

Soviet Party Congress In Fifth Session

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Communist Party Congress went into its fifth session Saturday with another attack on the anti-party group.

The latest blast came from Aleksei Kirichenko, member of the party presidium and a key figure in the secretariat. He charged that the group went into action immediately after Stalin's death.

Kirichenko charged that ex-Premier Georgi Malenkov and his fellow groupers "were bogged in the morass of conservatism."

They attacked everything new he said, and were far removed from the life of the people.

Kirichenko called the defeat of the group "a great victory for our party" and went on to praise Premier Khrushchev's reorganization of industry and agriculture.

Attacks on the anti-party group have been the theme of a whole series of speeches to the Congress. But so far no demand for further punishment of them has been reported.

The Communist party organ Pravda published the text of Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko's speech delivered Thursday and the Moscow Radio read it to the Russian people.

Pravda also published a long statement by Nuritdin A. Mukhitdinov, official of the Uzbek Republic who is one of the rising younger leaders in the presidium.

He spelled out the program of Soviet help to the presidium of nations, especially in Asia, Africa and the Middle East.

Mukhitdinov and Leonid I. Brezhnev, another full member of the presidium, kept up attacks on the anti-party group.

War Criminal Appeal Denied

HAVANA (AP) — Former Army Capt. Pedro Morejon Saturday awaited execution as a war criminal after his appeal was denied by Cuba's supreme revolutionary tribunal.

The tribunal rejected Morejon's appeal from a lower court death sentence on charges of assassination, homicide, robbery, incendiarism and damage.

A Havana radio station said it understood Morejon would face a firing squad Saturday but this could not be officially confirmed.

The only recourse left to Morejon under the revolutionary penal code is a direct appeal to revolutionary leader Fidel Castro, now commander in chief of the nation's armed forces.

Morejon's execution would be the first in the Havana area. An unofficial total of 282 supporters of ousted dictator Fulgencio Batista have been shot elsewhere in the country.

The five-member supreme tribunal still has to consider the appeal of Map. Jesus Sosa Blanco, convicted of war crimes in the first showcase trial last week in Havana's Sports Palace.

The tribunal also has under consideration men 20 appeals from condemned men in the provinces. More than 1,000 men are still in Havana awaiting trials and a reported 3,000 more are held in the provinces.

Fire May Have Destroyed Four

SWIFT CURRENT, Sask. (AP) — Four members of one family are feared to have perished in a fire which destroyed a farmhouse near here Friday.

Charged parts of what described as "three or four bodies" were recovered from the debris-filled basement of the five-room bungalow where farmer Frank Wieler lived with his family.

Missing are Wieler, 29, his wife Marie, and their two sons—four-year-old Edwin and 10-month-old Ronald.

Lashing Storm Grounds Ship

TOKYO (AP) — Lashing storm winds broke the anchor chain of a Danish freighter at Otaru Saturday and drove her aground in shallow waters.

Japan's coast guard identified the ship as the 9,992-ton Kina, of Copenhagen.

There were no reports of injuries among her 47 crew members.

Cuba Recognizes U.S. Partisans

Big Chemical Tanks Blow Up

Mexico Jails 43 Americans

TIJUANA, Mexico (AP) — Forty-three Americans face the prospect of at least 24 more hours in jail here because they can't immediately raise bail ranging from \$1,500 to \$3,200 on gambling charges.

They were among 61 persons caught in a federal raid last Sunday night on a gambling casino adjoining the Rosarito Beach Hotel, about 18 miles south of Tijuana.

Mexican Federal District Judge Eduardo Langle Martinez set bail totalling \$75,200 for 44 Americans, most of them charged with playing gambling games or just watching them.

reka, gave a most enlightening talk on one of the most important requisites to have a productive soil, well as a beautiful garden—good, rich soil.

He described first how soil is a complex study, and how it is affected by climate, vegetation, and that its makeup includes air, water, minerals and organic matter, and he further told how worms, plants and many other factors work on it to change its structure. Color of the soil means little, except that dark soil is considered generally more fertile.

Crebbin then told how in planning a garden for certain varieties of flowers or plants, texture of soil is important, with preference being placed on sandy loam. If the soil is inclined to be heavy, the addition of sand can produce the required texture wanted. Also additions of humus, chemical compounds, sawdust, plant foods and nitrogen, serve as excellent aids to soils. Grading of the land will eliminate drainage problems.

Since lack of iron in the soil prevents plant leaves to turn yellow or pale, there are many sprays on the market that are helpful in eliminating that particular problem.

Final advice made by Crebbin was that in planning a garden, be sure that the soil is two or three feet deep, of good texture, with plenty of humus added to it, keep it reasonably damp, well-weeded and cultivate it.

In appreciation of Crebbin giving his time to present the talk to the club, members presented him with a new rose bush for his garden.

Following the talk by Crebbin, Mrs. Henrietta Terwilliger, president of the garden club, conducted the business session, which included a report by Mrs. Ernest Lilly, garden therapy chairman, who reported that decorations had been sent to the Siskiyou County General Hospital in Yreka for Christmas, and that cards had been sent to people who were ill throughout the month.

Mrs. Harold Coatney, who was named to present the "Now Is The Time" subject for the afternoon, stated that "Now Is The Time"—for using dormant sprays on roses; planting of sweet peas; pruning trees; dividing plants; and planting daffodil and tulip bulbs.
