

Auburn, St. John's Out To Prove Ranks

Attempts by Auburn and St. John's (N.Y.) to convince the skeptics and another milestone for Baron Adolph Rupp of Kentucky basketball this week as full-scale play resumes in college basketball after time out for mid-term exams.

Auburn, ranked no better than fifth nationally despite a 24-game winning streak, plays pesky Vanderbilt Saturday at Nashville, where Vandy handed top-ranked Kentucky its only loss two weeks ago.

St. John's, now 12-1 with a nine-game streak and looking better

with every start, opens a three-game road test Thursday against St. Louis, a team that has also bagged nine straight after two early losses. The Redmen, rated seventh in The Associated Press poll, move on to Chicago Stadium Saturday against Chicago Loyola and then try improved Notre Dame at South Bend early next week.

While these try to prove themselves, king Kentucky has three games to pick up the two victories Rupp needs for 600 in his 29-year career as head man of the Wildcats.

Kentucky goes for 599 at Georgia Tech tonight and has home games against Georgia Thursday night and Florida Saturday night. Only three coaches have reached the 600th milestone at one school.

Ed Diddle of Western Kentucky, Henry Iba of Oklahoma State, and Edward Adams of Texas Southern.

The other seven members of the top 10 also are busy, with Kentucky (14-1) signaling the return of the Big Four which sat out last week to concentrate on examinations.

North Carolina, No. 2, and North Carolina State, No. 4, return in doubleheaders at Charlotte, N.C. Friday and Saturday. The Tar Heels, 10-1 and leading the Atlantic Coast Conference by a game over State, play Clemson Friday and South Carolina Saturday in league tests. State, (12-1) meets South Carolina Friday and Clemson Saturday.

Kansas State, No. 3, tries to protect its Big Eight Conference leadership against Iowa, State tonight, and has a non-league game with South Dakota State on Saturday. K-State has a 13-1 mark.

Cincinnati, No. 6 and the Missouri Valley Conference leader, plays league foes Drake tonight and Wichita Saturday. Michigan State, eighth nationally and the Big Ten pacesetter, has a home date with Northwestern Saturday, and Bradley, No. 9, faces Detroit tonight and Toledo on Wednesday before resuming its chase of Cincinnati with a Mo Valley game against Tulsa Saturday.

West Virginia, rated 10th, goes after its 43rd straight Southern Conference victory at George Washington tonight and has another conference test with William & Mary Friday.

Auburn's Tigers whipped Georgia Tech 66-55 and Georgia 81-61 for a 13-0 season record last week and were left the only major unbeaten Saturday night after St. Francis (Pa.) snapped St. Bonaventure's 11-n-0 unbeaten string, 92-81.

Giardello, the No. 4 man in the middleweight division, lost to Joey Giambra and was stopped by Spider Webb in two San Francisco matches last year. The Philadelphia boxer beat Jones, a Yonkers N.Y. scrapper, in two previous meetings.

Stefan Redl, born in Hungary, brought up in Germany and now fighting out of Paterson, N.J., is paired with Danny Russo of Brooklyn in the Monday fight at St. Nicholas Arena in New York.

Jesse Bowdy of St. Louis, a division winner over Clarence Hinchant of Washington in April, will try to do it again Tuesday night at Miami Beach.

Art Aragon, the Golden Boy of Los Angeles, goes against Charlie Sawyer at Hollywood, Calif. on Saturday.

Paul Jorgensen, the Port Arthur, Tex. featherweight who may be headed toward a title shot, faces Tommy Bain of Indianapolis in Houston on Tuesday.

Portland State remains undefeated at the top of the Oregon Collegiate Conference standings today after requiring two overtimes to overcome Southern Oregon 75-67 in a Saturday night contest.

Eastern Oregon won the other conference game, downing Oregon College of Education 63-50 in a game at Monmouth.

At Portland, the score was tied at 35 at the end of regulation play and at 41 at the end of the first overtime. Then Stan Weber, a 6-foot-6 substitute, sank five field goals and gave Portland State its fifth straight conference victory.

Tom Neel and Larry Howard each scored 18 points and led Eastern Oregon to its victory. EOC led all the way after an early 6-6 tie.

This week's schedule sends Oregon College of Education to Portland State, and Oregon Tech to Southern Oregon on Tuesday night.

Portland University said that the policy of the NAAU—requiring a school to play at least 50 per cent of its schedule against opponents who are not classified as major colleges—was responsible.

Portland has scheduled 16 of its 26 games against major colleges.

In past District 2 NAAU competition, Portland has won 17 of its 18 games. The school has played in nine regional playoffs and in eight national tournaments.

Army Grads Said In Line For Grid Job

WEST POINT, N.Y. (AP)—The field for the Army football coaching job today apparently had narrowed to three men—all West Point graduates.

The three are Jack Green, Tulane line coach; Bobby Dobbs, head coach at Tulsa, and Dale Hall, Army defensive backfield coach.

Li Gen. Gar Davidson, superintendent of the academy, said the three would be interviewed this week.

He also pointed out that it would be "desirable but not imperative" that the post be filled by a West Point graduate. However, only Green, Dobbs and Hall have been mentioned by Davidson.

Earl (Red) Blaik quit as football coach and athletic director two weeks ago.

Blaik refused to say who he favors—if anyone. However, it is known that Hall has been closest to him and is familiar with the personnel of the Army team. This will weigh in his favor.

Green and Dobbs also have served as Army assistant coaches under Blaik.

Gen. Davidson said Green will be interviewed Tuesday, Dobbs Wednesday and Hall Thursday. Blaik, presumably, will be present at the interviews.

Tempers Flare As Cincinnati Tips Syracuse

The running feud between the coaches and referees of the National Basketball Assn. showed no signs of slackening today in the wake of another outburst before a television audience.

The latest argument was between Syracuse Nationals' pilot, Paul Seymour, and Referee Jim Duffy Sunday in Cincinnati. The Royals snapped a two-game losing streak by defeating the Nats—109-104—but when it was all over Seymour had been banished.

The dispute came in the third period. Duffy called a technical foul on Syracuse veteran Dolph Schayes, who had been heckling the official all through the game.

This brought Seymour sprinting onto the floor. Duffy added another personal, and the trio stood on the court arguing. Finally the floor was cleared and Jack Twyman, who led the scorers with 33 points, made good on two free throws.

Maurice Podoloff, NBA president, watched the game but did not take part in the argument.

In other Sunday games, the Boston Celtics edged the Detroit Pistons, 119-118 in overtime; the St. Louis Hawks clipped the New York Knickerbockers, 115-111, and the Philadelphia Warriors downed the Minneapolis Lakers, 125-111.

It was a costly defeat for the Pistons as George Yardley, their high scoring ace, suffered a broken hand and will be lost to the team indefinitely.

Jim Lescoutoff of Boston sat out the game because of a back injury and it was feared he may be lost for the season.

The Celtics were led by Bob Cousy's 29 points in scoring their 14th victory in their last 17 games.

The Hawks' victory lengthened their Western Division lead to 14 games. Richie Guerin popped in 41 points for the Knicks.

Paul Arizin, the BA's No. 2 scorer netted 39 points to lead the Warriors to their victory over the Lakers. Elgin Baylor hit for 41 points for the losers.

In Saturday night's games, Boston turned back Philadelphia, 132-104. Syracuse licked Cincinnati, 123-102, and New York outscored Detroit, 122-118 in overtime.

Chiefs, Indians Cop Wins

Come through performances by such workmen as Seattle's Don Ogorek, Stanford's Paul Neumann and Fresno State's Jan Barrett gave West Coast basketball fans more to talk about today than usual.

Ogorek, although double-teamed most of the evening, sank 21 points Saturday to give the Chiefs an upset 81-60 victory over the Buchanan Bakers AU team.

Neumann came through with 16 points in the second half, although one miscue away from fouling out, for Stanford's 66-53 triumph over College of the Pacific. And Barrett, a sub, dropped in a pair of free throws with seconds to play which gave the Bulldogs a 78-76 chiller over Long Beach State.

In Saturday's only Pacific Coast Conference game, Washington rolled to his third straight victory by walloping Oregon, 79-60. The win nudged the Huskies into a three-way tie with Oregon State and Stanford for third place in the PCC. Pace-setting UCLA and second place California both have non-conference games this week.

Washington State, currently holding up the rest of the conference, had a rugged evening with Montana State's Bobcats and was not sure of its 61-53 victory until late in the second half when a driving layup by Jim Miles put the Cougars ahead for the night. Washington State had trailed most of the time until then.

The same goes for Stanford, which yielded a 29-26 halftime edge to College of the Pacific. The tide began to turn in the second half of this non-conference affair as Neumann hit from outside the key and close up to pull his team to the front. Dave Klurman, the Tigers' star from New Jersey, missed two successive free throws near the end which hurt the COP cause. Klurman collected 20 other points, however.

The Bakers ran into a red-hot Seattle squad which hit on 47 per cent of its shots and out-rebounded them 43-39. Jerry Frizzell and Sweet Charley Brown each netted 18 points to go with Ogorek's output.

Fresno State allied in the second half for its win over Long Beach, which led at intermission, 37-34. Fifty-one fouls were called during the rough game, including the one which let Barrett get his two free shots. The Bulldogs moved into second place in the Inland Collegiate Athletic Association on the strength of them.

HUSKIES BREEZE
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The lead changed eight times at Arcata before Humboldt State put down Chico State, 66-61, in a Far Western Conference game.

Edie Thomas of the Lumberjacks was high with 21.

Nevada moved off in the closing minutes to defeat San Francisco State, 69-67, in another FWC tilt. Stan Summers, the Wolfpacks' big center, made good on 14 of 16 free throws while putting in 25 points.

Only three Pacific Coast Conference games are on tap this week with Stanford playing in two of them. The Indians are at Oregon and Washington on Friday and Saturday. Oregon State meets Oregon in the other PCC fixture Saturday.

The West Coast Athletic Conference features exactly one league game—College of the Pacific at San Jose State Friday. San Diego State, unbeaten in the CCAA, is at Fresno State the same night.

John McHale Takes Over Braves Post

MILWAUKEE (AP)—John McHale of the Detroit Tigers—one of the youngest top executives in baseball—will take over the general management of the Milwaukee Braves.

McHale, 37, announced his surprise decision Sunday after meeting with Braves' owner Lou Perini and Executive Vice President Birdie Tebbetts.

"It definitely is a case of the job seeking the man and not the man seeking the job," Perini said.

McHale, in leaving the American League club where he was named general manager early in 1957, replaces John Quinn, who resigned to accept a similar position with the Philadelphia Phillies.

"McHale was at the top of our list of candidates for the general manager's job," Tebbetts said.

"When Quinn resigned we knew that we had to replace him with a top man. We looked around and decided that McHale was our man."

"I see it as a bigger job—a chance to expand myself and also to make more money," McHale said.

McHale earned an estimated \$30,000 with Detroit. Tebbetts said McHale would work for the Braves without a contract. There was no hint at McHale's salary.

Tebbetts added that McHale would have all the duties that Quinn had and would also be responsible for player trades and contracts. Tebbetts said, however, that the brunt of the contract chores would fall on him this season because McHale has unfinished business in Detroit "and won't join the team for some time."

McHale spent 18 years with the Tigers. He started in professional baseball with Beaumont in the Texas League in 1941. He had his best season with Buffalo in 1945 when he hit .313 and collected 22 homers. McHale subsequently worked himself up from the position of reserve first baseman to the Detroit manager's job.

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
