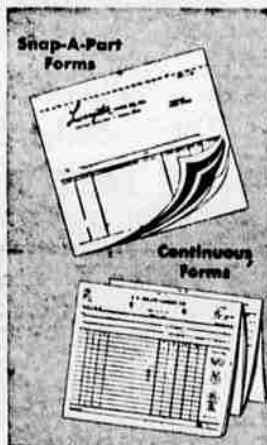

Local Girl Wins Jaycee Beauty Nod

The state finals of the Junior Miss Oregon Contest were held in Klamath Falls on Friday, December 12, 1958.

Contestants were Joy Lee Parkinson, Illinois Valley; Donna Burnett, Central Point; Kathy Heinemann, Ashland; Leslie Leake, Chiloquin; Mary Evans, Gilchrist; and Sandra Phelps, Klamath Falls.

This contest is for high school senior girls, 16 and 17 years of age, who are judged on poise, beauty and talent.

Sandra Phelps, a senior at Klamath Union High School, was winner of the 1958 state contest. She was awarded an all-expense trip to Mobile, Alabama, where she will compete with state finalists from all parts of the United States for \$10,000 in college scholarships in addition to many other worthwhile prizes.

Jaycettes Contribute

On the first day of November, 1951, a group of public-spirited young women organized the Jaycettes at a dinner meeting held at the Willard Hotel.

Lucille Piper was elected as the first president. Other charter members were Bonnie Osborn, Marion Hamblin, Jean Triebwasser, Susie Kenny, June Barlow, Pat McCollum, Eva Baker, Pat Vasak, Betty Harrahill, Virginia McGaughey, Phyllis Cavanaugh, Wanda Whitmire and Severina Smith.

Of the original group of 14 members, only Bonnie Osborn and Marion Hamblin are still active in the organization.

The group's first year was a busy one. It is a service organization and the first project was the sending of a fruit basket to the Klamath County Nursing Home. That program has been continued and expanded over the years.

The state Junior Chamber of Commerce convention was held in Klamath Falls in 1952 and the infant auxiliary assisted in putting on the event.

Other assistances to the Jaycees include acting as hostesses for persons coming through Oregon to the national Jaycee convention. They also helped the Jaycees entertain foreign students last summer at Lake of the Woods and arranged for their housing.

Money-making projects receive full cooperation of the group and usually take the form of bazaars, rummage sales, concession stands at the annual rodeos, dinners for the Teen-age Road-o and card parties. The money is used to further worthy projects and charities. In addition to giving money, the members make clothes and pajamas for needy children.

The Jaycettes hold two meetings a month, a dinner meeting and a business meeting. Their social events include picnics, dances, card parties and potluck dinners. There is no summer vacation for

this group of active young women. They are called on to chaperone roundup queen candidates on their outings, to assist with rodeo dances and concessions and to help with the Junior Miss Oregon dance and other events. They cooperate with the Klamath County Saddle Club at the rodeo queen tryouts and even help arrange for gifts for the successful candidates. Their service to their community and the entire Klamath Basin is recognized and demands for their services increase as the years go by.
