Man Killed In Accident

WEED — A three-car accident five miles south of Yreka on Highway 99 about 11:20 Saturday night claimed the life of a Weaverville man, Hilton Lee Hiett, 46.

A southbound automobile, driven by Mrs. Jacqueline Duncan, 39, of Klamath Falls, apparently skidded on an icy spot on the pavement causing the car to go into the northbound lane crashing head-on with a vehicle driven by Francis West of Yreka. Hiett was a passenger in the West car.

The California Highway Patrol reported that Hiett was not thrown from the West car.

A third car, also northbound, driven by Mrs. Melina Hiett, Weaverville, with Mrs. Francis West, Yreka, as a passenger, was unable to stop and crashed into the rear of the vehicle driven by West. Mrs. Hiett is the wife of the victim, and Mrs. West, the wife of Francis West, were following their husbands' car and saw the accident, but were unable to stop in time. Neither Mrs. Hiett nor Mrs. West were injured.

Mrs. Duncan and West are in the Siskiyou General Hospital in Yreka with major injuries and, at the last report, Mrs. Duncan is on the critical list.

Hiett's body was taken to Girdner's Funeral Home in Yreka. An autopsy was to be performed by the Siskiyou County coroner this morning.

Mrs. Duncan was cited for failing to drive on the right side of the road. Her husband, James Duncan, a former announcer with KFIJ in Klamath Falls, was reported to be somewhere in Arizona.

Train Kills 4 Autoists

CANBY, Ore. (AP) — A freight train crashed into an automobile at a grade crossing here today, killing four people.

Tentative identifications listed them as Harold R. Cattle, 41, Leonard A. Nixon, Irene Koch, 12, and Lonnie Germaine, all from Canby.

The train was a northbound Southern Pacific freight which started at Eugene this morning and had been dropping off freight cars. When it reached here it had only one car and the caboose.

The car, traveling on a road that intersected 99E on the car side of the tracks, was thrown a hundred feet by the impact.

Both men were caught in the wreckage and cutting torches were used to free the bodies. The others were thrown from the car.

The deaths brought Oregon's highway toll to 10 this month. Two persons were killed Sunday: Charles Wall, 37, of Oregon City near that city and Leith D. Schock, 17, of Salem, on Portland's S. W. Barbur Blvd.

Thus far in 1959 there have been 42 deaths on Oregon highways.

Runaway Lad Found Dead

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Charles Mathews, 11, a runaway, was found dead Sunday in an abandoned building where he had taken refuge because it was complete with a mattress and a gas heater.

But police said he didn't even get a chance to eat the quart of ice cream that he took when he ran away from home after a quarrel with his mother Friday night.

Deputy Coroner James Leonard said the boy apparently turned on the heater — and "signed his own death warrant." Investigation showed that:

—There was no ventilation in the room so he may have suffocated.

—He may have been poisoned by leaking gas because a feeder line to the heater was broken.

—He may have been asphyxiated by fumes because the heater was loose from the chimney.

Brother Clubbed With 'Own' Leg

COMPTON, Calif. (UPI) — Robert E. Banagas, 27, yanked off his brother's artificial leg and clubbed him over the head with it during an argument Sunday night, sheriff's deputies reported.

Robert, an assembler, also broke an empty bottle over the head of the brother, Armando, 24. Robert was booked on suspicion of assault with a deadly weapon.

Narcotic Deaths Probed By Police

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — Police searched today for a possible link in the narcotic-caused deaths this weekend of three Sacramento area young men.

Deputy Coroner William Wells said the three victims, all of them 23 years old, died from heavy overdoses of narcotics.

One of them, Jerry Allen Blair, Elk Grove, had been involved in the burglary of a Sacramento pharmacy, the deputy said.

Blair was pronounced dead on arrival Sunday at the Sacramento County Hospital. Roy Ernest Cook, Sacramento, died Saturday, and Peter Garcia, also of Sacramento, was found dead Friday.

Wife Slain; Man Suicides

ANDERSON, Ind. (AP) — An Anderson man shot his estranged wife to death and wounded an evangelist riding to work with her today, then drove into an alley and killed himself.

Patrolman Doyle Wright said evangelist James Moyer reported Sam Stigall drove up behind the car of his wife, Eva Mae Stigall, 42, and fired repeatedly into the car.

Moyer said Stigall fired at least two more rifle bullets into his wife after she fell out of the car onto the street.

Moyer said Mrs. Stigall had just stopped to pick him up to give him a ride to the factory where both worked, and Moyer took the wheel. He said Mrs. Stigall fell into the street as he started backing the car to try to escape the rain of bullets.

Moyer, father of four children, suffered a flesh wound in the left ear and drove Mrs. Stigall's car to police headquarters. He was treated in a hospital.

Woes Faced By Bigamist

SAN JOSE (UPI) Brian Alrich Wahlken, 22, admitted Sunday it's pretty tough to support two wives on a \$40 a week unemployment check — especially when both wives are expecting.

Wahlken, of Mountain View, was jailed on a bigamy charge filed by wife No. 2, Rachel, 22, a theater usher. The complaint charged that he failed to divorce wife No. 1, Jennie, 24, a beautician.

The unemployed draftsman said he married Jennie in Reno, early last year. But bills kept piling up, so he decided to "get away from it all" — and met Rachel, whom he also married in Reno.

Wahlken told police he spent one night each week with Jennie, and then "went to look for work." The next six nights were spent with Rachel.

Capehart Housing Tracts Turned Over To Air Force

The Air Force announced today that the three and one-half million dollar contract for the construction of 220 Capehart Title VIII family housing units at Kingsley Field was completed by the contractor and turned over to the Air Force in ceremonies at the Commonwealth, Incorporated. Of the construction of the Kingsley Field houses by the Gresham-Alcan Construction Company of Santa Clara, are the first Capehart homes to be built in the Air De-

fense Command. An additional 70 units, which are being built under a separate contract, will be completed sometime this spring.

The housing units, located four miles south of Kingsley Field, are of standard construction with concrete footings and hardwood floors. A total of 22 units are two-bedroom duplexes for lieutenants and captains; 30 are three-bedroom duplexes for majors and lieutenant colonels; and two are four-bedroom single units for colonel and the base commander. Half of the total number of units, or 110 are three-bedroom duplex units for airmen.

Each of the new homes have automatic washers and dryers, garbage disposal units, electric heating, garages and spacious front and back yards.

Representatives present in Portland for the final closing and transfer ceremonies were: Edgar H. Boyd, attorney from Hq. USAF, Washington D.C.; Harry Keating, Air Force contracting officer, Kingsley Field; Stephen L. Sanford, assistant AF contracting officer, Kingsley Field; Oscar Pederson, director of the federal housing administration in Portland; Joseph N. Gresham, president of the Gresham-Alcan Company; and Buckner, representing the Commonwealth Corporation.

Col. Jack W. Williams, Kingsley Field base commander, said that the completion of the new housing units will bring about complete integration of the base's major purpose, operation of the 408th Fighter Group. Lack of housing, he said, delayed the activation of Kingsley Field to full operational status.

Indonesia Gets Light Weapons

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — The United States is selling Indonesia enough light weapons and vehicles to equip 20 new battalions, or about 14,000 troops. It is the first major sale of American military equipment to the island republic in several years.

The deal also includes one Navy ship-type not disclosed—and other Navy and Air Force items.

Assembly Picks Prime Minister

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — The new Constituent Assembly performed as expected today and elected Field Marshal Sarit Thanarat prime minister.

Sarit is the strong man leader of the ruling Revolutionary party. He headed the coup which ousted Premier P. Pibulsonggram in late 1957. Last October, he disbanded the National Assembly and put Thailand under full military rule.

Jury Picking Underway

Selection of a jury for the trial of Paul R. Wilson, 28, Fort Klamath rancher charged with the theft of a cow from Chiloquin rancher Lorenz G. Vanderkamp last spring, got under way late Monday morning in circuit court, after Judge David R. Vandenberg denied a renewed defense motion for a change of venue.

Joseph O. Stearns, Portland attorney who, together with Glenn D. Ramirez of Klamath Falls is defending Wilson, explained to the court that he was renewing the motion for a change of venue, which had been denied by Judge Vandenberg on Friday, in view of the article on the trial which appeared in Sunday's issue of the Herald and News.

Judge Vandenberg said that he had read the article in question. He said there was a slight inaccuracy of wording in the article at the point where it described the dismissal of one case against Wilson and his employee, Eldon L. Shafer, on a motion of the district attorney. However, the judge said that the fault was not a grave one, and he did not go along with Stearns.

The attorney had claimed that publication of the article made a fair and impartial trial in Klamath Falls "impossible." At the judge's request, Stearns submitted a motion in writing, which the judge denied. Stearns took an exception to the ruling.

A letter was read from the Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors stating the cost of housing city prisoners in the county jail will be \$2.25 per day. The city will inquire on possible county reimbursement for housing prisoners accused on state, county or federal charges.

A suggestion was made by the mayor that a 5 per cent per month penalty be imposed on delinquent business licenses. City Attorney Howard Jones was instructed to recommend business license ordinance revisions.

Rutledge was released from Klamath Valley Hospital Friday morning, but was admitted to Hillside that night. He was the driver of a car, northbound on Alameda Avenue, which collided head-on with a southbound car driven by Richard Krois, 17, 1627 Worden Street. Krois was released from Hillside after being held for observation. Other occupants of the two cars were released from Klamath Valley Hospital after treatment.
