Senator Asks Access Study Of Federal Hunting Lands

A staff study by the Senate Interior Committee was urged today by Sen. Richard L. Neuberger as a step toward opening up for recreational uses "thousands of acres of public land now virtually locked up because it is isolated by private land holdings."

Neuberger said that the problem of providing hunters, anglers and campers with access to national forests and other publicly-owned tracts is especially acute in Western states where a checkerboard pattern of land ownership intermingles private and federal holdings. He asked Sen. James E. Murray of Montana, chairman of the Senate Interior Committee, to institute a staff review with appropriate officials in the Departments of Interior and Agriculture, who administer the federally-

owned units, and prepare recommendations for remedial legislation, if such action is deemed necessary. The Oregon senator said he had received numerous complaints in recent months from hunters and anglers who had been barred from crossing private land which surrounds federally-owned acreages. In one case, he explained, a private owner had levied a fee of \$25 for the privilege of crossing his land to hunt in a national forest.

In his request to Senator Murray, Neuberger said that "the Departments of Agriculture and Interior have power of eminent domain to assure ingress and egress on public lands, but there appears to be little evidence of the use of this authority."

"Likewise, procedures are available for establishing reciprocity right-of-way and road use rights between the federal government and private land owners," he added. "Failure of the departments to fully employ these statutory provisions is resulting in the locking up of vast areas of public land dedicated to multiple-use, including hunting, fishing, hiking and camping. Proper access to public lands will open thousands of additional acres to recreational uses."

Lack of reciprocal access between private and public lands also affects the management and harvesting of federally-owned timber, he said. It was estimated that about nine billion board-feet of timber is involved in Oregon national forests where "checkerboard" ownership exists.

KF'er Nabbed As Tree Thief

Two men have been arrested on federal charges of stealing Christmas trees from United States Forest Service lands, the Portland office of the FBI announced today. J. E. Mill, special agent in charge at Portland, said Gordon Charles McKay, 34, Klamath Falls, and Stel Deloss Loney, 35, an itinerant construction worker, will be prosecuted in federal court in Portland on the charge. Mill said McKay and Loney are charged with stealing about 600 White Fir and Shasta Fir trees from the Four Mile Lake area of Rogue River National Forest in the vicinity of Lake of the Woods. The thefts, Mill said, occurred about December 2-6, and the trees were intended for sale in California. Mill said none of the trees were covered. Loney was arrested by FBI agents in San Francisco January 21. Information against the two men was filed by the United States attorney in Portland January 7, Mill said.

SEVERELY DAMAGED  
Both cars involved in a Monday evening collision at the intersection of Riverside Street and Highway 97 were severely damaged, state police report. The accident reportedly occurred when an Army car driven by Kenneth G. Natland, Medford, ran into the front end of a car driven by Howard D. Pierce, 2142 Holabird Avenue.
