



Carved Redwood Tiger To Be Unveiled Monday

REEDLEY, Calif. (UPI) — A crouching Bengal Tiger, carved by famed sculptor Carroll Barnes from a Sequoia redwood log, will be unveiled Monday at the Reedley College campus.

It is the fifth mammoth carving by Barnes from the world's largest type of tree. The tiger, like the others, is large enough so that it won't be overlooked.

The snarling figure is 15 feet long, five feet high and stands on a four foot high base.

Barnes' first giant Redwood creation, completed in 1941, was 16 1/2 feet tall and weighed 25 tons. It was the legendary lumberjack, Paul Bunyan, with his blue ox, Babe, slung across his back and now stands near Porterville, Calif., about 35 miles south of Three Rivers where Barnes' studio is located.

Other creations from redwood by Barnes are "The Giant" at College of Southern California in Los Angeles, Calif.; "Youth", a 24-foot high figure which was the symbol for the 1951 California State Fair, and a City of Dinero statue located in U.S. 99 south of Fresno. The Dinero statue is the largest, 40 feet high.

Barnes' tiger is the smallest and required the least time to complete. The log was obtained by students in the college.

Contribution Given Okay

YREKA — The Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors voted to take preventive measures against the possible curtailment of the annual contribution of \$4,000 made by the state toward operation of the Siskiyou County Veterans Service Office. The board also directed a letter to Assemblywoman Pauline Davis that the funds should not be discontinued.

Siskiyou County veterans service officer, Lynn Roberts, appeared before the board during the Tuesday, February 10, meeting and stated that the operation of his office might be excluded under the budget cut as proposed by Gov. Edmund G. Brown.

Roberts cited that his office has aided in the dispensing of more than one million in veterans benefits during the past five years, and he further averred that besides the veterans claims processed through his office, it assumes some of the case load of both the Siskiyou County Welfare Department and county hospital.

According to Roberts the County Supervisors Association of California is supporting the veterans organizations who have gone on record in opposition to the cut.

The state, for the past 10 years, has contributed \$75 a month toward the veterans service officer's salary; 80 per cent of his assistant's salary and \$50 a month for the operating and maintaining of the office.

Firm May Get Franchise

DORRIS — The Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors tentatively granted a franchise to Pacific Gas and Electric Company at its last meeting on Tuesday, February 10. The board wishes to consider with members of the local business community the possibility of a franchise for the company to operate a pipeline from the coast to the interior.

New Egg Laws Discussed

YREKA — A statement concerning the provisions of the state egg standardization laws, with particular reference to the grades and standards of shell eggs sold or offered for sale, was recently made by Jess R. Grisham, Siskiyou County agricultural commissioner.

Grisham said that the law governing the sale of shell eggs in California provides that it is unlawful to sell to retailers or consumers eggs ungraded as to quality and size. In addition, each carton of eggs must be marked with size and grade in letters and less than one-fourth inch in height, and the name and address of the egg packer or distributor.

The grades and standards as set forth in the California Agricultural Code are enforced by the director of agriculture and by county agricultural commissioners and their inspectors. Periodic inspections to insure compliance with the laws are made whenever eggs are packed, stored, delivered for sale or sold.

Many inspections of eggs are made daily by county agricultural commissioners and their inspectors in retail markets throughout the state to insure that consumers buying eggs will receive the quality as marked on the carton.

The state of California standards or quality provide for four grades for eggs: Grade AA, Grade A, Grade B, and Grade C. It is unlawful to sell eggs of Grade C quality to retailers or consumers. Eggs of Grade C or higher may be diverted to bakeries or egg breaking plants for manufacturing purposes.

Reports from retailers or consumers of the purchase of eggs which fail to meet the size and quality as marked on the carton should be made promptly. Such complaints should be reported to the agricultural commissioner's office in the county where the eggs were purchased or to the Bureau of Fruit and Vegetable Standardization, in Sacramento.

A two-page digest of the California state egg law may be obtained without charge by application to the office of the agricultural commissioner or to the Bureau of Fruit and Vegetable Standardization.
