Confusion abounded during the closing seconds but the Pels' Dave DeLap put the clincher on the win with two free tosses to bring the count to the final score.

## Stanford Grabs Win From U.O. Webfoots

EUGENE (AP)—Oregon State with an eye toward a second Pacific Coast Conference championship, moved into Eugene Saturday night for a game with Oregon, whose basketball title hopes have nearly vanished.

On the basis of its 4-3 conference record, Oregon State was given the edge over the Ducks, who have won but one of five conference outings. The latest drubbing was applied by Stanford, which tripped Oregon 57-49 here Friday night. There were two big factors in the game.

Stanford's Paul Neumann got 19 points—7 of them in the second half. And in that second half, Oregon was able to sink only six of 31 attempts from the field and saw its lead quickly melt away.

After several early ties, Oregon moved ahead 25-17 late in the first half and led 27-23 at the intermission.

Oregon's Chuck Rask held Neumann to two points in the first half, but the Stanford flash quickly broke away after that. Jerry Theusen sank a field goal early in the second period and tied the score 27-27. Moments later, John Arrillaga's free throw sent the Indians ahead to stay.

Then Neumann went to work, and with eight minutes remaining in the second game Stanford opened up a 48-point lead at 49-33. Oregon, despite its second-half performance, finished with a 30-22 percentage. But Stanford sank 17 of 44 for 38.6.

Rask was Oregon's top scorer—with 10 points. The box:

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## KUHS Pelicans Win Hectic Cage Meeting From Comets

The timekeeper forgot the clock, the referees argued amongst themselves, the fans howled, the scorekeepers got confused, the cops assisted a Crater roofer or two from the arena and the Klamath Union Pelicans collected Southern Oregon Conference victory No. 10, 57-54, at Central Point Friday night. And the Pels have no one to thank for the win but themselves and their coach.

KU cage boss Dean White's terse comment, "People who didn't see the game shouldn't misunderstand—the final score was no indication of the type of game the kids played. I have never been more proud of my ball club than I am tonight," came in the dressing room following one of the most hectic games ever seen, even at Central Point.

After getting off to a slow deliberate start aimed at counteracting the tight zone defense of the Comets, the Pels maintained an 11-9 margin at the end of the first quarter, a 28-27 edge at the half and 41-33 bulge at the three-quarter post, despite the fact that the lead swapped owners four times throughout the test.

What started out to be merely a rough, hard-fought game between two able, determined squads deteriorated into a bruising fiasco in the fourth quarter as the Comets uncorked a brutal, full court press that took the control of the match almost entirely out of the hands of the referees. The Pels, showing remarkable poise in the situation, survived the onslaught.

## Starting Jobs Face Young Cub Pitchers

NEW YORK (AP)—Manager Bob Schefling of the Chicago Cubs has starting jobs awaiting two of his prized pitching rookies, right-handers John Buzhardt and John Anderson.

The two youngsters made a tremendous impression on Schefling last fall with the Cubs. Buzhardt had a perfect 3-0 record. Anderson, of Hammond, Ind., won three and lost three with the Cubs last season.

Another hurler who had a brief stay with the Cubs last year is Marcelino Solis. His sensational work at Fort Worth, where he won 15 and lost 2, earned him a promotion to the Cubs last July. He was used exclusively in relief.

Dolan Nichols, a right-hander, is back. Shipped to Fort Worth after dropping four decisions in relief, Nichols turned in an impressive 12-4 mark and earned another chance. Dick Ellsworth, the young bonus right-hander signed last June, brings a 7-7 record from Fort Worth.

Bill Gabler of Fort Worth, will get an opportunity to win the regular first base job from Dale Long. Gabler batted only .270 but he wallowed 23 home runs and drove in 94 runs.

Jerry Kindall, who hit .229 at Fort Worth, with 16 home runs and 65 RBIs, is back for another trial at second base. Don Eaddy, a shortstop, recently was discharged from service.

Bob Will heads a quartet of new outfielders. The others are Lou Jackson, Charlie King, and Bill Phillips.

Morris Thacker, a former New York Yankee farmhand, is regarded as a good bet to land a catching berth. In 88 games with Fort Worth, he batted .293.

Action in the County B League Friday night saw the Henley Hornets rack the Bly Bobcats with their second defeat of the season, 64-28 in a non-counter; second place Merrill rolled over the Chiloquin Panthers, 56-24; and the Bonanza Antlers posted their second straight conference win over the Malin Mustangs, 57-54.

The league standings remained unchanged except for the fact that the Bonanza Antlers, paced by Gary Atwood's 13 field goals, moved into a tie with Chiloquin for fifth place.

The Sacred Heart Trojans (4-4) and the last place Gilchrist Grizzlies (0-5) were idle.

**Henley 64, Bly 26**  
At Henley, coach Ted Ammerman's Hornets put on a blazing scoring attack, highlighted by some sharp passing, as they tallied 16 points in each of the four

quarters. Coach Al Samples' Bobcats, who hit only .200 of their shots from the field, lost their only scoring threat, ace pivot man Jerry Patzke, halfway through the third period, stifling any other Bly ideas of picking up their second win over the county's only A2 school.

The Hornet's nifty passing broke the Bly zone defense wide open as Burrell Gober, Henley's 6-3 center peppered the basket constantly with short jump shots, leading his team to a 16-6 first quarter lead and a 32-14 halftime bulge.

With four minutes remaining in the third period, Ammerman pulled his first stringers for a well deserved rest and handed the rest of the non-league contest over to the second team. However, the Hornets continued to pour in the points as the Bobcats simply could not find the range.

Bly counted only five points in the third period, those on a pair of field goals by Patzke and Gerry Henderson and a free throw by Carson Case as the Hornets pushed the score to 48-19 at the end of the third quarter.

Gober and teammate Lefty Larson led both teams in scoring as they jumped in 14 and 12 counters respectively, followed by Patzke, who canned 10.
