Five Killed In Holocaust

PIKEVILLE, Ky. (UPI)—A 25-year-old mother and four of her five children were hurled to death when fire destroyed their home Sunday.

The father and the fifth child were away when the blaze broke out.

The victims were Mrs. Alberta Hatfield, Karen Sue, 7, Joan, 5, Jackie, 4, and Deborah Ann, 19 months.

It was Kentucky's second major fire in two days. Eleven persons burned to death in a fire Saturday at an Ashland apartment house.

Pike County Deputy Coroner Russell Rogers said the father, Bud, had left home early Sunday to go to work at Mazon, W. Va., to arrange for the training of a new crew. The couple's fifth child, Keith, 9, was visiting grandparents at the time of the fire.

Rogers said the blaze might have started from a coal cooking stove or from one of two coal-fired heating grates.

The body of Karen Sue was found in the front of the house and the rest in their beds.

Billy Opens New Crusade

MELBOURNE, Australia (UPI)—An overflow crowd of 15,000 persons — 5,000 standing in the rain — launched American evangelist Billy Graham's Australian crusade Sunday night.

Six-hundred 22 men and women accepted Graham's invitation to dedicate their lives to Christ. It was the most responsive evangelizing meeting ever held in Melbourne, and Graham said it was the biggest he had ever encountered anywhere.

Some 10,000 persons filled West Melbourne Stadium, while 5,000 more stood in a pouring rain to listen to his sermon over loud speakers.

The American minister went outside later and delivered another address to the dripping crowd.

"You are wonderful people to stand in this rain," he said. "I'll never forget this scene."

Pasternak Pulls A Garbo

MOSCOW (UPI)—Russian poet-author Boris Pasternak, perturbed by the undesirable controversy stirred abroad by his poem "The Nobel Prize," asked Sunday night to be left alone to concentrate on his work and seek reinstatement in the Soviet Writers Union.

The 60-year-old Pasternak was ousted from the union because of his controversial novel "Dr. Zhivago," for which he was awarded the 1958 Nobel Prize for Literature.

Pasternak rejected the award and the \$40,000 prize that went with it after coming under heavy fire from his countrymen.

Pasternak reiterated his indignation with a British reporter whom he said betrayed his trust by publishing the poem, interpreted in the West as indicating Pasternak's determination to continue his fight for freedom of expression.

Pasternak said he gave the reporter the poem to deliver to a friend in Paris, and did not authorize its publication.

"I just want to be left alone and do my work," Pasternak said Sunday night, with considerable annoyance.

It was the second time in three days that he said he would grant no more interviews to foreign correspondents.

Six Tracts Readied For March Sale

Olson-Ross Lumber Co. of white City was the successful bidder for a tract of 1,872,000 sq. ft. of timber located along the Tillamook Trail highway in northern Jackson County which was offered for sale by the Medford District of the Bureau of Land Management on February 12.

Their bid of \$70,855 included an offer of \$46 per thousand sq. ft. for the Douglas-fir, which was the major species in the sale. Eight other operators qualified to participate in the oral auction sale.

On March 12, the Medford District of the bureau plans to offer six tracts for sale. These tracts, which vary in size from 15,000 to 5,699,000 sq. ft. have a total estimated volume of 12,178,000 sq. ft. which is appraised at \$281,545.05.

Three of the tracts and 11,968,000 sq. ft. of the volume is located in southern Douglas County, two tracts and 34,000 sq. ft. are in eastern Jackson County and one tract containing 176,000 sq. ft. is located in southern Josephine County.

Kissing Boys Out Of Jail

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP)—The two North Carolina boys involved in a kissing case are home from reform school. Their mothers say the lads won't get into trouble again.

The Negroes, James Hanover Thompson, 10, and David "Fuzzy" Simpson, 9, were released over the weekend for good behavior. There were committed three months ago after they forced a kiss from a 6-year-old white girl.

The mothers, Mrs. Evelyn Thompson, 33, who has four other children at home, and Mrs. Jennie Simpson, 48, who is caring for five other children, defended the boys. Mrs. Thompson says her husband deserted her, and Mrs. Simpson is a widow.

Mrs. Thompson said James "is really a good boy, and maybe he got into scrapes because I couldn't give him the attention he needed. From now on I'm not going to let him out of my sight."

Mrs. Simpson said "Fuzzy got into scrapes before, but I think they had it in for him in that kissing case."

Police Arrest 2 Youngsters

ATLANTA (AP)—Two pistol-packing youngsters were arrested by police who said the pair stole dynamite and guns so they could build a rocket ship and "play western like on TV."

The boys, aged 13 and 14, were arrested as they walked home from target practice in a field. Police said each had three pistols tucked in his belt. Officers said they found 54 sticks of dynamite, 205 caps, 17 pistols and 20 boxes of ammunition hidden in lots of the homes where the boys lived.

The arsenal was taken from a lumber company and a hardware concern. Police quoted the boys as saying it was fun to steal when not attending eighth grade classes.

Names of youths under 17 charged with crimes are withheld in accordance with Georgia juvenile court law.

PORTLAND (AP)—Mack Hatfield, Oregon's young governor, will "have a real impact on the Republican Party" if he "can make a good record as governor," Vice President Nixon said Saturday.

"I am sure he will," Nixon added.

The vice president said that at a recent cabinet meeting President Eisenhower spoke "very favorably" of Hatfield.

Nixon's comments were in response to questions by newsmen as to whether he believed Hatfield would be an important contender for the 1960 Republican vice presidential nomination.

PORTLAND (AP)—The Most Rev. Francis P. Leipzig, Roman Catholic bishop of Baker, now is chaplain for the Pacific Coast Intermountain Assn. of Fire Chiefs.

At a weekend meeting here the association created the post, similar to one Bishop Leipzig has held for 31 years with the Oregon Assn. of Fire Chiefs.

He received an award which cited his "promotion of fire protection and his moral inspiration."

Highway patrol officers said the veteran film actor was driving his new car in an erratic manner at about 5 to 10 miles an hour along Pacific Coast Highway when they stopped him.

Hall was "belligerent and mad at everybody," reported Deputy Sheriff F. L. Stabler of the sheriff station here where Hall was booked on the misdemeanor charge.

"I'll see you in court," the pickie-nosed actor shouted to anyone who cared to hear. Stabler said.
