Weather Warfare Viewed By New Mexico Lawmaker

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Clinton P. Anderson (D-NM) says weather warfare may some day be more effective than missiles in bringing a nation to its knees. "Weather warfare could be so applied that the operator of the modification could not only damage his opponent but escape undamaged himself — something that might not be said of multi-megaton thermonuclear blasts," Anderson said.

He addressed a symposium of weather modification Thursday night. "Who needs to be told how long it would take to bring the United States to her knees if it lay in the power of another country to deny us at will our drinking water or our wheat crop, to alternately freeze us or burn us up, to flood our cities and scorch our farms?" he asked.

Two top meteorologists joined Anderson in urging intensive further research on weather control techniques.

Dr. Horace R. Byers of the University of Chicago said progress in weather modification has been distressingly slow since such studies were started 12 years ago. He said this was mainly because most of the effort had gone into trying to apply principles that were too poorly understood instead of doing basic research on atmospheric processes.

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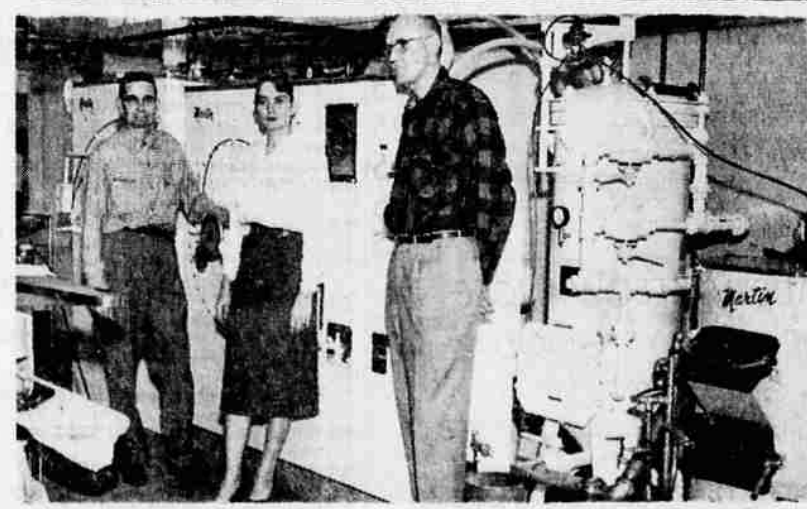
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
