

Pelicans Host Medford, Bend This Weekend

SOC Clash Tonight; Bears Here Saturday

For coach Dean White's Pelicans, the fourth-ranked team on the state poll, tonight's game with the Medford Black Tornado, a rematch which will see the Medford club seek revenge for the 70-61 whipping administered them on their home floor, can be one of the most important ones they will play all season.

The Pels enter the game knowing that the outcome of the test has a great deal to do with their chances of securing a berth in the state tournament. Although another victory over the Tornado does not necessarily indicate a sure trip to Eugene, nor does a loss block their chances of making the trek, the Pels have a definite chance to boost themselves into an enviable position, the rest of the conference considered.

Medford, the fifth spot team in the polls, is packing an 8-1 record, the Pels being responsible for the only defeat.

The starting lineup for Medford is an unknown quantity at this

time, coach Frank Roelandt having an opportunity to choose from a number of very able point-producers. "Probables" include, however, Lowell Dean, All-Conference last year, Jerry Anderson, the Tornado's top scorer, "little" man, Jerry Shultz (6-2), and two of the speediest guards in the league, Ken Durkee and John Harvey. George Koch (6-3), is an alternate possibility, strange enough, for Dean.

Getting the nod from White for the contest are Bob Petersen, Bob Lewis, Bob Drake, Dean Dunsen and Don DeLap, should a severe cold that has been bothering DeLap let up for the night. Jim Hall, also a penicillin addict of late, will suit down but may see little action. Still missing from the KU list of "ables" is Paul Bishop who is recuperating from the mumps.

Following their tussle with the Black Tornado the Pels get little chance for a breather, being faced with the task of meeting the undefeated Bend Lava Bears on Saturday night, Bend, 11-0 to date, is ranked close on the heels of Medford in the No. 6 position in the state rankings.

Despite off-heard comments that Bend has yet to meet "real competition," coach Glen Kinney's Bears cannot be undersold. In the only comparisons that can be made so far in regards for the Pels and the Bend club have each met, the Lava Bears are on top.

They set an all-time state A-1 scoring record in dealing the Crater Comets a 99-50 clobbering while the Pelicans whipped the Central Pointers, 62-40. Bend dumped the North Bend Bulldogs 46-34 while the best the Pels could do was eke out a last-minute 48-47 win.

Bend boasts a squad that has averaged an overall 44.8 shooting average through games played to date. In free throws the Bears have three players in the .700 category.

Probable starters for the Lava Bears include point-leader Pat Comely and captain George Hawes, Brad Flannery, Cecil Krebs or Chuck deSully, and Jim Ward or Mike Riley. Scouting reports received by KU mentor White and assistant Gene Strehlou indicate that the Bears are a speedy aggregation noted for exceptional rebounding ability considering their size.

Depending on the health of his Pelicans, White will undoubtedly use tonight's starters for the Bend game.

A pair of preliminary matches kick-off the Pels' stint with Medford tonight; the first match, starting at 5:30, pitting the KU Wildcats with the Medford Sophomores, followed by a session between the Jayvees at 6:30. The feature game gets underway at 8:15, Pelican Court doors will open at 5 o'clock, according to Jim Johnson, KU athletic director. The Jayvee squads will play Saturday as a prelude to the Bend-KU hassle.

Don Jordan Garners KO Ring Victory

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Since he lifted the welterweight title from Virgil Atkins of St. Louis, Los Angeles' Don Jordan has acquired a champion's confidence and pepped up his punching.

It took Jordan only three rounds Thursday night to dispose of Alvaro Gutierrez of Mexico in a scheduled 10-round non-title fight. They came in at 148 pounds each, one over the welter limit.

In the third, Jordan pumped a right hand with lightning speed to the Mexican Battler's jaw. Gutierrez hit the deck, got up at five, and staggered into a neutral corner. Jordan swarmed all over him, pumping lefts and rights to head and body.

With his man helpless and about to sink to the canvas again, about ring and asked Referee Mushy Callahan to stop the fight, which Callahan did. It was scored as a knockout after 1:32 of the third.

Gutierrez is a durable, hard-hitting welterweight who entered the ring with four straight victories. He carried the fight to the champion in the first, got over one hard right, and boxed Jordan on even terms in the second.

Jordan apparently saw that Gutierrez intended to crowd him, and he went out for the third intent on ending it. He has been regarded as a good boxer and a fair hitter, but his punch has now sharpened, and he exudes confidence.

The fight at Olympic Auditorium drew 8,100 fans who paid \$20.153. Jordan was guaranteed \$12,500. Gutierrez \$7,500.

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Ex-Collegian Thunderbird Golf Leader

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP)—Long-hitting Paul Harney and Jim Ferree, a pair of former college golf stars, led the way into the second round of the \$15,000 Thunderbird Invitational Tournament today.

Harney, 29, who on occasion can outdrive the prodigious George Bayer, and Ferree, 27, who once won the intercollegiate driving title while attending the University of North Carolina, went into the second 18 holes tied at 65, five strokes under par.

The setting is the exclusive Thunderbird Country Club with par 36-35-71 for its 6,800 yards. Of the 41 invited professionals competing, 28 shot the first round under par.

Today's round promised further close competition. Nine players were within one stroke of the leaders, four just two strokes off the pace, and eight were deadlocked in the 69 bracket.

Such topnotchers as Masters champion Arnold Palmer and Doug Ford and Billy Maxwell were in the 67 group. Defending Thunderbird champion Ken Venturi is in the thick of things with a 68.

United States Open champion Tommy Bolt and a three-time winner of the tournament, Jimmy Demaret, along with such threats as Mike Souchak and Bo Wininger, were tied at 69.

Harney, who golfed for Holy Cross in his college years, scored 32-34-66 in the first round. Going into his final hole, he knew he had to make a birdie three to tie Ferree, and he did it.

Ferree, who won last year's British Columbia Centennial, made the tour in 36-30. He missed only one green and banged in five birdies on the back nine.

Chile Triumphs In Cage Tourney

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP)—Another victory by host Chile and official threats of forfeiture to balky Russia and Bulgaria left the World Amateur Basketball Championships in a scramble today.

Chile raced to its second straight victory in the final seven-team round robin competition Thursday night, 83-71, over Puerto Rico after Brazil had won its opening game, 94-76, over Nationalist China.

Russia and Bulgaria having refused to play Nationalist China because "they do not represent a nation," now faces forfeiture of all victories by the International Basketball Federation.

Johansson, Floyd Meet In Fight Talk

NEW YORK (AP)—Sweden's Ingemar Johansson was due here from Sweden Friday to wrap up negotiations for a title fight with World Heavyweight Champion Floyd Patterson.

The handsome, undefeated European titleholder was confident on two counts—he will get the contract and then the crown in the June fight.

"I'm sure I will win. If you don't believe in yourself, you cannot be a boxer," he commented on boarding a U.S.-bound plane at Göteborg.

Promoter Bill Rosenzohn shared Johansson's optimism that the fight will be made — for New York, Los Angeles, or Colorado Springs—despite some puzzling statements by Patterson's manager, Gus D'Amato.

"With Johansson coming on the scene, now we can get busy and expedite the whole thing. I'm hopeful we can get contracts signed early next week," said Rosenzohn.

The New Yorker was the promoter of the Patterson-Roy Harris title fight in Los Angeles last Aug. 12.

It was learned from a good source that the fight is all set. This was told disclosed after D'Amato had said he still was negotiating with other contenders.

D'Amato blasted the International Box Club again and accused it of trying to prevent a Patterson-Johansson fight.

Asked point-blank whether there would be a Patterson-Johansson fight, D'Amato replied: "The situation is the same as it was before. I see no obstacles in the way of a title fight between Patterson and Johansson."

Did this mean there will be such a fight? Yes and no, seemed to be the answer from D'Amato.

Apparently the supercautious manager was concerned that Johansson's demands would be more than he would want to meet.

Johansson will be the guest of honor at a luncheon in a midtown restaurant. After that there will be some huddles which should clear up some of the mystery.

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Cincy, Mr. 'O' Scheduled For Saturday Video Game

Young Mr. Robertson of Cincinnati, who was awarded an Oscar long before he became a basketball star, tries for a television Emmy Saturday afternoon.

The first appearance of All-America Oscar on the national TV college basketball series on NBC comes as the Big O and his Cincinnati Bearcats meet Xavier of Ohio at Cincinnati Gardens.

This one's for the championship of Cincinnati and, in addition to giving you a look at the fellow considered the best of the collegians, ought to be quite a tussle. Despite an 8-5 record, Xavier

fields much the same team that clicked late last season for an underdog's rush to the National Invitation Tournament title. Cincinnati, with Robertson scoring at a 32.5 pace and handling the brunt of the rebounds and assists, has won 10 of 12 games and ranks sixth nationally.

Coach Jim McCafferty and his Xavier Musketeers have pointed all season to the game with Cincinnati, hoping to convince the country there's more to basketball in the Ohio city than Oscar Robertson.

Hank Stein, a fiery backcourt man, and Joe Viviano, a 6-3

scorer-rebounder, trigger the Xavier attack—one that is potentially exceptional off last season's showing but disappointing so far this campaign.

As for Robertson, in case you've been buried in a storm cellar, don't usually cotton up to radios, newspapers and magazines, and don't have truck with word of mouth reports, here's a brief rundown.

He's a 6-5, 200-pound Negro from Indianapolis who went to Cincinnati as one of the highest prized schoolboy players in the history of Indiana's hotbed of basketball. He set all school records with the freshman team, set all-time collegiate season scoring records for a sophomore with the varsity last year, and was an overwhelming choice for All-America. Now a junior, he rates as surely the best all-around college player in the land.

Among other things, he's been a boon to the vocabularies of the sportswriters. They started describing him as great and brilliant, went on to amazing and sensational and have been searching for additional superlatives ever since.

The Cincinnati-Xavier game touches off the return to action of most of the major teams this weekend after a week or more of midterm examinations.

There are a handful of major tests Friday night — West Virginia-Western Kentucky, Brigham Young-Utah, Oregon State-Washington State, and Montana State-Seattle are a few — before the courts resume again with some 40 big pairings Saturday night.

Harman Leads OSC To Win Over Vandals

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP)—The Oregon State College basketball team, victor over Idaho 87-84 Thursday night, moves here tonight for a Pacific Coast Conference game with hapless Washington State.

Oregon State goes into the game with a 3-3 conference record. Washington State has won only one of its six conference games.

Team captain Lee Harman scored 15 of OSC's final 19 points as he led his team to victory at

Moscow, Idaho, Thursday night. He was high for the game with 33 points.

Idaho, trailing 44-43 at the half, surged to a 78-74 lead with four minutes remaining. Then Harman really went to work. He jumped in one from the key and followed with a layin to tie the score. Moments later he drove for another layin.

But Idaho tied the score at 80 and Harman put the Staters ahead again with a free throw.

Then Idaho went out in front again on Bob Walton's tip. Harman again tied the score at 82-82 with a free throw. His second shot put the Staters ahead to stay and Forward Jim Woodland added two more points. Harman did the rest of the scoring for the winners.

Oregon State hit 43.5 from the field and Idaho hit 41.8 per cent.
