## Kentucky '5'. No. Carolina Poll Leaders

NEW YORK (UPI)—Kentucky, North Carolina and Kansas State remained 1-2-3 today in United Press International's major college basketball ratings but Cincinnati replaced North Carolina State in fourth place.

St. Louis was the only newcomer in the top 10. St. Louis, one of two teams which slipped, moved from 11th to 9th and appeared in the select group for the first time since the first weekly ratings of the season Dec. 9. St. John's, beaten also by Loyola (Ill.) Saturday night, slipped from 8th to 11th.

There were several minor changes in positions by other teams in the top 10. While North Carolina State slipped to fifth, Michigan State advanced from seventh to sixth. Auburn, only unbeaten major college team, slipped from sixth to seventh. Bradley moved from ninth to 10th. West Virginia remained 10th.

St. John's headed the second 10 group. It was followed in order by California, Marquette, Utah, Oklahoma City, Texas Christian, Mississippi State, Memphis State, UCLA and Northwestern.

## Kelley Quits Brown, Eyes Colgate Post

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (UPI)—Alva Kelley packed his bags today for a "fresh challenge" at Colgate after resigning as head football coach at Brown the past eight years.

Kelley, a boyish-looking 40, confidently told newsmen he was approaching the job at Colgate, which won only four games the past two seasons under Fred Rice, "without a single touchdown."

The resignation had been rumored for the past week. Kelley, a native of Natrona Heights, Pa., made it official at a news conference Monday. He said the resignation was effective Sunday and that he would arrive at Colgate Wednesday to get down to work in rebuilding the Hamilton, N.Y., university's football fortunes.

"A man needs a fresh challenge every now and then," Kelley said — almost a bit regretfully at the thought of leaving Brown. "Or else he dies on the vine. The challenge here at Brown has petered out. We have arrived at what we had set out to do. I believe that Colgate follows the Ivy League principles and that I can do the job to bring them back to their former position."

Rice resigned last week to accept a post as assistant coach at Marquette under Lisle Blackburn. Colgate won only one game last season under Rice, losing eight. The Red Raiders had a 3-6 slate two years ago in Rice's first year at the helm.

Kelley had a 5-4 record last season at Brown, bringing his eight-year slate to 31 wins, 39 defeats and 2 ties. Four of his last five teams notched winning records and the Bruins ended in a fourth-place tie among Ivy opponents the past two years.

**TICKET SALE GOOD**

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Despite their lowly finish in the Eastern Division race of the National Football League last season, the Washington Redskins reported today their 1959 season ticket sale has passed the 10,000 mark, nearly a third the capacity of Griffith Stadium. Sales are just about equal to last year, a club spokesman said.

## Davis Team Comes Home With Trophy

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The historic Davis Cup and the youthful hand of players who won it back from Australia were home today and looking forward to defending the battered silver trophy that for 50 years has been symbolic of world tennis supremacy.

Captain Perry T. Jones, the 70-year-old Southern California tennis mentor, and Alex Olmedo, the handsome Peruvian whose performances in Australia amazed the tennis world, were the center of attention Monday night when the Pan American plane from Australia landed at International Airport.

## CO-EDS SQUEAL

Olmedo, an undergraduate at the University of Southern California, drew shrieks and ohs from admirers, many of them co-eds at the university who turned out to greet him. A crowd of more than 250 gathered to welcome the returning heroes.

A 20-piece University band serenaded the team but played the Southern California fight song in Olmedo's honor.

"Right now all I want to do is rest and get ready for the new semester at the university," Olmedo said. "Then I'll start practicing for the Wimbledon Championships and the U. S. National at Forest Hills. I hope I will be chosen on the team to defend the Davis Cup."

Olmedo said he had no thoughts about turning professional but he paid tribute to Jack Kramer's pro troupe which worked with the U. S. Davis Cup squad for their help in making it possible to win back the trophy from Australia.

Jones lauded the sportsmanship of the Australians and their courtesy to the U. S. team which he termed "just wonderful."

"No Davis Cup captain ever had a finer group to represent our country," he said. "The impression these lads made on the Australians was just terrific. And the way they arose to the pressures and tensions of international competition was magnificent."

Turning to Olmedo, the team captain said "Alex was a great performer who played like an artist. We can feel fortunate that Alex adopted us and we adopted him to insure our victory."

## PRaises Richardson

Jones had a special tribute for Hamilton Richardson who teamed with Olmedo in the doubles victory, declaring it was that team spirit which insured the success of the Davis Cup squad. He also insisted the other members of the team — Chris Crawford, Barry McKay and Earl Buchholz — should share in their glory.

"Had it gone to the final singles match before the victory was decided, I am fully confident Barry McKay would have turned back a Mal Anderson and we would have won. But Olmedo's two singles victories and his teaming with Richardson made it unnecessary for McKay to prove he could do it."

## Hawks, Celts Pull Runaway In Pro Race

NEW YORK (UPI)—Pro basketball, for which all has been financial sweetness and lucrative light, is suffering today from the age old plight in which one or two teams get a competition-killing corner on the top talent.

"Break up the Yankees," was a fearful demand in the American League a few years ago when the Yankees' row was making ham-burger out of the opposition. The Yankees still are at it because nobody has caught up to the organizational lead they established.

The same thing has happened in pro basketball, where the Boston Celtics dominate the Eastern Division and the St. Louis Hawks overshadow the Western Division.

St. Louis has a 17-game lead over Detroit; 17-1/2 over Minneapolis and 24 over Cincinnati. Boston, in its division, has an 8 1/2 game lead on the New York Knickerbockers, 12 over Syracuse and 15 over Philadelphia.

**CUSTOMERS STAY AWAY**

Conditions such as these stifle the late season zeal of the trailing teams and keep the yawning customers away in droves.

There has been much discussion in National Basketball Association circles about expanding to the West Coast. But, before this is done, Walter Brown of the Celtics makes a telling point when he suggests that first those teams currently in the swim had best be strengthened into the status of competitors.

"We are strung out like a bunch of freight cars," he says. "Obviously this lack of balance is hurting the whole league in the matter of attendance. We must restore the element of competition."

Brown suggests, as a possibility that maybe his own Celtics and the Hawks should pass up their draft choice to give the weak sisters a crack at some of the top college stars when they become available for pro duty.

**REQUIRES MUCH THOUGHT**

This, it must be noted, is only a suggestion. Brown asserts firmly that "it requires a lot of thought." Personal aims and gains naturally require him to think of the Celtics first and the league second.

As example, he points out that the whole status quo may be changed drastically when Will (The Stilt) Chamberlain joins the Philadelphia Warriors after the 7-foot-7 serves his current year with the Harlem Globetrotters. One player like Chamberlain

could change the Warriors from also-rans to champions.

"But certainly this isn't the time to go west," Brown contends. "First we must strengthen our present teams."

**CITIES EYE FRANCHISES**

Chicago, San Francisco, Los Angeles, Houston and Portland all are looking forward to eventual membership in the NBA. Abe Saperstein, head of the Globetrotters, has dipped in a foreign ocean to advise the NBA agents that it should go to the coast.

"But the chances are that we'd only be picking up some more weak sisters while adding to our expenses," Brown insists. "Mean-while, nobody can start yelling 'break up the Yankees' to us or St. Louis."

Why not? Well, the basketball balance of power is an unpredictable item. Bill Russell is the top man for the Celtics and yet, it is theorized, Chamberlain may handle him when he gets in. One man makes that much of a difference in pro basketball. So nobody wants to give away too much—and yet if they don't the attendance drop could be fatal. Thus the pros are the victims of their own proficiencies.

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## College Cagers Roll Up Winning Streaks

Auburn's streak of 25 basketball wins is amazing, all right, but how about the streaks being run up by Marquette, Kansas State, St. Louis and Cincinnati?

These four high-ranked teams, bidding for even more attention as their winning strings build up, all added another notch Monday night—No. 13 in a row for Eddie Hickey's rebuilt Marquette team, 12 in a row for both Kansas State and St. Louis, and eight straight for Cincinnati.

Marquette, a real surprise package squad which has climbed to the No. 13 national ranking with a 15-1 season record, romped to a 78-63 win over Detroit as the razzle-dazzle style installed this year by ex-St. Louis tutor Hickey

paid off again. Big Mike Moran led the winning Warriors with 17 points, although Larry Hughes had 18 for Detroit.

**K-STATE BEATS NEBRASKA**

Kansas State (16-1), the nation's No. 3 team, remained in first place in the Big Eight as it downed Nebraska, 50-43, in a ball-control battle. Six-eight Bob Booz-ence again was high gun for K-State with 22 points as the wildcats snapped Nebraska's home-court winning streak at 13 games.

The ninth-ranked St. Louis team Hickey left behind romped to a 98-57 win over North Texas State to put its season record at 14-2. Six-eight Bob Ferry had 25 points and George Burkel 20 to pace the rout. Jim Mudd had 20 in the first half for North Texas State but was held to seven in the second.

National scoring leader Oscar Robertson rolled up 27 points to pace fourth-ranked Cincinnati (14-2) to an 84-71 win over Tulsa. The victory kept the Bearcats in first place in the Missouri Valley Conference.

**MSU, BRADLEY WIN**

Two other teams with high national rankings but no long streaks also posted important wins Monday night. Sixth-ranked Michigan State clung to first place in the Big Ten with an 88-57 rout over Wisconsin as Johnny Green led a well-balanced attack with 18 points. And eighth-ranked Bradley remained tied with St. Louis for second place in the Missouri Valley Conference with a 60-52 victory over Wichita as Bobby Joe Mason scored 20 points.

Tournament time, target of all these high-ranking teams, came a little closer with the announcement that the National Invitation Tournament—at New York, March 12-15—has sent "feelers" to these 15 teams—Boston College, Dayton, DePaul, Fordham, Holy Cross, Marquette, Niagara, Oklahoma City, Providence, St. Bonaventure, St. Francis (Pa.), St. John's, St. Mary's (Calif.), Villanova and defending champion Xavier of Ohio.
