Klamath County Historians Meet In Centennial Honor

The quotation, "Gentlemen, this is a great country," made 113 years ago in Oregon Territory, keynoted the eulogy of early pioneers, given Saturday night by Professor Roy McNeal, Southern Oregon College, Ashland, before a gathering of more than 100 guests in the Winema Hotel. The banquet, in honor of Oregon's 100th birthday anniversary, was sponsored by the Klamath County Historical Society.

Continuing, the speaker led his audience through the period of those early struggles of Oregon's first settlers to the state's ultimate destiny, statehood in 1859. It was the wishes of those men and those women, he said, in the first principles of democracy, freedom, equality, individuality and dignity, that must be continued if this country is to remain great. Oregon pioneers he said, "were children of the past, with visions of the future," who were aware
