Réservation Jaycees Seek Indian Queen Candidates

KLAMATH AGENCY — The Klamath Reservation Jaycees are searching for young Indian girls, 16 to 26 years old, living in the Klamath-Basin area, as candidates for the 1959 All-Indian Tournament Queen.



Candidates must have at least one-fourth degree Indian blood, have never been married, have references of good character, and not been a tournament queen, and have their own Indian costumes and accessories.

Entry blanks will be circulated this week at all high schools in the area, and can be obtained from the queen contest chairman, John Plouffe, at Chiloquin. Plouffe asks that all girls who desire to become queen contestants notify him immediately of their intentions to run. He can be reached at P.O. Box 96A or phone 401 in Chiloquin.

The deadline for signing up as a tournament queen candidate is February 14, so all interested Indian girls are urged to act immediately.

The candidates will be presented at the Queens Ball to be held the last night of the Oregon Elimination Tournament on February 28 in the old Chiloquin High School gym. At this time, a panel of three judges will have an opportunity to interview the candidates personally and judge their personality and poise.
