**Bombs Blast Aides Homes**

ATLANTA (AP) — Four homemade bombs have been thrown against the homes of two supervisors of the Atlantic Steel Co. where a strike has been in progress for three months.

The bombs were made of large electric light bulbs filled with gasoline and aluminum paint. One bomb exploded. The other three misfired, scattering paint over the structures. No injuries were reported.

It was the second major outbreak of violence since the strike began Oct. 31. In November a wine bottle filled with flaming gasoline was tossed into the cab of a truck near the plant. The driver suffered serious burns but recovered.

Police said Thursday night the homemade bombs were tossed against the homes of Forrest L. Cheek and Lem Harris, foremen at the plant. Both men have continued to work at the plant, which has been operating on a limited basis with supervisory personnel.

Both company and union officials reported no immediate prospects of a settlement.
