Burial Set For Slain Boy

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. (AP)—Four-year-old Albert Rotal will be buried today while his father remains in jail, charged with murder.

The boy's foster parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Rotal, will attend the Lutheran funeral services. His father, Louis Kish, 41,

meantime faces arraignment on the murder charge.

The body of the child was found Saturday in a crude grave of dirt, brush and leaves. His face was bruised.

He had disappeared Friday from a department store, where he had gone with his foster mother.

Police picked up Kish and charged him with breach of peace, a common holding charge in Connecticut. He was re-arrested the following day on a coroner's warrant. Today he was charged with murder and ordered held without bond.

Kish consistently has denied any connection with the death.

Speed Bill Given Solons

SACRAMENTO (UPI)—A bill permitting California motorists to drive 65 miles an hour—but no faster—was on its way through the Legislature today.

The Assembly Transportation Committee cleared the measure for action on the lower house floor late Monday after Inspector Dan O'Connell of the Highway Patrol said the public would be more likely to obey a "reasonable" speed law.

O'Connell told the lawmakers that the patrol would "enforce the law as the Legislature writes it."

If the bill, by Assemblyman Walter I. Dahl (R-Oakland), is approved by both houses of the Legislature, it will eliminate the flexible features of the current 55-mile top limit. Under existing law, if a motorist can prove he was driving safely, he can exceed the limit without breaking the law.

O'Connell said the measure would not have the effect of raising the average speed on California highways because he said the 55-mile limit was generally ignored by motorists and officers alike.

The 65-mile limit was a part of Gov. Edmund G. Brown's highway safety program.

Ex-Con Sent Back To Jail

PITTSBURGH (AP)—While serving a 10-year prison term for bank robbery several years ago, Ralph E. Richardson volunteered for a risky medical experiment.

He and two other inmates of the federal penitentiary at Lewisburg, Pa., were given injections of hepatitis virus which produces inflammation of the liver.

Two of the volunteers died. Richardson survived, but he was in a coma for weeks, developing both pneumonia and gangrene. His weight dropped from 210 to 145 pounds.

His story was told in a national magazine article. He was rewarded with a parole in 1957 after serving half of his sentence for a 1952 bank robbery at Brookville, Pa.

Last month Richardson was arrested for allegedly passing worthless checks for \$85 near his home in Butler, Pa.

Judge Clyde S. Shumaker, impressed with Richardson's participation in the prison medical experiment, ordered him only to make restitution and pay court costs.

But the charge was a parole violation. Richardson was ordered back to Lewisburg to complete his term.

"I figure I have 1,906 days more to serve now," said Richardson philosophically.
