NEW YORK (UPI) — You're in the "alarm zone" if you're 10 pounds overweight, according to Dr. Frederick J. Stare, head of the nutrition department at Harvard University's public health school. "There should be alarm," he said, "because 10 pounds over normal weight can mean you'll die five to 10 years sooner than you should."

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Beck Tax Evasion Trial Set For Jury

TACOMA, Wash. (AP) — The income tax evasion trial of Dave Beck, 63, once one of the most powerful men in the U.S. labor movement, is expected to go to a federal jury of eight men and four women Wednesday. The government spent 57 days, entered thousands of exhibits and put 115 witnesses on the stand in its effort to prove the former president of the Teamsters Union evaded \$240,000 in income taxes for 1950-53. Total cost of the trial itself has been estimated at more than \$200,000.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Experiments to determine if man can be frozen solid for years-long trips to other solar systems are under way at the University of California at Los Angeles. Dr. John Lyman of UCLA's biotechnology laboratory plans to freeze mice and rats at first, but believes his findings can be used to turn humans into ice-like statues for ageless trips through space.
