Tar Heels Take Lead In AP Poll

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS — North Carolina's Tar Heels have taken the lead in The Associated Press weekly college basketball poll followed closely by Auburn and Kentucky.

But something's gotta give before the sports writers and broadcasters go to the polls again. North Carolina, with 16 victories in 17 games, took over the top spot from Kentucky, upset by Mississippi State 66-58. Kentucky dropped to third place. Unbeaten Auburn moved into the runner-up position.

North Carolina goes up against tough North Carolina State Wednesday night and improving Maryland Saturday. Kentucky will attempt to break Auburn's 30-game winning streak on Saturday. The Wildcats take on Vanderbilt Wednesday night.

In the latest balloting, North Carolina was named first on 38 of 113 ballots cast. The Tar Heels received 871 points.

The top ten teams, with first place votes in parentheses (points on 10-9-8 etc. basis): 1. North Carolina (38) — 871; 2. Auburn (29) — 822; 3. Kentucky (15) — 779; 4. Kansas State (14) — 711; 5. Mississippi State (12) — 612; 6. (tie) Cincinnati (4) — 569; and North Carolina State 569.
