### Gospel Missions President Confers With Basin Chief

James Walbrink, president of the International Union of Gospel Missions of the Pacific Northwest District, was present in Klamath Falls this week, in conference with John Pedersen, superintendent of the Klamath Falls Gospel Mission, on plans for observance of the first anniversary of the mission here.

Date for the annual banquet and dinner meeting is March 13 at 6:30 p.m. Place of the dinner is to be announced.

Walbrink will return for the banquet as speaker on "Skid Row to President of the International Union."

Plans are being made for a badly needed dormitory addition to provide beds for those who spend a few nights at the mission. One night this week 50 men came for shelter and present bed facilities cannot accommodate that number.

The building fund has a total cash outlay of \$520 and \$10,000 will be required for the proposed addition. Anyone wishing to donate may do so by contacting the mission.

In a review of services to unfortunate men dating from last March when the mission was opened to January 30, 1958, Pedersen states that the following figures have been compiled: 26,414 meals, shelter for 10,206, articles of clothing distributed total 5,607, shaves and showers, 2,975, haircuts, 358, 291 men have been treated for body lice extermination and 334 men have gone to the altar for spiritual counseling.

The mission work is maintained entirely on a voluntary basis, and in reviewing the past year, Superintendent Pedersen states that "the response has been beyond all expectation." He highly commended Klamath Falls city officials, businessmen, the churches, numerous organizations and the hundreds of other residents who have helped to make success of the mission work possible.

The board of directors now includes 14 names: Rueben Larson, Willard Cedarleaf, Leonard Burkart, Charles Drew, Gene Bailey, William Powell, Del Stepple, Art Everly, Opal English, Lewis Reimer, Grant Marsh, Bob Steele, Rodney Larson and John Pedersen.

The mission program is on the air at 6:45 a.m. Monday through Friday through the courtesy of KFJL.
