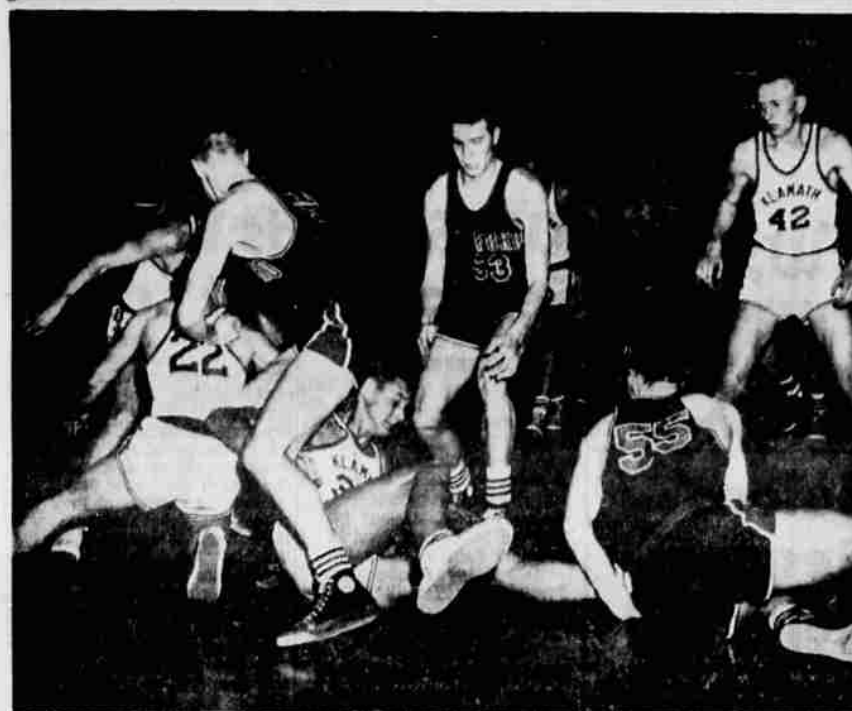

KU Pelicans Trowned By Medford

Tornado Cagers Nab Big Conference Win

The Medford Black Tornado, playing well up to all pre-season expectations, turned in an "every thing done right" performance in soundly thumping the Klamath Union High Pelicans, 66-48, Friday night on Pelican Court in the second Southern Oregon Conference meeting of the two schools. Revenge was sweet for the Tornado, who had suffered a 70-61 embarrassment at the hands of the KU cagers in their previous clash on the Medford home floor.

Paced by Jerry Anderson, a 6-3 junior forward, who dumped in 24 points during the test, the Tornado roared its way to victory off a combination of a terrific field goal percentage of .610, a free throw mark of .738 and probably the toughest defensive play ever seen on Pelican Court.

For coach Dean White's flu-ridden Pel squad the Medford team proved much too hot to handle beyond the midway point of the second quarter. A flu-bug that seemed to start with only two of the varsity members a week or so

ago finally caught up with the balance of the team, its full effect being realized when the Pels ran out of gas a little more than a quarter of the way through the Medford tussle.

In the gloom of the Pelican dressing room following their defeat, the second of their nine game season to date, White commented, "We had an off night against a fine ball club—Medford, if not the best in the state, it's certainly pushing the top one hard."

"They out-defended and out-offended us all the way. Not to take anything from Roelandt's (Frank, Medford coach) boys, I can promise that after Saturday, whether we beat Bend or not, we are not going to hold even a shooting practice until next Wednesday, and maybe not then if the boys can't shake these colds," he concluded.

In his after-game talk with his players White said, "I don't feel that any one of you let us down; you have nothing to be ashamed of. We'll get Bend tomorrow night."

Anderson, whose 24 points off eight slick field goals and eight for nine successes at the charity line was the high total for the line, was also a terror off both backboards breaking even with the Pel's Bob Petersen, a feat not easily accomplished. Trailing Anderson was Booth Deakins, whose 16 points including 8-9 free throws gave him No. 2 honors. Petersen topped the Pelicans with 13, five field goals and 3-4 at the foul line, running third in the totals.

Don DeLap, who had been unable to practice all week because of his cold, and Dean Dunson, the outside man whose long jumpers made believers out of the Medford crew the last time out, collected eight each to top the balance of the Pel scorers.

After a slow start the Pelicans overcame the Tornado 5-0 lead after two minutes of the first quarter were gone, then managed to surge out to a 10-6 lead, primarily off three of Dunson's specialties. The Tornado wasn't content however and was on top 12-11 at the end of the frame.

Things looked bright for the KU club for the first two minutes of the second quarter as they moved out to a 17-14 lead but when the Tornado went ahead two minutes later, 18-17 the Whitebirds had it.

White started replacing his visibly exhausted varsity as the Tornado whirled out to a 32-25 lead at the halfway point.

An obviously too short rest period gave the Pels enough steam to narrow the count to 32-29 in the first three minutes of the third quarter but that was as close as they were to get for the rest of the evening, as they once again began fading. The Medfordites moved out to a 46-33 bulge at the end of the quarter and from here on the Pels were out of the picture. At one point, 2:15 remaining in the game, the Pels were down 62-42. Here White started sending the regulars to the showers and the reserves did their best but succeeded in shaving the difference only one point.

The varsity wrestlers had an easy time in handling the Black Tornado matmen in an afternoon session Friday. The final score was 41-9 for KU.

The Pels picked up seven pin victories: Milo Crumrine, Kyle McFarland, Larry Bender, Bill O'Neill, Larry Alexander, Larry Badorek and John Hancock handling their foes easily. Richard Herrera collected the other Klamath win, a decision.

In the evening half of the day's work the Pelicans used a squad made up primarily of Jayvees and dealt the Ashland Grizzlies varsity a stunning 35-9 defeat.

The Pel juniors garnered four pin victories and four by way of decisions. Those collecting pins included Larry Bender, Richard Herrera, Gary Hancock and Milo Crumrine. Decision winners were Peter McSwain, Steve Shultz, Paul Benold and Bob Addington.

The fresh squad which worked simultaneously with the varsity at Medford, only in the McLoughlin Junior High gym, ran into a little trouble as the able Bulldogs under the direction of coach Ed Durand took them into camp, 29-16.

University Of Washington Rowing Chief Ends Long Term Coaching Stay

SEATTLE (AP) — Al Ulbrickson, the famous "dour Dane" of rowing, resigned Saturday after more than 32 years as coach of the University of Washington crew.

Phil Leanderson, 27, was named varsity coach to succeed Ulbrickson. Leanderson has been freshman coach and was a member of the four-oared boat that represented the United States in the 1932 Olympics.

Under Ulbrickson Washington has been a dominate force in international rowing. His crews swept the International Rowing Association regatta four times — winning varsity, junior varsity and freshman races. These sweeps were in 1926, 1937, 1948 and 1950. The tall, graying coach climaxed his long career last summer when he took his crew to Russia and defeated Soviet crews in a special meet. One was the Trud Rowing Club of Leningrad, which had beaten Washington in an earlier race at London.

Ulbrickson was a great Washington crewman in his own right. In 1927 he became assistant to Rusty Callow, and the following year — at the age of 25 — became head coach when Callow moved to Pennsylvania.

Six of Ulbrickson's former pupils now are crew coaches themselves, three as head mentors.

In his letter of resignation, Ulbrickson said this was not a "spur of the moment" decision.

Major League Aces Shaking The Walls

Major league baseball players are blasting off an Atlas missile in an effort to jar more money out of their bosses.

Name players like Boston's Ted Williams, baseball's highest paid hired hand; San Francisco's Willie Mays and the Chicago Cubs' Ernie Banks, the National League's most valuable player last year, have signed contracts calling for increases.

But there have been enough rumbles of discontent from other first-line players to indicate that the clubs may be in for a number of serious salary squabbles before spring training opens March 1.

Roy Hamer might have had a comparatively easy job if he had remained general manager at Philadelphia, for few of the last place Phillies have strong talking points. But being assistant general manager of the New York Yankees in charge of contract signing is a different matter.

Hamer got the name of veteran outfielder Hank Bauer on the line Friday for a reported slight in-

crease to \$31,000. That was easy compared to signing such stars as Mickey Mantle, Gil McDougald, Yogi Berra and Whitey Ford. The four don't like the cuts which their contracts reportedly called for.

Unhappiest of the Milwaukee's National League champions are Hank Aaron, Wes Covington and ace relief hurler Don McMahon.

"The club will have to come to me," said the hard hitting Aaron after rejecting the first offer.

"I don't want the whole club, just a raise," said Covington, claiming his injured knee is sound again.

The Braves Friday got the signature of Eddie Mathews for an estimated \$35,000. They already signed Bill Bruton, Del Crandall, Johnny Logan and Frank Torre.

While Boston may be happy with his William Red Sox contract calling for an estimated \$125,000 (some say its for \$135,000 with bonus clause), teammate Jackie Jensen is far from satisfied.

"I'm not at all satisfied with the terms," said the American League's most valuable player. "But I'm not maling it back. I'll talk it over with the management when I am in Boston next week for a banquet. I anticipate 50 trouble in coming to an agreement." He declined to say how much of an increase he was asking.

Roy Sievers of Washington is another dissatisfied player. Billy Pierce, Chicago White Sox ace southpaw, and sparkplug Nellie Fox have told the management they don't approve of small cuts.

Lou Aparicio was given a small raise by the White Sox but he wants more.

The Detroit Tigers have asked Charlie Maxwell to take almost the maximum 25 per cent cut. Maxwell says: "That's ridiculous." Billy Hoelt is due for a second straight reduction by the Tigers but says: "I think something can be worked out."

Baltimore is having trouble signing Gus Triandos, Bob Newman and Gene Woodling, who tops the club with a \$30,000 salary and threatens to quit if cut.

Unheralded Jim Porree of Winston-Salem, N.C., who led the field going into the round, dropped back after two straight 66's to a 72 and a tie at 204 with five other pros. They were Billy Maxwell, 68; Lloyd Mangrum, with his third straight 68; Jack Burke Jr., 68; Masters champion Arnold Palmer, 67; and Fred Hawkins, 66.

Reservation Jaycees Plan Top All-Indian Tournament

The ever-growing Klamath Indian Reservation All-Indian Invitational Basketball Tournament is scheduled for the biggest four-day classic in the history of the spring vacation cage tourney.

Officials of the Klamath Reservation Jaycees announced this week that this year's tournament dates have been set for March 18 through 21. The Jaycees have acted as the sponsoring body of this annual tournament since 1955 and every year it grows in size. The first such tournament was

held in 1934 when four teams from outside the local reservation were invited to take part in the initial invitational tourney. Up to that time, tournaments were held on a local level only.

Last year, 12 teams entered into the mid-March playoffs, one local team and 11 "outsiders." These teams came from eight different states including North Dakota, Wyoming and Montana. This year's tournament promises the same 12-team schedule, but clubs from far reaching places in the

nation are expected to join in the sixth annual meeting.

Tournament officials have already announced that teams will be coming from Arizona, Idaho, California, Utah, Washington, Wyoming, North Dakota and Montana as well as Oregon. The defending champions from Lodge Grass, Montana, will be back to defend its crown won in last year's final game with Neah Bay, which has also announced its intentions of returning.

There will be two Oregon teams entered in this year's tournament. Warm Springs' youthful and hustling Magpies, a youth top crowd pleaser, will be back again as will be the winner of the Klamath Reservation playoff.

The local playoff will pit teams from all parts of the Klamath Indian Reservation. This playoff is scheduled for the Chiloquin High School gym February 26, 27 and 28.

The Reservation Jaycees have scheduled an important meeting of all tournament committee chairmen for Tuesday night at Klamath Agency at 7:30 p.m. Noble Sanderville is again serving as the general chairman for the tournament—for the fourth year. Bob Doak and Chester Jack have been named as co-chairmen to work with Sanderville towards making this year's tournament the "best ever" according to Gordon Givan, president of the Reservation Jaycees.

As plans now look, the championship night games will be played in Klamath Falls. All other action will be held at the Chiloquin High School gym as in past years. The move to Klamath Falls for the final night's play will give more local sports fans an opportunity to take in the colorful tournament.

Sanderville announced that a full-sized ticket sale is being planned this year in conjunction with a local queen contest. When the sale opens, season tickets will be placed on sale at different locations throughout the county.

OCC Stats Led By SO Basketball

PORTLAND — The Red Raiders of Southern Oregon College have a stranglehold on individual and team statistics after the second week of action in the Oregon Collegiate Conference.

SOC's one-two offensive punch, Dave D'Olivo and Punk Biddington, rank in that order in individual scoring and field goal accuracy departments while D'Olivo also heads the rebounding department.

D'Olivo, a 6-4 senior second team all-conference choice last year, has scored 78 points, a 19.5 average for the first four games through last weekend. Biddington has 69 points for a 17.2 average.

D'Olivo's field goal shooting percentage is .506 on 34 of 57 attempts. Biddington has made good 32 of 60 tries for a .517 percentage.

The husky SOC forward has nabbed 58 rebounds, high for the league, but Bernie Jones of PSC has averaged 17 per game in one less contest.

Southern Oregon is the offensive leader with an average of 77 points per game. Portland State is a close second at 74.6. Defensively, Portland State leads with a 50.3 average while SOC is in second place, giving up only 56.3 points per game.

Freshman Don Smith of Oregon Tech has a perfect 5-for-5 from the free throw line to lead the department.
