

FRANK CASSEROLE

FRANK CASSEROLE

Yield: 5 servings
1 pound franks
1/2 cup butter
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup chopped green pepper
1 clove garlic, chopped
2 teaspoons salt
1 tablespoon sugar
1 pound, 12 ounce can tomatoes
1 1/2 cups uncooked rice
1 bay leaf
1/2 teaspoon clove
1/2 teaspoon ground pepper
1/2 cup water
Chili sauce

Melt butter in skillet. Add onion, pepper, and garlic. Heat about 5 minutes until vegetables are soft. Mix in salt, sugar, tomatoes, rice, bay leaf, clove and ground pepper. Cover. Heat slowly about 30 to 35 minutes. Add a small amount of water during the heating time if the rice sticks to the bottom of the skillet. Score franks with several diagonal slashes. Arrange on top of the rice and tomato mixture. Brush with chili sauce. Cover. Heat for about 5 minutes or until franks are hot. Serve immediately.

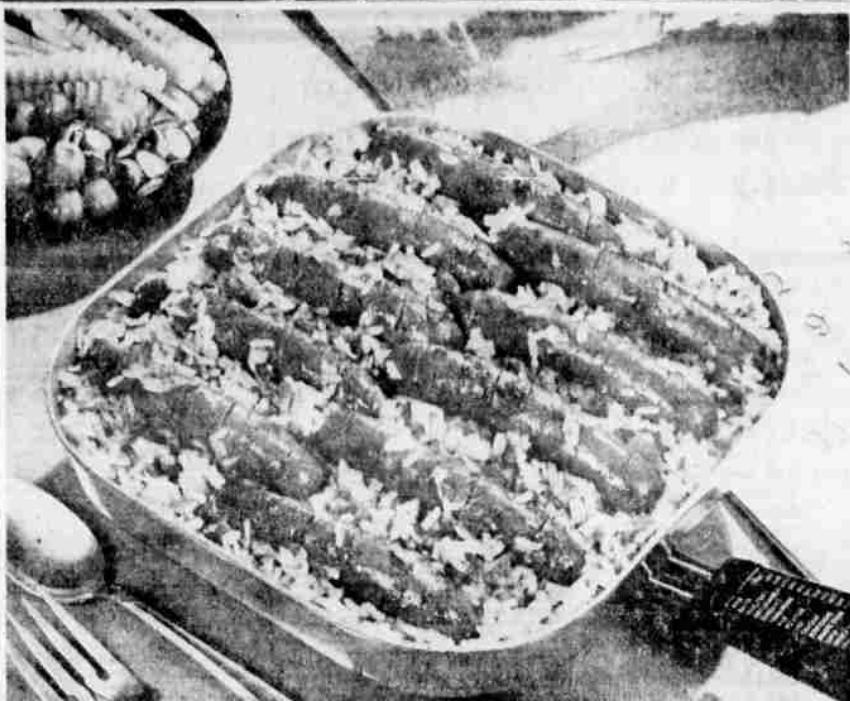
BARBECUED FRANKS

Yield: 5 servings
1 pound franks
1/2 cup chopped onion
1/2 cup catsup
3 tablespoons cider vinegar
1 tablespoon brown sugar
2 drops tabasco sauce
5 medium-sized potatoes, baked
Butter

Combine onion, catsup, vinegar, brown sugar, and tabasco sauce in a small pan. Heat for 5 to 10 minutes to blend flavors. Score franks diagonally three or four times. Place franks in a shallow baking dish scored side up. Spoon barbecue sauce over each frank. Place under the broiler about 5 minutes or until franks are heated through. Remove from oven and place two franks on each split, buttered baked potato. Spoon remaining barbecue sauce over each frank and tato mound. Serve immediately.

CHEESE PASTRIES

Blend 1 stick of softened butter with 1 cup of firmly packed shredded Cheddar cheese. Add 2 cups of prepared biscuit mix and mix thoroughly. On waxed paper, shape in roll, wrap and chill in the refrigerator, overnight if you wish. When ready to use, slice 1/4 inch thick and place on lightly floured cookie sheet. Sprinkle tops with any of the following: Sesame, poppy, caraway, dill or celery seeds; orange and parsley leaves, and/or dried minced onion. Bake in preheated 425 degree oven for 6 to 8 minutes or until golden. Allow to stand overnight before serving. If you want a peppery taste, add a couple of three dashes of Tabasco Sauce to the mixture at the start, when you begin creaming the butter.

PORK CHOP SUEY

After the holiday season, you may find yourself pulling in the reins on that run-away food budget. Here's where meals built around pork dishes fit in.

Whether you choose a roast, spareribs, tenderloin, chops or sausage, pork is an economical buy this month. For the wise buyer, this means good eating at a moderate cost.

Pork has taken on a "new look" these days—it's leaner. Packers are paying premium prices to farmers who bring in leaner, less heavy porkers. And they are going one step further and trimming the pork side of all but enough fat for best cooking results.

When buying pork, look for the government inspection stamp, which guarantees wholesomeness.

Also look for firm pink lean meat with the new closer trim on the fat.

Pork has the best flavor when it is cooked well done and all the pink color has disappeared. However, overcooking will cause excessive shrinkage. The use of a meat thermometer in roasts takes out all guesswork in cooking the larger cuts. Pork should reach an internal temperature of 185 degrees.

It's a well known fact to nutritionists that pork has higher vitamin B values than other fresh meats. Thiamine, or Vitamin B1, is necessary for the proper functioning of the heart, nerves and digestive tract. High-quality protein and iron make pork valuable to the diet.

When you're buying a pork roast, select one large enough to provide meat for a second meal. After the roast has been its biggest day, star the leftovers in chop suey. Serve it with a green salad, frosty pineapple chunks and almond cookies.

CHOP SUEY

2 cups cooked pork, cut in thin strips
1/2 cup chopped onion
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 cup celery, cut in 1/2-inch pieces
1/2 teaspoon salt
Dash of pepper
2 cups hot chicken stock or bouillon
1 (16 to 17-ounce) can bean sprouts (1 1/2 cups)
3 tablespoons cornstarch
3 tablespoons cold water
2 teaspoons Worcestershire sauce
1 tablespoon soy sauce
1 tablespoon head molasses
4 cups cooked rice

Cook meat and onions in melted butter for about 5 minutes, until meat is browned and onion is clear. Add celery, salt, pepper, chicken stock and bean sprouts. Cover and cook for 5 minutes. Make paste of cornstarch and water. Add with sauces and molasses to meat mixture. Stir lightly and cook for 1 or 2 minutes, until mixture is clear and thickened. Serve in ring of fluffy rice. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

CLEAN LINE

Never trust a damp cloth to clean your clothesline in the winter months when there is much soot in the air. Instead, clean it with steel wool and you will be sure not to have any dark marks on freshly washed clothes from the clothesline.

Stuffed Avocado

CURRIED SHRIMP

3 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 clove garlic
1 small onion
3 tablespoons flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
Black pepper
1 teaspoon curry powder
2 bouillon cubes
1/2 cup hot water
1/2 cup milk
1 can cooked small shrimp
3 Calavo avocados
Fresh lime or lemon juice
Salt

Melt butter, add garlic and finely chopped onion. Cook slowly until onion is transparent. Discard garlic. Blend in flour, salt, pepper and curry powder. Dissolve bouillon cubes in hot water and add with milk to flour mixture. Cook and stir until thickened. Stir in cleaned shrimp and simmer while preparing avocado. Cut avocado into halves lengthwise and remove seed and skin. Sprinkle with lime juice and salt. Place in shallow baking pan containing 1/4-inch warm water; fill avocado halves with hot shrimp mixture. Heat in moderately slow oven (325 degrees) 15 minutes. Serve at once. Makes 6 servings.
