$438,317, an increase of \$41,382. These figures cover both teachers and supervisory personnel in the individual schools, and are based on carrying forward the present staff for one year, which would result in some increments in any case. Bailey estimated that increases would vary from \$200 to \$600 with an average of \$440.

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Then he delivered a forceful speech, read from his works and the words of others and capped the evening with a few songs.

The white-thatched bard spoke of poetry, politics and the people. Of modern poets, Sandburg said: "They ain't doing so good."

He called modern poetry "a variety of cliques, cliques and movements."

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He spoke also of the problems raised by the Civil War and of Arkansas Gov. Orval Faubus.

"Before the Civil War, official documents used to read 'The United States are.' The war was fought to enable us to say 'The United States is,'" Sandburg said. "Faubus don't (sic) know the United States is — but he gonna (sic) know."

Wearing his customary black suit and four-in-hand tie, Sandburg charmed the audience of 2,500 by playing a few folk songs on his guitar.

Asked about the so-called "beat generation," he snapped: "They are neither a generation nor are they beat. They're eatin' regular."
