A frock of yellow tulle over tulle was worn by the maid of honor, Patti Lynch. Stephen Katzer was best man and Danny Lynch lighted the candles.

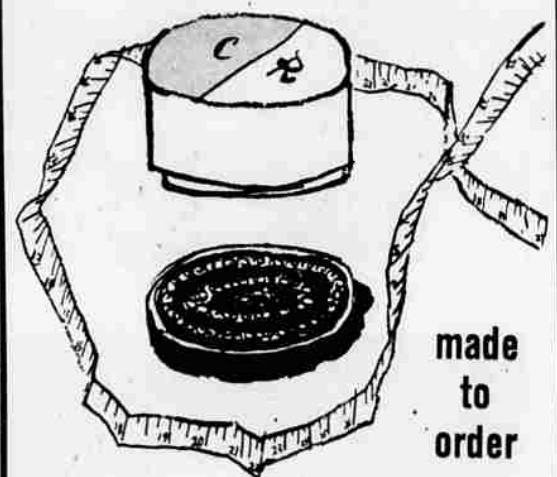
