collect a 60-49 victory on Pelican Court. The Pels assuaged their damaged pride resulting from a 66-48 whipping at the hands of the Medford Black Tornado Friday night by spoiling the 11-0 record of the powerful Bend squad. The game did not count in Southern Oregon Conference play.

Minus the services of their top rebounder, Bob Petersen, who played only six minutes of the last half, the Pels leaned on Bob Drace, Jim Hall and Bob Lewis, who took command of the boards on both ends of the court, playing what coach Dean White termed "their best kind of game."

"I feel kind of sorry for the club that has to meet my boys, sick or not, the night after they have been beaten," grinned the delighted Pel mentor in the dressing room after the game.

George Hawes, of Bend created a healthy respect for himself as he hit seven field goals and 4-7 at the foul line to total 18 points, the high for the game. Teammate Pat Connolly, who connected for 15 points in the first half was successfully shut off by the Pel defenders in the last two periods, collecting only one field goal to end the night with 17 for second high honors.

Don DeLap counted five field goals and five for six at the foul line, notching 15 to lead the Pel offense. The number two man for the Pelicans was Big Bob Petersen who jumped in three field goals from underneath the bucket and hit six for seven at the charity stripe for a 12 point total in spite of his short stay in the game.

The Pelicans hit for a .580 from the field as compared to .516 for Bend, while they were successful on 20-26 at the free throw line as compared to 17-25 for the Lava Bears.

The Pels scored first but the lead changed three times in the first quarter before the KU club finally ended on top 14-12.

Two minutes into the second frame the Pels, had an eight point lead off a pair of consecutive jumpers by Jim Hall and a pair of free throws by Petersen, but at this point the Lava Bears went into an aggravating press and caught up with the Pels in the last 30 seconds and went ahead 26-26 at the halfway whistle.

White and his club evidently solved the Lava Bear defense during the halftime and when the Bears resumed the same tactics at the start of the third period the Pelicans were off and running. Petersen laced up a beauty in the first 15 seconds of play and from here the Pels moved steadily, counting 19 points while the Bears could do no better than five, the quarter ending 45-33 for the Whitebirds.

Petersen was benched for the last six minutes of the period with four fouls. The score read 48-33 with four minutes remaining in the game and from here on the Bears put on a tremendous drive but the distance was too great. Petersen fouled out of the game with four minutes left.

In the jayvee game coach Gene Strehlou's young Pelicans earned a 44-42 win over the Lava Bear Juniors.

Solons' Request Rejected

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Pacific Coast League directors Saturday rejected Sacramento's request for a loan, recommended the Solons' franchise be placed on the auction block and hired Dewey Soriano of Seattle as an executive vice president of the league.

The action came after 10 hours of deliberation during which PCL President Leslie O'Connor said the league had asked for an option on the Sacramento franchise.

Solons President Fred David was given one week to decide whether to operate or let the league have the franchise. After the meeting David said:

"There is a great possibility of getting a working agreement with a major league club. This way we can operate again in 1959."

The selection of Soriano, retiring general manager of the Seattle Rainiers, came after a compromise plan was offered by San Diego. Considerable opposition had been expressed to O'Connor as president. Soriano has been considered for the presidency, from which O'Connor is due to retire in December.

Soriano will handle promotional duties, umpire assignments and other duties delegated by O'Connor. He will operate out of Seattle. Directors refused to disclose Soriano's salary but one source said it would top \$15,000 per year.

Some of the league directors expressed interest in the Solons franchise but the city's name did not come up officially during Saturday's league meeting.

Directors have scheduled another meeting Sunday to work out the 1959 schedule.

Commission Sets 1959 Fishing Laws

PORTLAND (AP)—The upper Rogue and North Umpqua rivers will be opened to anglers earlier this year. The Columbia, however, will be closed to November salmon fishing.

Those were among the major changes in fishing regulations adopted by the state Game Commission Saturday.

The general trout season was set at April 25 to Oct. 31. In an attempt to protect ocean-bound young steelhead and salmon and for recovery of spawned rainbow in mountain lakes, these later dates were set:

May 30-Oct. 31 for streams in zone 1 (coastal) and zone 3 (Umpqua).
May 30 to Oct. 4 for streams in zone 4 (Rogue).
May 30 to Oct. 18 for lakes in the Cascades, but East and Paulina will have an Oct. 5 closing.

The early opening for Southern Oregon anglers will affect the Rogue and tributaries above Laurelhurst Bridge, Big Butte Creek and tributaries above Cobleigh Bridge, and Elk and tributaries.

The North Umpqua will be open above Soda Springs Reservoir. The November closure of the Columbia and tributaries is expected to be made complete soon with the state Fish Commission banning commercial fishing also. Washington is expected to follow suit.

Coast steelhead anglers will be allowed to fish through March on the Nestucca, Nehalem, Salmon, Sixes and Coquille rivers, and Ten Mile Creek in Lincoln County. Wilson and Alsea rivers were opened to March steelhead angling two years ago.

Year-around fishing will be allowed in Ochoco and Haystack reservoirs in Central Oregon.

A number of long-closed streams will be opened for trout. They include the tributaries of Mercer, Munsell, Sault, Ten Mile, Silcoos and Tahketch lakes; Sain Creek between Odell and Davis lakes.

McKay Reservoir near Pendleton is scheduled for poisoning next fall and so the trout limit will be 30 per day and 60 in possession.

Huskies Topple Webfoots

SEATTLE (AP) — Doug Smart and Earle Irvine hit 22 points each Saturday night and Washington's Huskies swamped Oregon, 79-60 in a Pacific Coast Conference basketball game.

After a brief preliminary scramble in which Oregon took a 2-1 lead and then quickly lost it, Washington rolled swiftly to an 11-point advantage after eight minutes.

From there on Oregon was never a serious threat. The Smart-Irvine team collected 10 points each in pacing the Huskies to a 32-21 halftime margin. Oregon's fast and often frantic offense ran into a fish-net defense and most of the Webfoot points were collected at long range.

There was no let up in the Washington attack — or defense — in the second half. Over one 4½-minute stretch the Huskies tallied 10 points while holding Oregon scoreless. That left the count 50-28 with just eight minutes gone in the second period and Coach Tippy Dye began shuffling in the Washington subs.

Oregon lost two starters on personal fouls. Denny Strickland bowed out with nearly 12 minutes left to play and Stu Robertson went to the bench with 4:25 left in the game. Strickland, Oregon's leading scorer collected only three points Saturday night.

Dale Herron was high man for the losers with 16 points and Chuck Rask contributed 13. Bruno Boia had 14 for Washington.

A crowd of 8,000 watched Washington post its fourth conference victory against three defeats.

Stan Weber, a 6-foot-6 substitute, sank five field goals in the second extra period and gave Portland State its fifth straight conference victory.

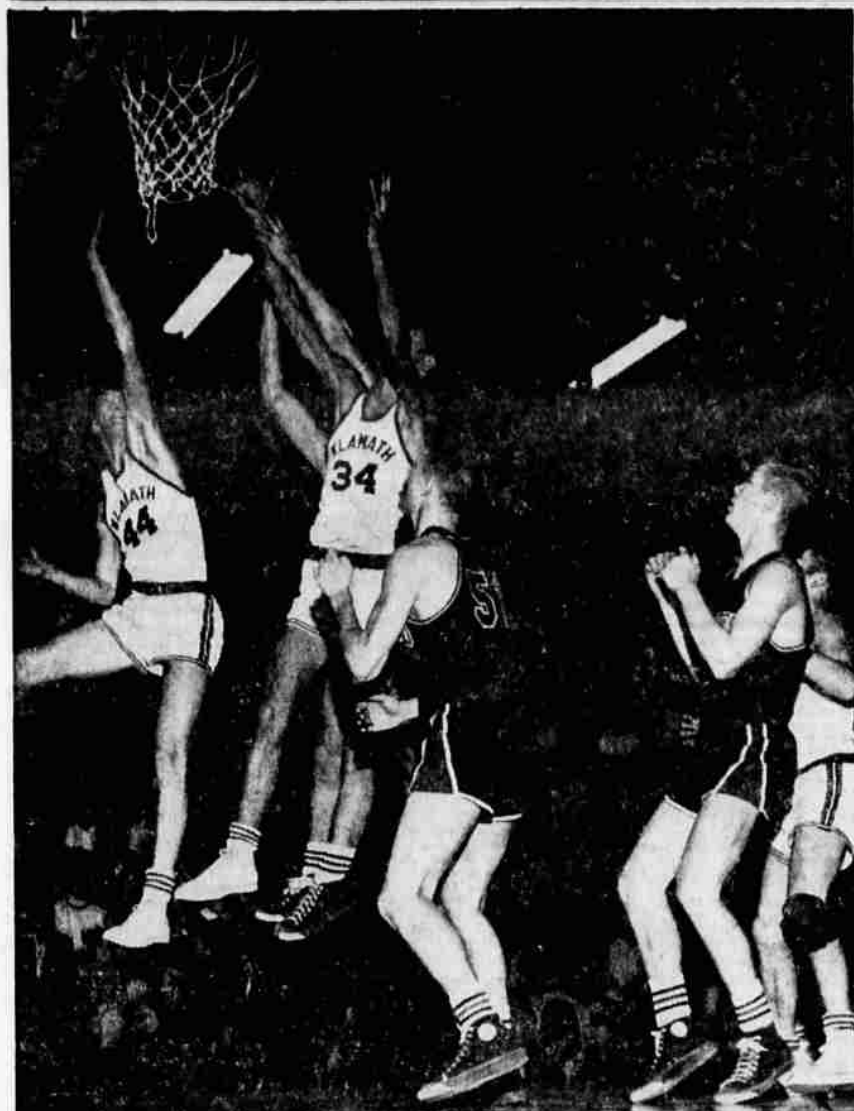
The score at the end of regulation play was 55-55. It was tied again at 61-61 at the end of the first overtime period.

Olmedo, Fraser To Clash For Australian Net Crown

ADELAIDE (AP)—The two top seeded favorites, Peruvian Alex Olmedo and Australia's Neale Fraser, meet Monday for the Australian National Tennis Championship. The big question is can Olmedo's celebrated stomach muscle hold out for one more day?

Olmedo, hero of the U.S. Davis Cup victory last month, has battled into the finals on nerve and fantastic shot control and is convinced he can make it. "I feel better today," he said, "and in the finals I may be able to go all out again."

Olmedo, 22, made the finals by whipping the consistently inconsistent Barry MacKay of Dayton, Ohio, 3-6, 8-6, 6-1, 3-6, 6-3 today.

He never has won a national championship. Neither has Fraser, who breezed past countryman Bob Mark 6-4, 6-4, 6-3.

If it wasn't for his cup close friends—pro promoter Jack Kramer and pro king Pancho Gonzalez—Olmedo might have pulled out of the nationals long ago. His three advisers, however, urged him to make the effort, short of risking permanent injury, to win the Australian title for its prestige value.

Already rocketed into world prominence by his Davis Cup feats, Alex could establish a beachhead toward becoming the king of amateur tennis. The Australian title is one of the four jewels in the crown, which also includes the Wimbledon, French and U.S. titles.

Olmedo could become the first to haul the Australian title out of this country since Dick Savitt packed in off to America in 1951. Without belittling Fraser's ability, however, Alex's biggest foe Monday will be that cantankerous stomach muscle.

Earl Buchholz, 18, of St. Louis, goes after a junior slam Monday against Australia's Martin Mulligan, also 18. Buchholz already holds the Wimbledon, French and U.S. junior titles.

Renee Schuurman of South Africa faces Australia's Mary Reitano for the women's singles crown.
