Couple's Woes Touching; Officials Drop Charges

HOUSTON, Tex. (UPI)—Officials were so touched by the troubles of the young couple who sold their 8-year-old twin boys for \$500 that they dropped all charges against them. Officers of help for the couple were put forward. Dist. Atty. Dan Walton told Justice of the Peace W. C. Ragan Thursday "I see no purpose to be served in prosecuting these people. What they need is help. I recommend dismissal of the charges." Ragan did just that.

"I've been hoping someone would make such a motion," he said. Mr. and Mrs. Clark D. Stillion Thursday turned over the twins, Mrs. Stillion's children by a previous marriage, to a policeman and a juvenile officer who posed as a childless couple.

The officer gave Stillion \$300 in marked bills and promised to return in an hour with \$300 more. In return Stillion made out a "bill of sale" for the boys. The officers arrested the couple and charged them with selling minor children.

Besides the twins, who were born in England before their mother moved to the United States, the Stillions have two girls, Nancy, 4, and Tina, 3. Mrs.

Stillion divorced the twins' father in England in 1953, and married Stillion, then stationed in England with the U. S. Air Force.

Walton told city probation officials he had talked with both parents and felt there should be no effort to take the children from them.

An attorney said a client, O. K. Tautenhahn, had offered the Stillion family a place to live near Westfield, Tex. He said there was a school nearby and offered to help them find work. Stillion said he had been unable to get a job and had been trying to feed his family on \$12 a week.
