As part of the program they prepared the luncheon for 11 members. After the meal Martha and Lorraine told the group what ingredients they had used and a discussion was held on the pros and cons of low-calorie substitutes.
 Charlene Reiling, chairman, presided at the business meeting held before luncheon. Priscilla reported that the 4-H leaders attended a meeting on January 12. Margaret Freurer gave a report from the County Advisory Committee meeting. Several good suggestions were sent to the committee for appropriate May Festival themes. OVER THE GARDEN GATE
MT. LAKE GARDEN CLUB
 A campaign to rid the home gardens of insects and diseases got off to a good start Monday, January 19, when the Mt. Lake Garden Club held its regular monthly meeting at the home of Mrs. Enoch Johnson, near the Merrill-Lakeview Junction.
 J. D. Vertrees, of the Klamath County Agricultural Office, spoke on dormant sprays and insecticides which are the most overlooked part of gardening and most important. It is said that one good dormant spray job is worth several other of the regular later sprays during the growing season. Dormant spraying helps to rid the gardens of insect eggs, larvae and diseases before they get a start.
 Vertrees spoke of the next 40 to 45 days being the best time for dormant spraying on trees and shrubs. A spray containing dormant oil, lime sulphur solution is effective for the control of insect eggs such as aphids, red spider, scales, mildew, apple scale, and peach leafcurl. For soil pests, as root weevil, onion borers and many other troublesome pests, spraying is the best time to help exterminate them by working chlordane into the soil. Later on, a malathion solution for red spider is an effective spray as well as for many chewing and sucking insects. Malathion, DDT and chlordane are best for controlling earwigs, spraying heavily at intervals around foundations, shrubs and under boards. For the slug, a product containing metheldehyde for spray or bait is best.
 Colored slides of some of the members' gardens were shown during the afternoon—pictures of attractive colorful gardens that could compete with lovely gardens of other regions.
 During the business meeting, conducted by the president, Mrs. Dick Henzel, active work projects were reported by the committees. These included appointment of a nominating committee for the next term of officers including Mrs. Jay Fairclo, chairman; Mrs. Will Blackman and Mrs. Ed Born.
 Members were reminded to start plants now for the plant sale to be held during the February meeting, also a gift plant for women at the county nursing home. The spring flower show was further discussed as to time and theme. Members are asked to submit a theme at the next meeting that will be appropriate for a spring flower show.
 Mrs. Johnson and her co-chairman served delicious refreshments to 21 members and two guests. Mrs. Gladys Barkee of Klamath Falls and Mr. Vertrees.
 The next meeting will be at the home of Mrs. C. H. Kelly, Home-dale Road, February 17. "Succession of Bloom in My Garden" will be the main topic of the afternoon's program.

Witness Replies To Solon's Quiz
 SALEM (AP)—Sen. Francis W. Ziegler (R-Corvallis) will think twice next time when he suggests that the state must keep within existing revenues.

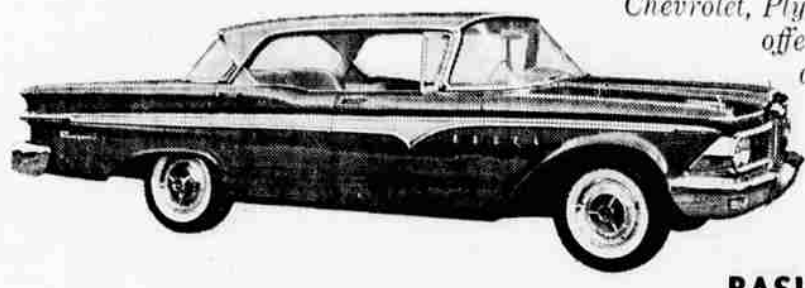
offered at both sessions to permit selection of time best suited to those attending. The evening session will run from 7:30 to 9:30, the morning meeting from 9:30 to 11:15.

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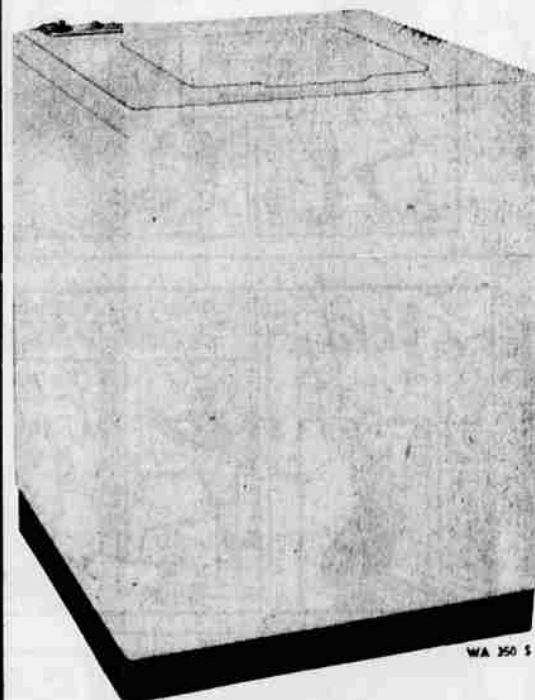
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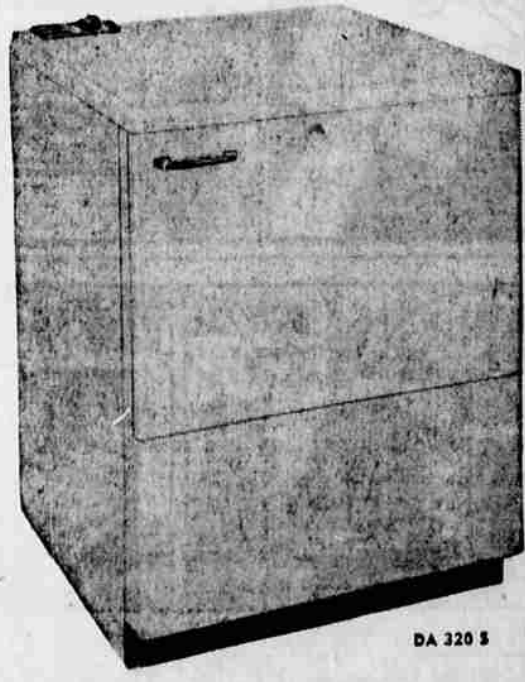
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
