Diplomats Predict Early Cyprus Issue Settlement

LONDON (UPI) — Diplomatic sources Saturday predicted an early settlement of the years-long dispute over the future of Cyprus at next week's formal negotiations among Britain, Turkey and Greece.

Moscow blasted the Greek-Turkish proposals, basis for the agreement, as a betrayal of the people of Cyprus. It asserted that primary consideration was given to the "military interests of the colonial forces" rather than to that of the Cypriots.

Although the Greek-Turkish plan drawn up in Zurich earlier this week has not been made public yet, it is generally known that it calls for British renunciation of sovereignty and the independence of Cyprus.

Foreign Ministers Evangelos Averoff of Greece and Fatim Zorlu of Turkey will meet again with Lloyd on Monday to set the stage for the full-scale conference on Tuesday.

Diplomatic sources said British sovereignty over its military bases will be maintained on the island as part of the agreement. The question of whether Cyprus will remain within the British Commonwealth will be left open, they said.

Crater Opens Ski Classes For Children

CRATER LAKE—Slim Mabery, a Crater Lake National Park ranger, is conducting beginning ski classes for children of park employees this year.

Six of the youngsters passed preliminary tests on Thursday afternoon. He reported, five of the class passed tests on snowplow turns and stops, three climbing tests, stem turn and schuss of the hill at about 15 to 20 miles an hour. Mabery explained that the test was based on control, not speed. The stem turns were made on steep slopes and the students were to take them slowly and under complete control.

The five who passed all the requirements were Jay Bowdler, 7; Judy Holmes, 13; Kenny Mabery, 10; Judy Truelove, 13, and Steve Truelove, 9. Judy Fulton, 10, passed everything except the stem turns.

The classes were started on January 13 and will continue for a total of 14 or 15 weeks. In April a public exhibition is planned, Mabery announced. He anticipates the class will increase to 12 for the next series of Thursday afternoon lessons and at the ski show awards will be made for top performers. The Gun Store is putting up a trophy for the greatest proficiency and the Herald and News will present certificates to all students passing the course.
