Sanitarian May Be Hired

YREKA—Following an urgent appeal made by Dr. J. P. Taylor, Siskiyou County physician-health officer, concerning the increased necessity for improvement of sanitation conditions existing in the county, the Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors agreed to take under consideration the employment of a \$500 per month sanitarian. Dr. Taylor brought up the subject of employing a county sanitarian, based on the grounds of a great need for one to handle the water and sewer problems in the county. He offered to show examples for the necessity of improved sanitation in any one of the districts in the county. Dr. Taylor stated that at present Siskiyou County is only spending \$2,050 per year on public health. He then explained how the expenses entailed in hiring a sanitarian would cost the county a total of \$10,000 per year. A contract with the state to furnish health department facilities, on a matching basis for counties under 40,000 population, would cost the county an additional \$17,000. Dr. Taylor also stated that the remainder of the \$40,000 annual budget, under the contract plan, would be augmented by the state and federal governments. Supervisor S. C. Jackson agreed that the employing of a sanitarian might be a good plan, and he said he received more complaints on sanitation conditions than on road problems. He also stated that he did feel that the county was not large enough to set up a full-time health department, on a contract basis with the state. Robert McKean, Siskiyou County hospital administrator, suggested that incorporated cities within the county might be able to aid in the cost of a sanitarian by subcontracting for his services. Supervisor Earl Ager of Tulelake stated that he was planning on contacting the Modoc County officials, and discussing the possibility of Siskiyou and Modoc counties sharing the services of a sanitarian. Supervisors W. A. Barr and W. C. Ealy were not present for the discussions, which will be resumed in the spring at budget time.

Health Officer Sets Salk Dates

YREKA—Dr. J. P. Taylor, Siskiyou County health officer, urging Siskiyou County residents to join in the nationwide efforts to stamp out polio with the Salk vaccine, announced recently that an eight-week series of inoculations against the disease will be given on Thursdays from 1 to 3 p.m. at the county hospital clinic. The first of the series began February 5. Dr. Taylor says that the free shots will be made available to families, who for some reason feel they cannot afford the inoculations for themselves and children. The county health doctor urgently stressed that other residents arrange for the full series of three immunizations from their family doctors.

Transfer Firm To Change Hands

YREKA—George Strofeld, who has owned and operated the Yreka Transfer Company for over 32 years at the same location at 404 West Miner Street in Yreka, will sell the business to Tony Crovella, February 16, according to an announcement made by Harry Hammond, attorney for the transaction. Crovella will purchase the business from Strofeld, which operated under the name of Yreka Transfer. This includes a dray business, oil distribution, garbage collection and warehousing. An employee for the past eight years of the J. F. Sharp Lumber Company, Crovella also had worked prior to that time for Fruit Growers Supply Company for seven years. Valued at \$11,000, the business was sold through Western Ranch Sales of Yreka. Crovella's plans are to continue the company's former operations. He will retain Mark Ager, a long time employee of the business.

Kuchel To Speak At Lincoln Meal

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel (R-Calif.) will be the principal speaker tonight at a dinner of San Francisco Republicans celebrating the 150th anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln. The Lincoln Day dinner will be one of 5,000 such dinners the Republican party will hold throughout the nation. It will mark Kuchel's first speaking engagement here since his election to the post of GOP whip in the Senate.

Governor Of California Declares War On Smog

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — Gov. Edmund G. Brown today declared war on smog. In a special message to the Legislature, the Democratic governor proposed a six-point state program to combat air pollution. It would only cost \$225,000 the first year but the governor warned "the cost may be substantially larger in succeeding years." Brown's main recommendation was to ask the Department of Public Health to set up standards to measure pollutants coming from motor vehicle exhausts. He hinted legislation may be necessary to compel motorists to equip cars with smog control devices. The governor was openly critical of the automobile industry for failing to develop smog controls for cars. "Companies which trifle with the public health or scoff at the genuine alarm of the people about smog are certain to regret it in the long run," Brown said. "They will learn to their sorrow that the health of the people is more important than tailfins or chrome." When antimog devices for autos are developed, the governor said a statewide standard for exhaust discharges "will provide a vital basis for legislation which may be necessary to compel their use." In addition to asking the Public Health Department to develop and publish standards for discharge of pollutants from autos by Feb. 1, 1960, he also proposed that: —The Department of Motor Vehicles launch an immediate study to determine the most efficient system for the inspection of vehicle exhaust discharges. —The Legislature pass a law requiring the Public Health Department to develop and publish by Feb. 1, 1960, standards for air quality. "Years ago," he said, "the spread of disease and sickness required health authorities to develop standards for our drinking water. The time has now come for California to take the lead and establish standards for the purity of air." —A state-supported air-pollution field unit of the Public Health Department be set up in Los Angeles. The unit should make an intensive study of both the acute and the chronic effects of smog," the governor said. —Funds for contract research on air pollution should be increased by \$100,000. A total of \$162,300 already is in Brown's budget for smog research. —A regional air pollution control district should be set up in San Joaquin Valley. Brown said the responsibility for fighting smog rests not only with the state but with the federal government, counties, cities and districts. Primary responsibility, he said, should lie in local control districts. But he added that he had urged the President and Congress that the federal government "shoulder its share of the burden." "Now," he said, "in this message I have outlined the obligations which I am convinced must be assumed by the state. "The dimensions of this problem plainly require a major effort by all of us."

Resignation Is Declined

YREKA — The resignation of Mrs. Estelle Isaacs, county tax collector and treasurer, was temporarily declined by the Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors at the meeting held Tuesday, February 3. Mrs. Isaacs had been appointed to the post on November 13, 1956, upon the death of her husband, Jack, who had also held it for many years and she was elected to it last June. The reason the board declined the resignation, where in Mrs. Isaacs states she wishes to leave the office as of March 17, was due to her addressing each member of the board individually instead of the board as a whole. In her letter, Mrs. Isaacs stated that at the time she ran for reelection, she had not foreseen the future events and fully had expected to complete her term for which she was elected. Three applications for the post have been received for the position, which pays approximately \$7,500 a year with inheritance tax fees. Those applying for the job are Gordon Bray, employee in the Cooley and Pollard wholesale department for the past 14 years; Robert J. Ohlund, deputy county assessor; and Carl H. Johnson, employed in the Siskiyou County surveyor's office.

City Of Yreka Left \$90,000

YREKA — A \$90,000 bequest, which was left to the city of Yreka in the will of Mrs. Nellie M. Ringe, was made public today by Floyd A. Merrill, attorney for the Bank of America, executor of the will. The will was executed on September 2, 1954. The bequest is to be used for a swimming pool as a memorial to the late Mr. and Mrs. S. Ringe. Other smaller bequests were to relatives, the University of California and the Salvation Army, and for the upkeep of the family burial plot in Yreka. Mr. Ringe made his money by making saddles in Linkville, now known as Klamath Falls.
