**Medics Mull Virus Drink**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Government scientists are beginning to wonder about possibilities of producing a "virus cocktail" — a vaccine containing a mixture of about 25 different viruses.

There's nothing immediate about it, but it is one of the means being considered in the search for a better attack on the common respiratory diseases.

Dr. Robert Huebner of the National Institutes of Health mentioned the possibility in an article in "Public Health Reports," issued by the Public Health Service.

He said that if it were found possible to produce a properly constituted, safe and effective character, the idea would be to inject it in children at about the time they also get shots against whooping cough, diphtheria, tetanus and polio.

During the past decade, he said, scientists have uncovered about 70 previously unrecognized viruses, including about 25 that cause various forms of respiratory illness, much of it in children.
