High priced International Business Machines was around 92 points to the good. Fruehauf Trailer was up about a point. Graham-Paige added a fraction. Sharon Steel advanced well over a point. U.S. Steel was around a point lower. Bethlehem was about unchanged. American Motors was clipped for more than a point loss. General Motors and Chrysler dipped slightly. U.S. government bonds were steady.

Deepest deposit recorded for a comparable date was 135 inches with a 51-inch water content in 1952. The least snowfall was recorded in 1947 when seven inches of snow held but a two-inch water content. Last year's measurements were 88 and 28.

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Americans Eye Release From Jail

TIJUANA, Mexico (UPI)—Three of the 44 Americans arrested in the Jan. 25 gambling raid on a Rosarito Beach casino remained in jail today. They hoped to raise bail by nightfall. Relatives, friends and business associates chipped in to raise bail ranging from \$400 to \$800 for nine Americans released Wednesday after a Mexican judge reduced the \$1,600 bail each originally set for the Americans. Remaining in jail were Joe Woods, San Diego, Calif.; Jack Russell, Los Angeles, and Nick Podar of Santa Monica, Calif. Podar is accused of helping operate the raided gambling game and is held in lieu of \$2,200 bail. Bail for the other two men is \$400 each.

Further protests by United States officials at the treatment of the arrested Americans were voiced, including the introduction in the California Legislature of a resolution asking federal action and the release of the remaining imprisoned Americans. State Sen. Hugo Fisher (D-San Diego) presented the resolution in which he termed the bail set for the Americans as exorbitant. There were indications that treatment of the Americans by the Mexican court would be further relaxed. Attorney Alejo Orbananos, representing several of the U. S. nationals, said the court had indicated to him that Americans would receive fines of only \$50 and suspended jail sentences. Federal District Judge Eduardo Langle Martinez also offered relief to Americans already out on bail by modifying his original ruling that defendants in order to protect their bail bonds must return here each Saturday until their trial. He ruled Wednesday that Americans would have to return only once a month to register before the trial. The San Diego Waiters and Bartenders Union and San Diego tavern owners put up \$1,600 bail for bartenders Howard E. Hurst and Stewart Harper Wednesday while friends and employers posted bail for seven other prisoners. Others released Wednesday included Carl Hall, San Francisco; Monte Haight, Santa Barbara, Calif.; Norman Hume, Los Angeles; George Merrick, Las Vegas, Nev.; Lester Schick, Burbank, Calif.; Alejandro Quijano, Otay, Calif.; and James Delk, El Cajon, Calif.
