

Kentucky Wins 600th For Rupp; SL Victor

Long-time basketball powers Kentucky and St. Louis are riding higher than ever today—the Wildcats after nailing coach Adolph Rupp's 600th victory and the Billikens after snapping St. John's win streak at nine and ballooning their own to 10 in a row.

Kentucky put Rupp in the charmed 600 circle in his 29th coaching year with a 108-55 victory over Georgia at Lexington, St. Louis, led by 6-3 Bob Ferry and 6-7 George Burkel whipped St. John's 72-63 in the game that was supposed to indicate whether

the New York Redmen had made it all the way back to their national prominence of a decade ago. Mississippi State, beaten only by unbeaten Auburn, made it 15-1 in a 53-52 squeaker over Memphis State, and Dartmouth won its seventh straight for an 11-4 ledger 64-62 over Boston University in other features of the slim Thursday program.

Only Ed Diddle of Western Kentucky, among active coaches, has won as many as 600 at one school. He's 634-241 midway through his 37th season with the Hilltoppers. The late Ed Adams topped 600 at Texas Southern before his death last fall, and Hank Iba of Oklahoma State and Phog Allen, who retired two years ago at Kansas, both won more than 600 but not at the same school.

Allen bagged 771 victories in a 46-year coaching career, 591 as head man at Kansas. Iba has a career total of 625, of which 513 have come at Oklahoma State. St. John's No. 7 nationally, took a 12-1 record and nine in a row to St. Louis, the first stop on a three-game Midwest road trip in which the Redmen hoped to stamp themselves as the New York area's first national power in nearly a decade.

The Redmen of Joe Lapchick got up to within two points with about three minutes remaining. In the end it was St. Louis which proved itself.

Memphis State's Jim Hockaday held scoring ace Bailey Howell to his career low of 10 points, but Charles Hull filled the gap for Mississippi State with 19 points.

Dartmouth, which has won each of its last three games by two points, nipped Boston University on Rudy LaRusso's jump shot as the buzzer sounded. Rudy, who sat out of the first half, set up the winner by tying the score at 62 with a jumper with 90 seconds remaining.

Bolt settled for a 36-36-72, and Palmer, who won this event in 1957, had 34-38-72.

Souchak, who won four tournaments in 1956, didn't score again until he hit the St. Paul Open last year for the second time. He won \$21,089 in 1958.

One stroke behind the coleaders were Bo Winiinger, who had 31-35 and might have done even better if his ailing shoulder hadn't begun to kick up, and young Doug Sanders of Miami Beach, Fla., with 35-31.

Among the threats crammed in to the five-stroke margin were Jay Hebert and Bill Casper in the 67 group; Jack Burke Jr., Doug Ford and Stan Leonard in the 68 bracket; and Julius Boros and a host of lesser lights in the next two groups.

The main casualty Thursday might have been Winiinger. He has been troubled with a couple of dislocated ribs. This brought on a sore neck, and then the pain switched to his shoulder Sunday.

Souchak bagged eight birdies on his round, and Duden had seven. Souchak's longest putts were 25, 20 and 15 feet. Duden's finest shot was a 35-foot chip for a birdie two on the seventh.

Nats Topple Lakers, 117-91

Schayes, one of the all-time greats in the NBA, is 31 and has been the mainstay of the Nats for 10 years with his 20 points per game average. Thursday night though, he got only six.

Larry Costello, who scored 18 points, and Ed Conlin and Al Bianchi, each with 16, set most of the pace. Hal Greer, only 23, also chipped in with six.

Vern Mikkelsen led the Lakers with 16 points, while Elgin Baylor was held to 13.

Pitt Coach Out After 27 Years
PITTSBURGH (AP)—Carl Olson, developer of Olympic stars and track teams, is bowing out today after 27 years as track coach at the University of Pittsburgh.

"I'd say it's more of a semi-retirement," said the stocky, 65-year-old Olson. "I'll be available to help in any phase of athletics—coaching, planning or anything."

Olson first coached the 37th Division Army track and field team to a championship at Camp Sheridan, Ala., in 1917. That was soon after he obtained his degree from Springfield, Mass., college.

The doctor was almost as busy as the players in Detroit's 4-1 National Hockey League victory over the Montreal Canadiens Thursday night. At times the game took on aspects of a brawl.

When it was all over, the Red Wings had their first victory of the season over Montreal after six losses and three ties and were in fourth place by a one-point margin over the Boston Bruins.

Goalie Terry Sawchuk of Detroit came out of a scramble with a cut at the corner of his left eye. The cut required five stitches.

Claude Provost of Montreal got five to close a cut across the nose after being hit by Billy McNeill's stick. And Jean-Guy Talbot, also of the Canadiens, got three over his right eye as the result of being hit by a flying puck.

In the third period Provost drew a major penalty for inflicting a cut on McNeill with a high stick. In the same melee, McNeill and Henri Richard of Montreal were given minors for high sticking.

As for the scoring, Marcel Provost and Norm Ullman gave Detroit a 2-1 lead in the second period and Jack McIntyre added two more in the third. Henri Richard accounted for Montreal's goal.

DENVER (AP)—A triphammer left and one savage two-fisted flurry in the fifth round carried cool Zora Folley to an unanimous decision over Argentina's Alex Miteff in their 10-round heavyweight fight Thursday night.

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Cronin To Take American League Post On Saturday

NEW YORK (AP)—Joe Cronin officially will be installed as president of the American League when the major league club owners hold their annual midwinter baseball meetings here Saturday.

The Hall of Famer, who starred at shortstop for Washington and Boston for many years, recently resigned as general manager of the Red Sox after a special screening committee unanimously approved of him to succeed Will Harridge.

Harridge, 72, announced his resignation at meetings in Washington last December after having served for 28 years. Cronin will become the fourth president in the 57-year-old history of the junior circuit. The others were Ban Johnson and Ernest Barnard. Cronin, 52, joined the Senators in 1928 after having failed in a

brief trial with Pittsburgh. He was appointed manager in 1933 at the age of 26 and rewarded the owners by bringing in a pennant the same year.

Sold to the Red Sox for a record price of a quarter of a million dollars after the 1934 season, Cronin became Boston manager in 1935 and led the Red Sox through 1947, when he became general manager.

The only Red Sox pennant winner in the last 42 years — 1918 — was managed by Cronin.

Bucky Harris, veteran baseball figure, succeeded Cronin as Boston general manager.

The meetings will open with the leagues in separate sessions and close with a joint confab, under the supervision of Commissioner Ford Frick.
