

Injury Retires Champion

Lyle McFarland, the 115 pound Klamath Union High School senior who wears the Oregon State prep wrestling crown in his weight, was the only man among the 130 entrants in the District 6 A-1 tournament to receive a serious injury.

McFarland, after pinning his first opponent, was in the midst of his second win when he painfully twisted his knee. He hurriedly pinned his man and had

to be helped from the mat, forced to forfeit his matches for the balance of the tournament.

The forfeitures cost him his chance to enter the 1959 state meet.

"It was a real tough break for both Lyle and the squad," observed coach Delance Duncan following the misfortune. "We missed Lyle badly — from a scoring standpoint, of course, but more important, from the loss of the spirit with which he has always inspired the team."

The Pelican wrestlers placed second behind Grants Pass for the district title.

"The injury laid Lyle out of a chance to become district champ for three years running, state champ two years in a row, and the chance to become the state's highest scoring wrestler. He is the only man on the squad who has won every match," Duncan added. "Without a doubt he was the best wrestler on the squad."

OSC To Host Prep Matmen

OREGON STATE COLLEGE — The 12th annual state high school wrestling championships, to be staged here on February 20 and 21, probably will be the biggest mat show ever assembled anywhere, tournament director Dale Thomas said today.

A total of 416 contestants, representing eight districts, will be on hand for the event, and for the first time competition will be divided into two categories. One group will compete in the A-1 ranks, and the A-2 and B schools will vie together in the other rung.

Thomas said that a survey shows it will be the biggest high school wrestling tournament ever held in the nation, in terms of participants and officials. There will be a grand total of 320 matches over the two-day period, with champions Saturday night, February 21.

Eight mats will be in operation at one time on the Gill Coliseum floor, and over \$15,000 worth of amateur type mat is involved. Working will be 12 referees, six official scorers and timers at each mat, and a total crew of 40 men.

Co-sponsors of the tournament will be the Corvallis Athletic Club, and the OSC athletic department. In addition to championship team trophies and individual medals, a special trophy will go for the first time, to the team that scores the most falls in the meet. The Active Club is donating the trophy.

Sweet Home is the defending state champion, and again will be strong from its area. Other A-1 teams that appear best at this early date include Klamath Falls, Grants Pass, Redmond, David Douglas and Newberg, with Canby a favorite in the A-2 and B ranks.

Denny Moyer Underdog Pick

PORTLAND (AP) — Denny Moyer, 19-year-old Portland boxer who has run up a string of 19 consecutive victories, is an underdog against Vince Martinez of Paterson, N. J. here tonight. Newspapers said odds were 6-5.

The two meet in a 10-round welterweight match. There will be no radio or television broadcast. The fight, main event of a card that starts at 8:30 p.m., probably will get under way about 10 p.m. (PST).

In Moyer's last fight, nationally televised from Madison Square Garden, he took a disputed decision over Gaspar Ortega.

Martinez is 10 years older than Moyer and has far more ring experience with 61 victories in 67 fights. It is that experience that gives him the favorite's role here.

Both fighters are expected to weigh in today at about the same weight, just under 140 pounds. Promoter Tommy Moyer, uncle of the local fighter, said ticket sales were going better than for any recent fight here and a crowd of 4,000 might be on hand in the 10,000-seat Centennial Exposition Center.

Death Claims Ex-Grid Boss Tim Mara

NEW YORK (AP) — Tim Mara, who brought the National Football League's New York Giants into headlines, is dead from a heart attack.

The former president of the club died at his home Monday night. He was 71.

Mara retired as the club's president 10 years ago. It has since been handled by his sons, John and Wellington. John is the Giants president and Wellington is secretary.

Last season, the club won the Eastern Division title but lost in the championship game to the Baltimore Colts.

Mara invested \$2,500, and with former heavyweight champion Gene Tunney's manager, Billy Gibson, activated the club in 1925. He later bought out Gibson.

The genial Irishman had a knack of getting football's most heralded stars on his payroll, among them Ken Strong, Mel Hein, Bennie Friedman and Duffy Leman.

The Giants won four world championships 1927, 1934, 1938 and 1956 — and eight conference titles.

In 1953 Mara turned down a million-dollar offer for the franchise.

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Huskies Blast Southern Cal

SEATTLE (AP) — The University of Washington Huskies trailed 37-33 at the intermission and then exploded to blast the Southern California Trojans 76-35 in a Pacific Coast Conference basketball contest Monday night.

Don Dorland started the rally 13 seconds after the second half got underway with a long shot and Bruno Boin joined to flip in another. Dorland, who got all of his 10 points in the second stanza, scored again to make it 39-37 for UW and put the Huskies in front for keeps.

In the first 20 minutes of the tilt, the two teams swapped the lead 20 times, with the Trojans hitting 40 per cent from the field during the opening half.

The Huskies tightened their defense and speeded their offense in the second half to cut the Trojans' field goal scoring down to 29 per cent.

Washington's Doug Smart led the scoring with 26 points, followed by Boin with 21. Johnny Werhas paced the Trojans with 14 tallies.

Miss. State Wins Hassle

ATHENS, Ga. (AP) — Mississippi State survived a first fight Monday night to celebrate with another basketball victory its climb to fifth place in the Associated Press poll.

The Maroons whipped Georgia 76-36 but they knew they had been in a fight, in more ways than one. Six minutes into the second half, fouls broke out on the court and it took police and officials five minutes to restore order.

Leading 40-40, State was moving down court when Georgia's Sonny Poas blocked Bailey Howell's shot. Howell headed for the free throw line but Poas and State's Jerry Ketton lingered at midcourt. Suddenly Poas popped Ketton and the brawl was on. Players leaped into action and spectators quickly crowded around.

The officials didn't throw any players out of the game but Poas was yanked and never returned.

Realistic Viewpoint Has Merit

EAST LANSING, Mich. (AP) — Biggie Munn suggests "let's be realistic about recruiting."

"The biggest and best companies in the world seek out the men best equipped for their top jobs," said the Michigan State University athletic director today. "So why shouldn't the universities go after the best athletic talent?"

Munn, now in his sixth year as the Spartans' athletic director after coaching the school's football teams to national prominence, is a long-time member of the Big Ten's Committee on Recruiting Practices.

He favors a liberalization of recruiting practices to make it easier for coach to contact prospective athletes.

The present Big Ten athletic scholarship setup, based on need, is "workable but unrealistic," said Munn.

"It penalizes the thrifty parent," he added. "If a father works hard and saves some money for his son's education, the rules state the boy can receive only so much money because he has only so much need. But the father who doesn't care, who doesn't bother to save anything — his son can get a full ride because he needs more."

Munn said recruiting on a well-planned, aggressive basis is the key to success in athletics. "We built great teams at Michigan State because we had a real plan for recruiting. It was not an accident."

Munn disagrees with those who are critical of elaborate recruiting programs designed to produce top teams.

"There is nothing wrong with aiming high. Every business, every industry, every department head in each school wants his department to excel. As head of our athletic department, I want our teams to win as much as possible. If it doesn't matter whether we win or lose, we might as well quit."

The 30-year-old athletic director whose Michigan State football teams compiled a 54-9-2 record in seven seasons, stoutly defends alumni loyalists who do much of the recruiting.

"They got a lot of undeserved abuse," said Munn. "Sure, sometimes they may get out of line because of over-enthusiasm. But we'd be in terrible shape without them."

The only real danger in aggressive and competitive recruiting is to the boy himself, Munn added. "There is always the chance that the boy who is terrifically sought after might get an exaggerated opinion of himself," he said, "but our first job is to make men out of boys."
