The finest work these people do is to make beautiful Persian rugs. Mrs. Braman showed postcards typifying the Iranian way of life and reported that the people feel fortunate to have Americans come and help them. Lela Thurman, a guest of the evening, sang "The Song of Peace" accompanied at the piano by Leola Thompson.
