Two nights of work and the battle for the cellar spot in the Oregon Collegiate Conference standings is still up in the air. Oregon Tech's Owls and the Wolves of Oregon College went into the weekend's O.C.C. schedule tied for last spot in the five-team circuit, and they came out the same way.

Coach Wally Palmberg's Tech squad came back Saturday night to whip the visiting Oregon College quintet 58-39 in the second game of the weekend series to gain a split. Oregon College had won Friday night's game by the same nine-point margin, 57-48.

In fact, the O.C.C. standings failed to notice any change from the weekend's play. Portland State split its two-game series with Eastern Oregon at La Grande, but still maintained control of the league lead over idle Southern Oregon — by a slim single game.

Palmberg did some juggling in his starting lineup for Saturday night's game, and in some respects it paid off. Little Leon Wilson, up to Saturday night's contest the Owls No. 3 guard, sparked the Owls in his chance at the starting job. The Tulsa, Oklahoma, freshman scored 13 points, seven in the first half when Tech was building up a 10-point lead.

The big share of the Owls scoring came from Troy Koonz and Jim Ramseyer, another rookie two-man. Both first-year cagers fired in 15 points, each getting seven field goals and one free throw. The game's high scoring honors went to Oregon College's Ken Johnson with 16.

Tech opened the game by taking a 4-0 lead on field goals by Koonz and Leon Wilson. Then four minutes later, OCE was in command 7-6 after Denny Spencer, Gary Henry and Johnson each took turns scoring.

Oregon College boosted its lead to a 12-9 cushion before the Owls were able to untrack and find the scoring range once again. Koonz hit on two field goals, Paul Layher a single free throw and Charlie Wilson scored on a long one-handed push shot as OTI moved into a 15-12 lead with 5:35 left in the half.

The Owls led 21-17 with a little more than three minutes to go before intermission and hit another scoring streak, getting six straight points while blanking the Wolves. At halftime, the margin was 29-19 for the Techmen.

UW Huskies Kill Indians In Seattle

SEATTLE (AP) — A game that was slumber-slow in the first half was broken wide open after recess Saturday night by Washington and the Huskies walloped Stanford, 75-52 in a Pacific Coast Conference basketball game.

Stanford was using a jamming, sardine-can offense and Washington playing a cautious game in that first half which closed with the Huskies ahead 22-17.

The crowd of 8,200 got the treat it was waiting for when Doug Smart started filling the hoop in the second half after being held to two free throws in the first. He stacked up 19 points in that second period to top all the scorers. Dick Haga led Stanford with 16.

It took Washington two-and-a-half minutes to get its first point of the game; Stanford three-and-a-half. The visiting Indians never managed to get in front, although they tied the count at 7-7 and 14-14 before the Huskies took command. One first-half Stanford field goal was a gift when Washington's Bruno Boin was charged with goal guarding a shot by John Arrillaga.

Washington was charged with only three first-half fouls and Stanford with seven. Things livened up when the tempo quickened and Stanford lost John Hendry on five fouls six-and-a-half minutes from the finish. A technical foul was assessed the Stanford bench at one stage of the hectic last half.

The hook shooting of Bruno Boin and small contributions by the rest of the Washington club kept the Huskies in the action until Smart warmed up. When he finally got his first basket, three-and-a-half minutes into the second half, it started him on a string of six points and by that time Stanford was 13 behind. The Indians never again looked dangerous.

Washington connected on 50 per cent of its shots from the field.

Cougars Belt Loggers 64-50

Coach Al Shipman's Weed Cougars fired in 29 field goals Saturday night as they rocked the McClelland Loggers, 64-50, on the Cougars' home court.

McClelland took an early 3-0 lead, however, the Cougars fought back to lead 13-12 at the first quarter post and 28-23 at intermission.

The Loggers, coached by Bob Tomkinson, hit 16 of 27 free tosses but the home team continued their hot pace as they pulled a 44-38 third period lead.

Coach Shipman emptied his bench in the fourth quarter as all but two of his players scored.

Melton Bonneville led both teams in scoring as he counted 19 for the losers, while Doug Blankenship fired in 15 counters for the winners. Blankenship's teammates Woody Smith and Bob Zalund followed with 14 apiece.

The Klamath Union Pelicans climbed into a clear cut second place berth in the Southern Oregon Conference standings as they overpowered the Ashland Grizzlies 64-30 on Pelican Court Saturday night. The victory, the second in two days, gives the Pels a 6-0, 2-loss record for league play. Friday night the Pels survived a hassle in Central Point that ended 57-54 over Crater.

In Saturday's win, a game that saw coach Dean White clean his bench, the Pels battled on what seemed to be even ground with the Ashlanders for better than a quarter and a half before something snapped, sending them on their way.

The Pels scored the first two points in the game but slipped against the stiff Grizzly defense and found themselves at one point on the short end of a 12-3 score. With 2:38 left in the first period Dean Dunsen hit a long one from outside that started the Pels on their climb. With 1:30 left in the frame big Bob Petersen tipped in a rebound that tied the score 12 all, but the Grizzlies Bob Johnson sunk a layin to end the period 14-12 for the Grizzlies.

A big factor in the Whitebirds slow start was an ineptitude at the free throw line for the major part of the first two periods.

At the beginning of the second frame the Pels again scored first but they failed to catch the eager Ashland quint until there was only 3:20 left in the half. Petersen found the range at the charity line hitting both attempts giving the Pels a 17-16 edge. From here on there was little doubt as to the outcome of the game.

Thomas Tops Seven Foot High Jump

NEW YORK (AP) — Fantastic John Thomas, the 17-year-old Boston University freshman became the first man in history to high jump 7 feet indoors Saturday night when he cleared the height in the Millrose Games.

Only two weeks ago, the gangling lad set a world mark of 6-1 1/2 in Boston.

Saturday night, while a throng of more than 15,000 watched in Madison Square Garden, Thomas and Charlie Dumas, the first outdoor 7-footer, engaged in a tense duel.

Up and up they went as the opposition melted under the pace. Finally, both cleared 6-10.

The bar went up to 7 feet.

Thomas was first off the mark. He missed—badly. Didn't even come close.

Then it was Dumas' turn. He missed, too.

Back came young Thomas, who, incidentally, never had seen the great Dumas before.

He ambled up to the bar, and whoof! Over he went.

From the second his lithe body left the floor it was apparent he was over.

The crowd let out a tremendous roar and Dumas was one of the first to race to the youngster to wring his hand.

Dumas didn't make either of his two more tries.

So now there are five 7-foot high jumpers in the world—Thomas, Dumas and three Russians.

The outdoor record is 7-1, held by Yuri Stapanov, the Russian who caused all sorts of consternation last year when he cleared the height with a built-up shoe.

After he'd made seven feet, Thomas asked the officials to raise the bar to 7 feet, 1 1/4 inches, which would shatter all world records, indoors or outdoors, if he made it. But he missed on all three tries.

Earlier, Ron Delany jogged to his 2
