Free Throw Contests Set For Youths

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Local contests in the state grade school free throw championships will start soon in towns and cities throughout the state and boys wishing to enter are asked to contact the various Elks clubs.

Finals of the event which is sponsored jointly by the OSC Athletic Department and the State Elks Association, will be staged at Gill Coliseum on Saturday afternoon and evening, February 28.

Local Elks lodges throughout Oregon will sponsor contests to determine the 36 county winners. The victors in county competition will travel to Corvallis for the semifinals at 2 p.m., Saturday, February 28. The top four then will compete in the finals that night at halftime of the OSC-Idaho basketball game.

The overall winners will receive an expense-paid trip with the OSC basketball team to Stanford and California on March 3-6-7-8. He will be treated as a member of the official OSC party and will serve as an assistant squad manager for the Beavers. The four finalists all will receive trophies.

R. S. "Spec" Keene, athletic director, has designated the OSC-Idaho game as "State Elks Night."

All 36 county free throw leaders will be guests at the game. A committee of three men—Jack Zimbrick, Lebanon; Rex Smith and Jim Barratt, Corvallis—has been named to conduct the championships.

State Elks president Jack Judson of Ontario will present the trophies to the four top shooters on February 28. Those entered must be of grade school age, and participants may shoot free throws in a manner of their own choosing. This will be the first annual statewide free throwing contest.

Ortega Tops Rudell Stitch

NEW YORK (AP)—The "Unlucky Indian" finally got lucky. Gaspar Ortega of Mexico, consistently a loser of split decisions, scraped home a winner over Rudell Stich although he almost was scalped.

An unintentional butt by Stich early in the third round Friday night opened a gash over Ortega's left eye. For a time, it seemed it might be bad enough to stop the fight.

"I didn't mean it," said Stich in the Madison Square Garden dressing room after the 10-round match. "I came up and just happened to hit him."

Stich, a Louisville welter who was making his Garden debut, admitted the bout was close but thought he should have been given the decision.

The officials were divided. Judge Frank Forbes saw it 6-4 for Ortega, Judge Tony Castellano scored it 5-4-1 for Stich. Referee Al Berli had it even in rounds at 5-5 but gave Ortega his vote on points 7-6.
